Santa Fe's 805 derails

Santa Fe's 805 freighter, heading from Sweetwater dto Brownwood derailed Thursday, six miles South of Merkel at the FM 126 crossing.

Santa Fe's district maintenance supervisor, Ray Hogan told the Mail at the scene "Right now, we don't have any idea what caused the accident" but Monday, Santa Fe Regional Public Relations Director Tom Murphy said "The cause of the derailment was a defect in the ribbon-rail and cost of the accident was \$28,650.00."

Eleven cars left the tracks at approximately 3 p.m. Thursday. Two chemical car-tankers were a part of the 17 car train and were both loaded with Liquified Petroleum Gas (LPG) but neither car derailed.

The Merkel Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene to put out a small grass fire started by flying sparks from the derailment.

Cars that derailed were loaded with wheat, cottonseed cake, and general cargo.

The maintenance superintendent seemed baffled at the accident. The first two cars behind the engine stayed on the track, the next three cars jumped the track, the next 4 stayed on, and the next eight cars left the track.

Hogan said "having spots between cars that leave the track during a derailment is not all that uncommon but what is strange about this accident is that it occured on a straight stretch of track, and a part of the line that is in better shape than any main line in thsi State."

Santa Fe crews had completely worked a stretch of the track between Merkel and Sweetwater just six months ago and Thursday's derailment tore up one quarter of a mile of that track.

Santa Fe dispatched heavy equipment and about 35 men from the Brownwood Yard Thursday afternoon and service was restored to the line after the accident.

The accident comes just short of four months since the last derailment in here. Santa Fe's 508 freighter derailed March 23rd six miles South of Merkel and two miles east of the sight of Thursday's accident.

Board sets budget workshop MISD board members set an Aug. 12 budget workshop and learned the district's evaluation had climbed to just over \$48 million at their monthly meeting Tuesday night. Superintendent Dr. Raymond Etheridge gave the \$48 million figure as a rough estimate. The 1979-80 evaluation was set at just over \$40 million. The increase in the evaluation was mainly attributed to an increase in costs of oil and gas. The superintendent said rough budget estimates call for a \$1.9 million operating budget for the 1980-81 school year and that early budget work indicates the district may be \$100,000 short on a \$1.9 million budget.

The superintendent added "There is one good picture, we did not budget any money rebated from the state because of lost revenues for homestead,

over 65 and ag land use exemptions." He added "The board has some very difficult decisions to make over the next month and I suggest that you hold a budget workshop so you can get a closer look at the financial situation.

The tax rate hearing was also set and is scheduled from 7 to 8 p.m. Aug. 19. Tax rate hearings are designed to allow thepublic a chance to air their views concerning the district's budget.

The current budget was ammended \$2,500 Tuesday night. If a school district over-spends it's budget in any particular category, the budget must be ammended.

The board also decided to retain the tax on automobiles. The board had tabled that resolution at their June meeting but decided unanimously to keep the tax. The tax brought in \$18,000 in revenues to the district last year.

Board members also learned that the current strike by a painting union is going to add to delays for the completion of the new high school. Maintenance supervisor Hayden Reeves told the board that the Middle School Gym, the Multi-Purpose room and the vo-ag center are ready for use. He also said the painter's strike is entering it's third week and that only a couple of workers have crossed the picket line at the new high school since the strike began.

Haney and Sivley Construction will not have to pay the \$100 a day late charge on days lost due to the strike. Dr. Etheridge added "It looks as though we won't be starting school this fall in the new high school

Beaver fires 1 hitter, Merkel downs Anson 3-1, play tonight

Benjamin Beaver fired a one-hitter Tuesday night



About one-quarter mile of track was damaged when Santa Fe's 805 freighter derailed six miles south of Merkel Thursday. Santa Fe crews worked through the night to get the track repaired and back in operation Friday.

The Merkel City Council tabled a rate increase request from Lone Star Gas and decided to take up the rest of the tab, for now, for building expenses from the new Reunion Shelter at the City Park, Thursday night.

Lone Star is seeking a 10.34 per cent rate increase and district manager Martha Harmon told council "I realize rate increases are not very popular items, but, put simply, our earnings are down and we need an increase.

The last rate increase for gas was put into effect in February, 1977. LSG is asking that the new rate take effect Aug. 12th. Also, LSG is asking for winter-summer gas rates.

The current rate is \$3 for the first 1,000 cubic feet of gas and \$2.80 per 1,000 cubic feet after that. The new rate asks for an approximate 12 per cent increase in winter months and an 8.4 per cent increase in the summer months.

Harmon told council that LSG's earnings returned 1.51 per cent return on investments and the new rate would allow a 6.5 per cent return.

Mayor Lou David Allen asked Mrs. Harmon what recourse the city has as well as the rate review authority of the Texas Railroad Commission. Mrs.

Harmon replied that the Railroad Commission would take up the rate hearing only if the city council and LSG does not reach an agreement concerning the amount of the rate increase and that all delays after the Aug. 12 target date would be passed along to customers once the Railroad Commission does determing the acceptable amount of increase.

Council also decided to pay the \$343.83 remaining in bills from construction expenses of the Reunion Shelter and Merkel's First Fun Day.

Chamber of Commerce manager Benny Melton told council "Actual cost of the building and Fun Day expenses totaled \$2,876.43 and have actually collected \$2,530.80. We have another \$275 in donations pledged that have not been collected and if all of that money comes in, we would only end up being \$69 shy.

Council had agreed in May to make up any deficit the Chamber encountered in building the Reunion Shelter at the City Park.

Accounts were paid totaling \$26,773.41 and council also received a letter from Jeanette Pursley thanking the city for providing a bus driver and gasoline for summer track program held at ACU. About 30 local youths participated in the program.

High of 103, low of 78

Council tables LSG rate request

You might as well turn the television off when it comes time for the weather forecasts of late. Fair and hot, with a high of 103 and a night-time low of 78. No chance of rain.

I heard on the noon news over KTAB that the recent hot spell in Texas would spell doom for 3,000 farmers and ranchers, who will be put permanently out of business.

Hot, dry weather is common in the Big Country, but it has rarely been this hot, for as many days. Already, Abilene has set 12 different all time high temperature readings.

Crops are burning, range land grasses are dying or already dead, and stock tanks, that haven't benefitted for the spotty rains of this season are drying up rapidly.

The forecast isn't so bright. We are heading into the traditionally hot part of the year and, with that time, poor chances for much rainfall.

It is a very typical Texas summer.

The painter's union strike has and will further delay the completion of Merkel High. Construction is already two months behind schedule and the strike virtually guaranteed what everyone had already suspected, that school will not open in the new building this year.

The strike issue with the painter's union is the lack of collective bargaining power for the union members. Question is, what kind of union is it, that does not have collective bargaining power and how

the heck do you settle a strike when one side does not have the authority to air their views.

It may be a long strike. Negotiations have not taken place since May 24 and none are currently scheduled.

Stephenville is the scene Friday night when Herbert Beaver and Danny Freeman will play in the Texas Six-Man All Star game. Beaver was an all state performer who gained 1700 yards this season at 15.1 yards per carry and Freeman was named to the all state team at defensive back, with 13 interceptions.

Electricity, was off for 37 minutes just as most folks were returning from church in parts of town, as of course, were air conditioners and fans.

Water pressure was low, and off at some locations starting Saturday evening and complete repairs were made by noon Monday. The motor failure cut the pumping capacity in half, according to Harris.

well as the Abilene and Sweetwater papers. An Abilene firm had earlier expressed interest in the job. Dr. Etheridge said "I am real sorry that we could not get the new lights in place. We will just have to fix and replace the existing lights and see if we can legally negotiate with a contractor for the lights.

June rebate drops


Merkel's rebate of the one per cent optional sales tax dropped this month, as compared to last June's total as the city received a check for \$1,352.00. Merkel's rebates are running four per cent ahead of the pace of last year. In 1980, Merkel has received \$22,207.04, compared

to \$21,217.19 at the same time last year.

Tye is maintaining an 11 percent increase for the year. Tye's June check was \$2,772.15 and Tye has been rebated \$22,837.28 so far this year.

Texas cities shared in \$25 million for their share of the one per cent Comptroller's Office. The release also said statewide rebates are running 20 per cent ahead of last year's pace.

The one per cent sales tax is collected by merchants with the state sales tax and is rebated on a monthly basis by the Comptroller's office.

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Use sun power to dry foods

COLLEGE STATION--Utilize that solar energy from those hot summer days to dry foods, advises Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist.

Most fruits or vegetables can be sun-dried, air-dried or dehydrated in a home dehydrator or oven, she points out.

Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Peppers are an easy vegetable to dry. Use the finished product, crumbled or powdered in a blender, as a spice in favorite foods.

Or, rehydrate diced, dried peppers to use in casseroles or soups, the specialist says.

When drying peppers in the sun, daytime temperatures must fall in the range of 85-90 degrees F. or higher. If nighttime temperatures drop to the point where dew forms, bring them indoors, Mrs. Sweeten instructs.

Large peppers are better if cut in half to dry-remove seeds, stems and membranes, or slice and cut into cubes.


Dry small peppers whole, but hasten the drying process by slicing the pepper with a knife, if you wish.

To dry, place the peppers on shallow wooden trays with slotted, perforated or woven bottoms which allow air circulation.

To prevent insects from contaminating the peppers, cover trays with cheese cloth.

Peppers are dry when they are brittle.

Store dried peppers in moisture-vapor-proof packaging in a cool, dry, dark place.

Trent water rates will double;

mandatory conservation in effect

The City of Trent has doubled the water rate and according to Trent mayor Zula Darby, the rate increase was necessary because the city of Sweetwater, who provides water to Trent, doubled their water rates in June.

According to mayor Darby, the Sweetwater decision to double the rates was intended to force conservation of the dwindling water supplies in Sweetwater.

The new rates will show up on the July bills that Trent residents will receive in early August. The minimum charge for the first 2,000 gallons will be \$12.50 and the charge per 1,000 gallons after the minimum will be \$3.

All conservation rules adopted by the Sweetwater City Council are also in effect in Trent as well. Mayor Darby said those rules include mandatory provisions prohibiting outside watering of lawns and

gardens, washing cars, or watering shrubbery.

Mayor Darby said conservation measures have never had to be taken by Trent residents because the Sweetwater water supply had always been ample. She said the city is currently seeking an alternative water delivery system, but they had found no new options.

She said she felt most of the Trent residents already knew about the rate increase and rationing rules but that city water consumption figures "are not going down any." She attributed the water consumption to the increased use of evaporative air conditioners during the dry spell and also said people

just normally use a lot more water when it is so hot. The Trent City Council adopted the new rates last month and if Trent residents have any questions, they are asked to call Zula Darby at 862-3324 or Mr. R.O. Payne at 862-2931.

More than 1000 car-train accidents occurred in Texas last year causing 71 deaths and 638 injuries.

Failure of motorists to exercise caution and accept individual responsibility for their own safety is the primary cause of these accidents.

Operation Lifesaver, inaugurated in Texas in 1977 by the Railroad Section of Texas Safety Association, is a nationwide public education program aimed at reducing grade crossing accidents. In a recent report from the National Transportation Safety Board, Chairman Jim King said, "Rail-highway crossing fatalities last year were down 17.5 percent. and state-by-state totals indicate the primary factor may be the spread and impact of statewide 'Operation Lifesaver' programs attacking this specific problem area."

Each of Texas' 14,700 public grade crossings, the highest number in the nation, is equipped with one or more of the "Lifesaver" signs- the octagonal stop sign, the X-shaped crossbuck, the yellow and black advance warning sign, flashing lights, bells and or automatic gates-- yet one-half of all grade crossing collisions are caused by drivers who ignore mechanical warning devices. Tom Murphy, state chairman of Operation Lifesaver, believes that although the railroads play a significant part ing the program, Operation Lifesaver is not strictly a railroad program. "Grade erossing safety is a public problem, a community problem. The Operation Lifesaver program needs involvement at all levels for utmost effectiveness: Railroads, state and local government, law enforcement, industry, news media and the general public." Operation Lifesaver urges all motorists to be aware of the most common causes of grade crossing

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accidents and know how to avoid them:

1. Impatient driver races train to crossing, misjudging train's speed. A freight train going 50 mph needs over a mile and a half to stop. Motorists should always stop and wait for a train to pass.

2. Driver ignores warning signs, often driving through flashing lights or lowered gates. Motorists should be alert for these signs and always slow down when approaching a grade crossing.

Driver is stopped at a multiple track crossing. As the train passes, driver starts across tracks without checking for trains on adjacent tracks. Motorists should not proceed across tracks until visibility is good and flashing lights have stopped.

Drivers who cross the same tracks everyday become too familiar with train scheduling and are not cautious at crossing. Nearlky all grade crossing accidents occur within 25 miles of the driver's home. Motorists should approach every crossing as if a train were coming.






