Badgers lose, Anson Tigers next

The Merkel Badgers scored two touchdowns against Hamlin here last Friday night but it was not enough as Hamlin went on to win 33-13.

The Badger touchdowns, both scored in the fourth quarter, were the first touchdowns of the year for the Badgers.

The first touchdown came on a faked field goal attempt as Randy Martin fired a touchdown pass of nine yards to Willie Marsh. Marsh added the

The Badgers second touchdown was scored by quarterback Sammy Tumlinson on a two yard keeper with 34 seconds remaining in the game.

Hamlin got 179 yards rushing out of Willie Johnson, as well as a 50 yard touchdown, but other than that, it was all quarterback Mike Davis of Hamlin as he scored the other three touchdowns.

Badger coach Byron Shelley told the Mail Monday he was happier with the way the Badgers moved the football on offense and said "We have to get all of our defensive players playing good defense at the same time. They had the ball inside our 20 nine times, but we fought them off five of those times, we played well defensively in spots, but made mistakes at the wrong time.

Coach Shelley expressed optimism for the Badgers next four games. He said "We have Anson, Rotan, Hawley and Albany left and we feel like we should win two, have a 50-50 shot at another. Our kids finally scored a touchdown and that should provide some confidence.

Shelley said he was pleased with the offensive

performances of Randy Martin who caught three passes for 88 yards and threw a touchdown pass, Willie Marsh, who caught four passes, one for a touchdown, and the offensive blocking of Allen Allbright and Billy Walters.

On defense, Shelley said he was happy with the play of James Turner, Bart Pursley, and Sal Acosta.

As far as Anson is concerned, Coach Shelley said they are a big team but he feels their pass defense is lacking.

He said the Badgers would be throwing the ball, because their front seven men play very close to the line of scrimmage and they are

always ready for the rushing play.

Anson has a record of 2-4 and are 1-3 in district play. They are lead offensively by running back Charlie Dickerson and by split end Derrel Jackson. Their defense is anchored by 280 pound tackle Kyle Martin.

Shelley said the Badgers would have to "Control the line of scrimmage, stop the run, and throw the ball well" to beat Anson.

Kickoff in that game is 7:30 in Anson In other football action last week Hamlin JV popped the Badger JV 40-14, the 8th grade was shut out 20-0, and the 7th grade lost 12-6.

Today's (Thursday) football games have been changed to allow for work on football field lights. The Merkel Junior Varsity will play in Anson at

5 p.m., the 7th grade will play at 7 p.m. and the 8th grade will play at 8 p.m. The Mail has been told the football field lights will be in place for next Friday's home game against Rotan.

Dear Editor, elections coming

Dear Editor:

The time for the General Election is upon us-November 4th, a Tuesday. The ballot is long and the choice of candidates are numerous, listed among four (4) political parties, if you treat the Independent group as a political party for voting purposes. But when the voter has waded through the candidates, including in some voter boxes, write-in candidates, there remains more decisions yet!

The balfot will contain nine (9) Amendments to the Texas State Constitution for the voter to decide. It will be in the voters best interest to study the amendments before arriving at the polling place. The amendments are of necessity listed in the briefest of terminology on the ballot. Their subject matter, however, is much more involved and complicated. It will be virtually impossible for a voter to be able to become adequately informed about the amendments while turning the several pages of the general election ballot within the confines of the voting booth and punching out their weighted decisions onto the ballot card. Various newspapers have carried a pro and con discussion of the amendments in earlier publications. There have been other media which have explained the amendments. On election day, you will thank

World cotton crop set

at 63.4 million bales

The world crop at 63.4 million bales means a drop of about 2.1 million from 1979 levels. Both Russia and China have somewhat better cotton crops this year.

While most producers are currently enjoying stronger cotton prices, the market's strength may soften once cotton users adjust their demand to higher price levels," says Anderson. "Some mills are already building up excessive inventories of unsold goods and have cut work weeks to three or four days.

Average daily spot prices for Strict Low Middling 1- 1-16 inch cotton in mid-September were some 30 cents a pound about last year's prices, notes the economist. However, this year's drouth has reduced the staple length of a lot of cotton, leading to price discounts of 10 to 20 cents under SLM 1 1-16 inch cotton.

While domestic use of cotton is expected to be off about a half million bales this year, exports may drop more than three million. This will put domestic use as well as exports at some six million bales each for a total disappearance of 12 million bales. U.S. cotton exports of 9.2 million bales during the 1979-80 season were the largest

With this year's expected crop of 11.7 million bales or less, carryover next August may be substantially under the three million bales remaining after the 1979 crop.

Despite some slackening in the demand for cotton both at home and abroad, the market should remain strong for at least a few months,' believes Anderson.

Tax rebates drop

much faster in your favor if you will.

The bottom fell out of Merkel's September rebate according to a news release from the state comptroller's office.

Merkel's September check will be \$1,436.81 compared to \$4,048.38 the same period last year. The drop in payment also moved the year to date figures from 8 per cent above average to 6 per cent less than was paid to the city last year. Merkel has received \$32,845.52 so far this year, compared to \$35,151.81 the same period last year.

Tye's rebate continued to show 11 per cent growth as they received a check for \$3,609.77 for their monthly rebate. That compared to last year's September check of \$2,721.00. So far this year, Tye has received \$36,767.72 compared to \$32,893.79 through the period last year.

Trent has shown an increase of \$85 over last years payments of \$1,715.03 with payments to date totaling \$1,801.15.

Texas cities shared in \$446.9 million in rebates. The rebates are derived from cities that carry the optional one per cent sales tax. Store owners report and pay sales tax to the state comptroller's office, and monthly, one per cent of the tax collected by the state, is returned to the city in which it was spent.


