Council tables police complaint, annexation request

City councilmen tabled two items Friday, one concerning a complaint by a local resident against the Merkel Police Department, and tabled actions on an annexation petition.

Ann Talent, a Merkel resident filed a complaint before city council at their Jan. 16 meeting. Her complaint alledged that Merkel Patrolman John Davis had acted improperly while issuing her a traffic citation. A statement from officer Davis disputed her allegations.

Police Chief Leroy Austermann to investigate the complaint and Austermann's report to council Friday shed no new light concerning Ms. Talent's allegations, or the officer's statements.

Council also tabled annexation action on a tract of land east of Rose Hill Cemetery. Humphrey's Village residents petitioned to be included in the cry limits in November. Council has delayed action on the annexation while other landowners east of the city could be contacted to be included in the annexation.

Local seniors favor draft registration

Merkel High School seniors, by a margin of 43-4 said they favored draft registration and 31 of 47 students approved registration of females.

The poll, taken in Richard Hill's civics course, for the Mail, also expressed conditions or events leading to draft registration. Two questions were asked: What is your opinion of selective service; Do you think females should be required to register?

Of 28 males responding to the poll, 21 said they'd rather volunteer than be drafted.

Sixteen negative replies were made to registration of women. Of those 16, ten males said they did not feel women should register. Nine other people felt women should register, but not if they had children.

Twenty-one of the respondents said they felt the draft would be necessary to answer an urgent call of military manpower needs.

Twelve respondents, ten of them male, said tiey felt women should be required to register because of the Equal Rights Amendment.


accident site.

60 years ago

1920s booming

The 1920s started off with a bang for Merkel and the Merkel area when the Sears well, seven miles north of town was tested and ready for production. Sears pumpers told the Mail that the original estimate of flow was 500 barrels and production was

38 barrels per day. The Sears well sparked the formation of the Merkel Oil Field No. 1 and saw as many as 75 students enrolled in school compared to 1919.

Land speculation was also booming as the Mail reported that leases and royalties were being traded daily. Many prominent Texas and U.S. oil men came

to the area for purchase of leases. Five local gins were also spitting out record cotton crops as they reported a season harvest of 18,250 bales. The yield was the largest of any rural community in West Texas and the Merkel area also received record rains in late fall and early winter,

making for a good start on the winter wheat crop. Thomas Durham of Merkel purchased the Mail from Mr. and Mrs. Walter Johnson. Durham was later remembered in the Merkel Mail for being one of the most progressive, and liberal editors the Mail


City Council voted in 1920 to purchase 15 more street lights for the town.

Register by Feb. 6 for beef vote

Local cattlemen have until February 6th to register in the upcoming Beeferendum.

The Beef and Information Act would set aside 20 cents per \$100 in total sales at market for promotion, advertising of beef. The program would be administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. According to election guidelines, a cattleman must have sold one animal during 1979, must have registered at a local ASCS office before Feb. 6th, 50 percent of the registered cattlemen must vote, and a simple majority will carry the election.

Bombarded by information, editors try

It is amazing both the amount and quality of

information that this paper is beseeched with. Examples "called the telecast the single most important campaign activity to date." That is from Conally campaign literature and describes a local telecast to be shown over a handful of stations.

A news release from the Independent Cattlemen's Association starts off by urging cattlemen to vote in the upcoming Beeferendum, and gives rules for two paragraphs and then lists a page and a half of reasons why cattlemen to vote against the Beeferendum.

The Texas Farm Bureau sent a news release stating it had joined in a lawsuit against Longshormen that refused to load grain ships headed to communist countries. A Texas A&M University Home Economics filler

stated "When a person seems oblivious to offensiver odors, it may indicate a diminished sense of smell. Either that or something is wrong with their nose. Another one started off "All people have feelings. even children." That hurts already

That is one of the jobs of an editor, he also has to weed out the hundreds of news releases that contradict each other, make wild claims, make no

sense at all or have no effect on the reader.

It is little wonder to this small town newspaper editor that people can be so confused concerning current events when they are surrounded with nothing but information from credible sources.

Credible sources.

As a former military journalist, I have had the opportunity to deal with big time journalists. They knew how to get answers from the government, you work from the bottom of the power pole and the base newspaper editor was pretty low on the pole.

On one occasion, I spent half a day briefing a camera crew and military correspondent for a network news story and reporter and photographers from wire services and major dailies around, a group of 30.

Our base was prepared to respond to airlife Americans and others from Zaire a year and a half ago. As a matter of fact, we had already landed ground crews of communications, supplies.

We had prepared fact sheets, had answered literally hundreds of questions, and I had the impression the briefing had gone well.

I turned on the XYZ evening news and the correspondent started "Good Evening, The planes and men of the 317 TAW stand ready tonight as the workhouse of the fleet C-5 rumbles down the runway headed for Zaire.

I could have died, visions of court martial danced through my head. To begin with, the plane was the much smaller C-130 and not one Air Force official had permission to acknowledge we had landed or sent any type of flight to Zaire, and since I briefed them, the future looked pretty bleak.

The point is, this respected journalist had many two blunders in his opening sentence.

How could that happen.



AUSTIN-Increasing sales of U.S. agricultural land to foreigners are generating fears of a new colonization of America by absentee alien landlords.

Many Americans are wary that foreigners are driving up the price of farms beyond the reach of family farmers, that foreigners may gain control over U.S. agricultural production, and that foreign absentee landlords may let the land lie idle or otherwise adversely affect community, social, and political life.

This issue is of particular interest to Texans because of the importance of agriculture in the economic and social structure of the state. As of 1978, the greatest amount of foreign investment was in Southern states, and Texas was among the leaders.

Foreign investment in the U. S. is on the increase, and with further devaluation of the American dollar, these investments may rise even more dramatically unless

preventive steps are taken. Several bills dealing with foreign ownership of agricultural land were introduced in the 66th Legislature. One of the strongest, House Bill 431, would have prevented nonresident aliens from acquiring title to more than 320 acres of land in Texas and would have required alien owners to register their ownership with state and county officials. Although the bill was defeated, several other agricultural states have introduced similar legislation.

Many unanswered questions are left regarding alien ownership of farmland.


Still unknown is the extent of alien ownership of land and its effects on land prices, the family farm and communities.

During this interim period of the Texas Legislature, the Agriculture and Livestock Committee is charged with reviewing non-resident alien ownership of agricultural land and considering the registration of alien property owners in

fexas. A determination of the effects of alien ownership on the local and state economy should also be made.

In restricting alien purchases, lawmakers should consider the consequences for economic development, foreign relations and private property rights.

Land is regarded as a basic element of our heritage. Whether the fears many people have concerning foreign ownership of that land are realistic or not, it is likely that restrictions will be tightened on alien ownership of our





