PRESIDENT REAGAN'S announcement this week concerning the plan for the MX Missile system to be located in Utah ended several years of debate and speculation as to where the controversial defense system would be located.

At one point during the Carter Administration, one plan had been advanced to locate the system in Eastern New Mexico and West Texas, which brought howls of protest from the farming community, which saw that plan as a threat to the area's farmland.

The later plan, which included the proposed "Dense Pack" system, was considered a possibility for Eastern New Mexico. From a security standpoint, since Clovis already has Cannon Air Base, the addition of the MX might not have been that bad a deal, considering the impact that it would have had on the Clovis area economy.

But the decision has now been made, subject to the approval of congress, which still will have the final say-so in regard to the MX proposition.

There has been some opposition all along to the MX Missile system in congress. Some say that the system is out of date, before the engineering even begins. Others argue that rather than locate our missiles in a place easy to chart by an enemy, we should come up with a system of placing them on submarines, or have airplanes capable of launching defense missiles.

So, the MX missile system will be one which faces considerable debate in congress.

It is really tough to know what to do. The president's argument that we need some type of system, to serve as a deterrent to the Soviets, and to give our country more "bargaining chips" in international talks, is reasonable.

But the final decision by congress may come down to the fact of whether or not the MX is, as President Reagan calls it "The Missile for the Times."

The debate has (as usual), already begun on television and in the mass media, which sees themselves as the nation's problem solvers. Hopefully, congress will take its time in addressing the matter, and attempt to get the feelings of their constituents on the matter.

THE NFL STRIKE is apparently over, and for millions of Americans, watching football on Sunday afternoons has returned as a pastime. Even though yours truly has promised to cut down on the amount of time spent in front of the "boob tube," I just had to catch Sunday's Dallas Cowboy game, for "research purposes."

What I discovered was an angle which had been overlooked by all the experts and commentators on the game. They were all worried about the quality of play, and whether or not there might be injuries, due to the eight-week layoff; how crisp the play would be, etc., etc.

The thing that was overlooked was whether or not the game officials (the guys who are charged with throwing flags) would be at their peak. After watching the Dallas game, my conclusion was that the players seemed to perform much better than expected, both on offense and defense.

But the guys who throw the flags must have had their minds on those rose beds they had started digging during the strike, or how they were going to get some other project finished up. They definitely weren't watching the same game I was.

Shepherd won the weekly cash prize of \$7.50. Mrs. Marquez was awarded \$5.00, and Hernandez won \$3.00.

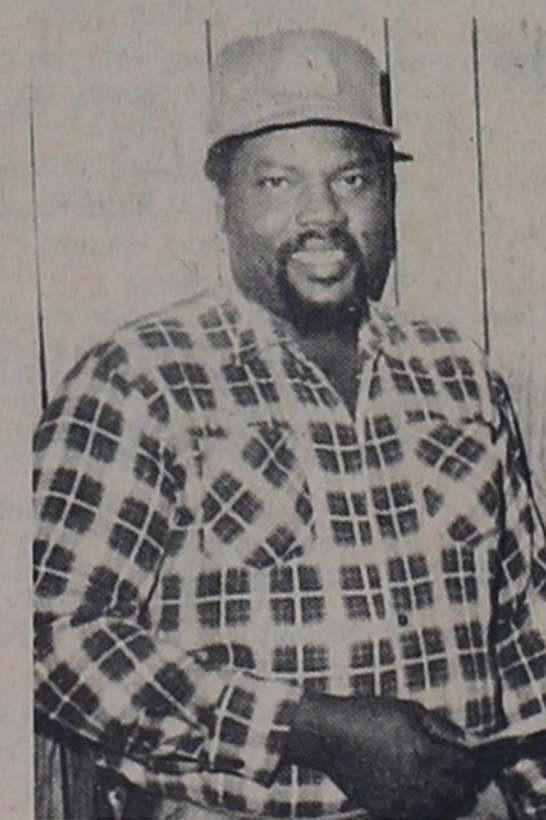

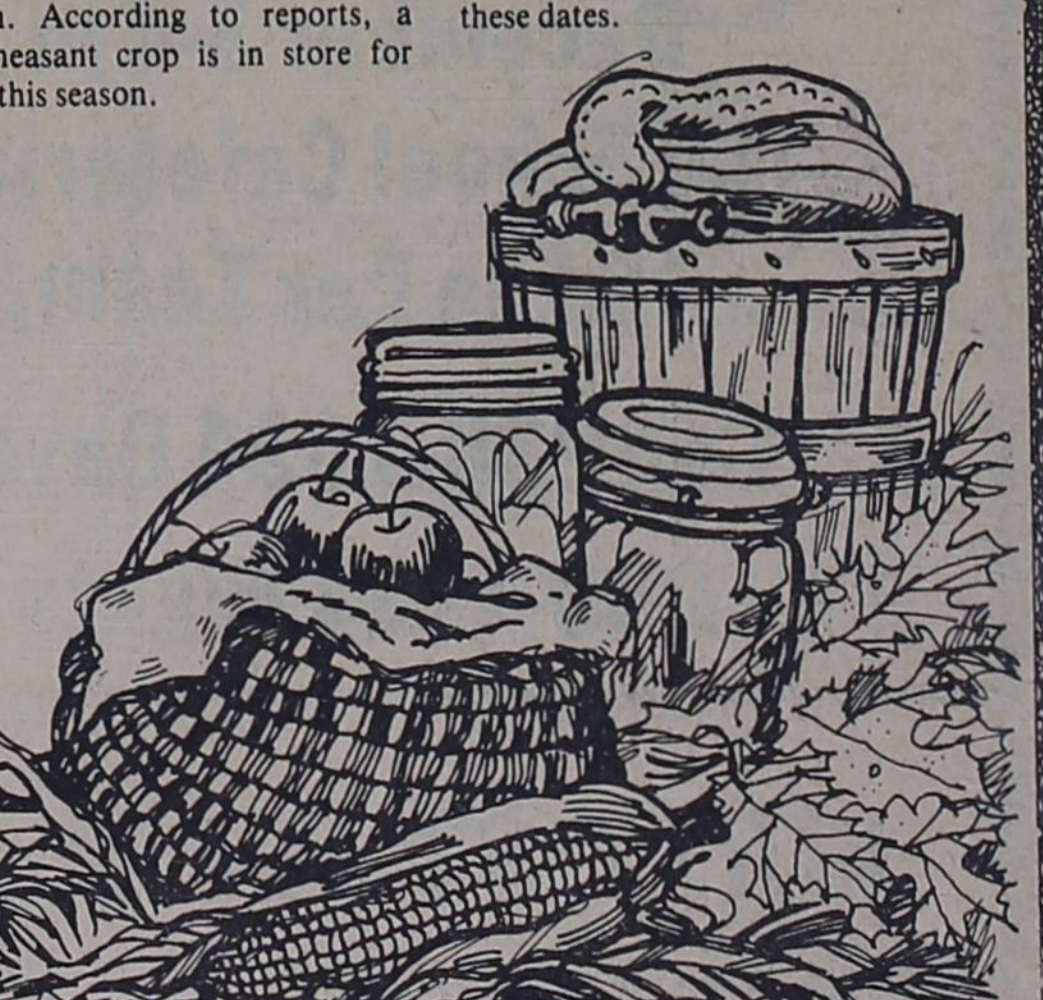
Pheasant Dates Given

Several producers attended a meeting at the First State Bank, Bovina, on November 1, concerning Prairie Dog Control. Mike Yeary, area predator control officer with the U.S. Wildlife Service, presented the program.

Those in attendance agreed to form a county wide control program and to encourage their neighbors to participate in the program. Bob Wilson, Bovina, was elected as chairman of the control program.

It was recommended to have a two-step control program. The first step would be to treat with the zinc phosphide oats this winter and then to use phostoxin tablets in the spring. These products are available from the U.S. Wildlife Service for a fee. December first is the deadline for signing up. All interested producers are urged to contact Bob Wilson of Bovina or Seth Ralston, the county agent for additional details.

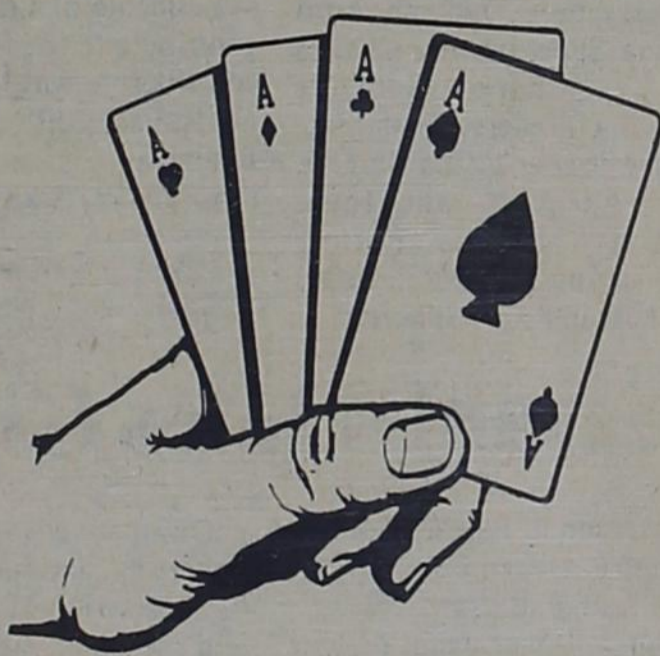
Funeral services were held at Palacios, where he was a deacon at the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Lubbock.

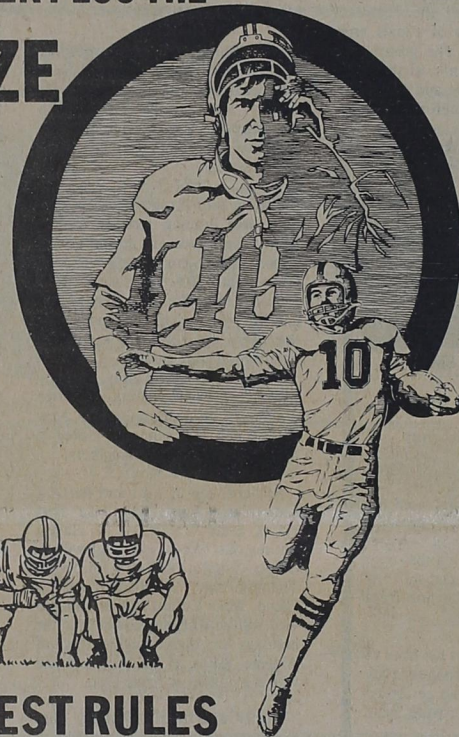
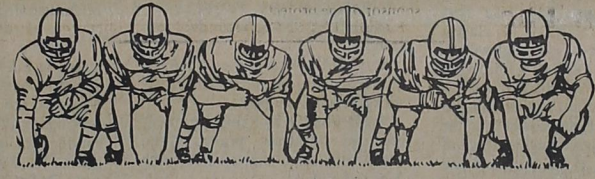

DON'T LET BABY GET BORED!

From birth an infant's eyes are constantly changing, and they need the kind of stimulation in surroundings which parents can easily provide. Keep a dim light on in the nursery after dark so that, when baby's awake, he or she will have something to look at. Move the crib around the room so that light will come from different directions. Also, you can shift the infant's position in the crib so that light attracts baby's attention from different sides.

When an infant is five to six weeks old, it's time to help him or her learn to follow a moving object with the eyes. Hang a brightly colored mobile toy for visual interest over the crib at eye level. Even babies can get bored looking at the same surroundings hour after hour...so provide some variety for your baby.

Such simple practices as feeding or changing your baby from alternate sides can give different SEEING experiences. A rattle will help a child to follow sound with the eyes. The game of "pat-a-cake" teaches visual lessons, too. During your baby's first months, modify the nursery environment to help develop visual skills. Helping your baby learn to see can be fun for both parent and child.

Dental Program Is Available For Elderly

The Texas Dental Association has introduced a new statewide dental program that provides dental care to senior citizens at reduced cost. The program, called for by the 1982 TDA House of Delegates, is designed to increase access to comprehensive dental care for elderly citizens on low, fixed incomes. Volunteer dentists—all members of the Texas Dental Association—have agreed to provide dental care at a reduced cost to senior citizens across the State of Texas. The program named "Senior Dent" has received wide approval on both a state and national level.

To be eligible to receive reduced-fee care under the "Senior Dent" program, an individual should be age 65 or older; not eligible for federal, state or other dental health assistance; not eligible for private dental insurance and should have an annual household income of \$12,000, or less OR be accepted by the participating dentist due to special circumstances.

To receive a referral to participating dentists, the senior citizen simply calls the TDA statewide toll free number—1-800-252-9377. The caller is informed of the eligibility guidelines and given the telephone number of several participating dentists in their Zip Code area. In some instances, they will be referred back through the component dental society for a similar referral.

The actual kickoff for the "Senior Dent" program will be November 30 with a statewide press conference planned at the State Capitol. Recognizing the diverse needs and dental condition among the elderly population, the program promotion will emphasize preventive care and retention of natural teeth. Approximately 1,400 dentists have agreed to provide their services at a reduced fee to senior citizens.

In designing "Senior Dent," one of the Association's primary objectives was simplicity. Its goal is to explain the program to the dental profession and the public in a way that all parties could understand. In addition, TDA encourages senior citizens to use "Senior Dent" for regular preventive dental care. Regular examinations and preventive care are needed for individuals who have dentures as well as for those with some or all of their natural teeth.

DPS Officer Gives Holiday Traffic Warning

Major C.W. Bell, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day weekend, all of us are making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will make plans of a different kind. They will be on duty to stimulate safety-consciousness throughout this festive holiday."

During the last Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents and 57 traffic fatalities. Major Bell said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of traffic deaths in Texas."

A total of 4,701 fatalities was recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1,082 deaths and 17,343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

"Many drivers are not tested," Bell said, "because Texas has no law requiring chemical test on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50 per cent of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWI."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

W.I.F.E. Meeting Is Held

The Sixth Annual Convention of Women Involved in Farm Economics (W.I.F.E.) was called to order Thursday, November 11 at the Holiday Inn, Denver Northglenn, Denver, Colorado by National President June Saylor of Muleshoe, Texas.

Saylor gave the president's address Saturday morning reminding the membership "Time has run out on the economic clock for many producers. We who have survived thus far are only marking time." She went on to say, "It is time for all to admit the Free Market oriented agriculture policy has bankrupted too many and led producers to the lowest commodity prices since the Great Depression. The repercussions of the loss of income to agriculture has led our nation to the highest unemployment of 10.4 per cent and lowest corporate profits since the '30's Depression."

Saylor also noted the fact that America is the envy of almost every country in the world, not for our military, our social life, our welfare system, or our banking system...but for our agriculture.

Mrs. Saylor's address was closed by saying that, "Farmers must have a program designed with protection for producers, which will allow the farmer to continue producing plentiful food and fiber supplies, reasonably priced...but at the same time must be a no cost program to the government."

Mrs. Saylor announced that WIFE had voted unanimously to begin immediate preparations for an Agricultural Women's Summit Meeting to be held as soon as possible. "In light of the severity of the economic situation in which the agricultural producers of America find themselves, we must seek unity of purpose in finding solutions to our problems," Saylor stated.

The Saturday Banquet guest speaker was Sister Thomas More Bertels. Sister Bertels is a member of the Franciscan Sisters of Christian Charity, a teaching and nursing order. At present, Sister Bertels is a full professor of history at Silver Lake College in Manitowish, Wisconsin.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is cooperating with the Internal Revenue Service in offering 38 Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state, reports Laura Jacobs. The nearest workshop to our area will be held in Amarillo on November 29 and 30, and in Lubbock on December 2 and 3.

These two-day workshops are specifically designed for tax practitioners who work extensively with farmers and ranchers.

Topics to be covered in the general workshops are: What's New; Economics Recovery Tax Act Changes for 1982; IRAs' Tax Effects of Bankruptcy and Repossessions; Capital Gains and Losses; Net Operating Losses; and a Potpourri Session.

This year advanced programs will be offered in Abilene, Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Houston, Lubbock, San Antonio, Weslaco and Wichita Falls. Topics to be discussed in the Advanced workshops are: What's New-A Review of Revenue Rulings and Procedure Changes; Corporations (Sub C and S); Corporate Fringe Benefits; and Taxation of Income from Trusts and Estates.

The Tax Practitioner educational program has been highly successful. Last year about 3,000 people participated in this state-wide series. These practitioners reported filing more than 665,500 tax returns. 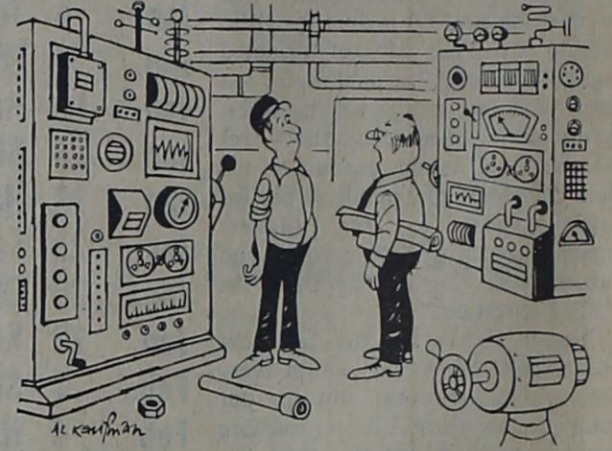
