Council closes case on police, court complaints

Merkel City council made four decisions Tuesday evening at a special called meeting concerning a local womans complaint against the Merkel Police Department.

Ann Talent of Merkel filed a complaint against Merkel Policeman John Davis concerning the he handled a speeding citation.

The council went into an unusually long executive session to review statements concerning the incident from witnesses. Merkel Mayor Lou David Allen announced following the excutive session that council had reached four decisions concerning the

Mayor Allen said "There seems to still be a difference of opinion as to what actually happened, it appears that the officer over reacted in an unusual circumstance, we belive the officer could have acted in a more diplomatic manner, and we are instructing the Police Chief to review the incident with the officer and to emphasise that non-diplomatic behaviour will not be tolerated.'

The mayor added that he felt the matter was closed and that the matter is now in the hands of the Police Department.

City council had also received a letter of complaint against the Merkel Municipal Court.

Council again went in executive session. When council went back into open session, Mayor Allen said "Council has reviewed some fines levied in some municipal court cases, office personnel (City Hall employees) should tell callers concerning traffic fines they should be told what the fine is. If they don't want to pay the fine, they have the right to appear before the judge. It should also be publicized that Tuesday is the day that city court is in session from 9 until noon and from 1 until 5 p.m.

Merkel Police Chief ray Pack said that "As far as John Davis is concerned, you have tabled this matter again. Pack went on to say that he did not feel that Officer Davis had been given opportunity to defend himself aginst the allogations. Both Davis and Pack agreed that Officer Davis reacted in the manner they were taught to not argue, and do their duty.

Slaton advances, down Badgers in playoffs

The Merkel girls are out of the playoffs, but for the second straight year, it took the defending state champs to knock them out. A pesky zone and fine inside play from the Slaton Tigers powered Slaton into the regional tournament with a 70-52 win over Merkel in Spyder Tuesday wight Merkel in Snyder Tuesday night.

As late as the third quarter, the Badgers were within six points but in the stretch, Slaton's press and strong inside play made the difference.

Junior Norma Frazier and Sophomore Nancy Click

led the way for the Badgers with 17 a piece and Sophomore Sara Prasarn had 10 and Junior Kay Amerine added 5.

Slaton came out cold in the first quarter missing six straight shots but their defensive pressure held the Badgers at bay. The Badger's only lead of the night was at 3:14 left in the first quarter.

Slaton closed out the first quarter by going to their full court zone press and scored 8 unanswered points.

Norma Frazier pic kedup her fourth foul early in the third quarter and sat out seven minutes of that quarter. Slaton ran off to an 18 point lead by the end of the third quarter, Slaton had built their lead to 18. Slaton's defense and strong shooting kept the 18

point lead intact through the final stanza. The Merkel girls have now won two district 6-2A championships in a row, and they will be their last

Next year, the Badgers will be playing in a different district. That also means it will be the last time they will run up against the Slaton Tigers in the

The second quarter was a Slaton clinic on the press until 3:20 left in the half. Slaton had built up a 15 point lead but the Badgers came back with three quick baskets from Click inside and three jump shots by Frazier. the Badgers went in at half time down

Seniors Gwen Tarpley, Becky Watts, Gayla Bowerman and Sherry Ascencio played their last game for the Badgers Tuesday.

Although graduations will hurth next year's team, the Badgers will have four returning starters next year in Frazier, Click, Amerine and Prasarn, as well as Jackie Casey, Trish Powell, Judy Castille and Stacy Seymore returning from this year's varsity.

Merkel head coach Jan Averitt racked up the district championship in her first season here and she is already making plans for spring training.

The Merkel Badger girls team made it two in a row as they got by the Coahoma Bulldogs 46-41 at the Mabee complex at Hardin Simmons University in Abilene Saturday night.

The Badgers were forced into a playoff game for the district title after losing to Coahoma in the last game of the regular season. Norma Frazier's 24 point perfomance made the difference Saturday

The Badgers ran off to an eight point lead at the end of the first quarter, got to 13 ahead at the end of the half and stgarted turing the ball over in the fourth quarter to let the Coahoma girls get close.

Guard Gwenn Tarpley, who fouled out late in the game, led the team on the floor with hard passing and good defense. The other guard, Kay Amerine, got a few points on the fast break, and also played well on the defensive end.

But it was Frazier's 24 points that was the factor. Early in the second quarter, Frazier scored eight straight points on a back door play, set up by passes from Tarpley

At the end of the game, Coahoma fought back to within three before a long pass from Frazier to Jackie Casey who layed it in, secured the wit

The Badgers did not have long to rest on the win as they traveled to Snyder's Curry County Coliseum to prepare for their Tuesday showdown with two time state champion Slaton.

The district championship was Merkel's second in

two years following a 15 year domination of girls basketball by Wylie. The championship also was

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
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
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

site was discussed and hids were accepted. The big event, was what I have been mentioning in the past several columns. Bids were opened last Thursday and the respons was good. A bid was let and the contractor has 180 days to complete the Tye end of the Sewer collection system and then the City of Abilene will buidl a new lift station to complete the

A reminder to people considering running for mayor or city council. The filing deadline for city elections is March 5th. Our city election for these positions will be held in conjunction with the school election which will be held at Tye Elementary in

I am somewhat enthused regarding the progress of our city staying and following the complex sewer system program. It will finally become a reality. As for comments regarding roads and water, I feel that we should complete one project at a time and go on to the next top priority item. I would place the water system as the next project. Some of us have good service, others have it not so good. We will be forced to upgrade this system in the near future. 



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

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. -In today's world, it often seems that everything influences everything else. The current state of the U.S. economy and our lagging defense capability indicates the need for significant changes if which lie ahead. There is no question that a healthy economy and a strong defense are inter-related, and are of vital concern to our national

Following the end of World War II, the U.S. emerged as the undisputed leader and spokesman for the "Free West." At that time, the U.S. had unequalled productive capacity, economic strength, and a seemingly endless supply of resources within our own borders. Through shortsighted policies, however, we have failed to maintain this position of prominence. As a result, we are experiencing high inflation, a dependence on unstable foreign energy sources, and an inability to deal with the global and political events which are threatening our national secur-

Energy is, perhaps, the most serious issue facing the American people today. Current policies have tended to prolong our dependence on foreign energy sources, and have discouraged incentives for more domestic production. a strong military force which Short-sighted policies have was willing to assure access to prevented the U.S. from foreign resources. Our own developing alternate energy sources, have failed to stockpile energy reserves, and same thing.

have done nothing to reduce consumption of precious energy supplies No one will dispute the importance of maintaining and guaranteeing our oil supplies, and this can best be accomplished through which can only be provided

President Carter has proposed increasing defense expenditures by 41/2 percent a year in real terms (or beyond the rising costs which have occurred because of inflation) for the next five years. I think it is noteworthy that defense expenditures in the U.S., in real terms, have been lower in recent years than at any time since before the Korean War. Some will ask how our economy can possibly afford more government spending on defense, but not on social programs. The answer is simple: the survival of the country is not threatened by the scope or effectiveness of our social programs - it is threatened by our inability to provide for an adequate defense.

The United States can use its economic and military power to strongly influence the behavior of those who control foreign energy sources. Census begins March 11th

Beginning March 11 and continuing through March 28, enumerators will systematically canvass their assigned enumeration districts. Using the address list compiled by the Census Bureau, they will add any unlisted housing units and delete any demolished or otherwise nonexistent housing.

At each door they will ask for the name and telephone number; determine if a Spanish language questionnaire or other foreign language help is needed; and then leave the questionnaire, calling attention to the fact that it is to be filled out and mailed back on April 1 in the enclosed pre-addressed postage-paid envelope.

Householders will be sent a postcard in early April to remind them, if they have not already done so, to fill out and mail the questionnaire. Enumerators will contact, either by phone or in person those households that have not returned their completed questionnaires within a reasonable time.

This experiment of having enumerators drop of questionnaires, rather than having them mailed out, will be done in four other areas in the country. It is an entirely new census technique in which the Census Bureau seeks answers to several questions. Would enumerator delivery of questionnaires and reminder postcards improve return of completed questionnaires? Would listing of occupied and vacant housing units at the time questionnaires are delivered help to insure that none was missed? If the answer turns out to be "yes" to these questions, is the degree of improvement enough to make the method worth the extra cost?

This census district is one of the 385 throughout the land where the mail-back method is being used. But in those areas not in the experiment, the addressed questionnaires are delivered by mail on March 28 and no reminder postcard is sent. Here the mail carrier makes a time-of-delivery address check. The Census Bureau estimates that more than 90 percent of the U.S. population lives in these 385 mailback

There are 24 more census districts in which the remaining population lives. These areas are outside the large cities and their suburbs. On March 28, mail carriers will distribute unaddressed questionnaires to each residential mailbox. Householders are asked to fill them out and hold them for census takers who

will begin picking them up March 31. However, all districts are alike in one respect in that some households will fall into a sample and be asked to provide more information about each person and about the housing. In places of 2500 population or more, one-in-six households will be in the sample. In areas with populations of less than 2500, one in every two households will fall into the sample. This large sample in less populated areas is necessary in order to provide statistically adequate data for use as the basis for Federal revenue sharing program allocations. Households not in the sample will receive the "short" form which has seven population questions about each person and 12 housing questions about the dwelling

The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days before it is to be mailed back on April 1, or held for census taker pick-up, enables the family to fill it out in privacy, and when each member is likely to be present at some time and can provide accurate information about himself or herself and about the
