Merkel ousted from 8AA

You might say Merkel is a school without a district, officially, for the moment.

The University Interscholastic League in Austin informed MISD last week by letter that the executive committee had met and decided Merkel should be moved to AAA as soon as possible for all sports and UILevents excluding football.

At a district meeting Tuesday at Region 14 Education Service Center in Abilene, District 8AA voted to oust Merkel from 8AA. Merkel High principal Allen Merritt spke with the district chairman from 7AAA, and he said they would formally decide the issue December 7th. A straw poll conducted by the 7AAA chariman indicated only one school would oppose the change.

City will start charging for landfill use Jan. 1

The ordinance adopted at the Merkel City Council meeting last Monday sets penalties and fines for persons that do not properly use the Merkel Sanitary landfill.

In last week's Mail, we printed a list of fees that will be collected for using the landfill for all people that do not live in the city limits.

This week, the Mail is printing the rest of the ordinance.

The ordinance reads as follows:

Payment of the Refuse Disposal Service fee shall be made by presentation and surrender to the refuse disposal divison at the designated disposal area of a ticket purchased from the utilities office of the City of Merkel. The City Utility Office shall provide for advanced sale of tickets to be used by persons disposing of refuse as payment for the said refuse disposal fees. Section II. Waiver of Fees

The City Utility office shall have the authority to waive fees on a need basis to non-profit groups who are performing clean-up campaigns.

Secion III. Setting of hours and days for operation.

The City Council of the City of Merkel does hereby set the hours of public disposal of the city's landfill to be from 7:00 AM-12:00 noon and 1:00 PM-4:00 PM Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday-Friday and Saturday. Landfill to be closed Sunday and Monday. Section IV. Closing of Landfill.

The City utility department shall have the authority to close the City Landfill for public disposal during periods of inclimate weather such as high winds, rain, snow, or ice storms.

Section V. Scavengering. Any and all acts of scavenging at the landfill are hereby prohibited by any and all persons. Section VI. Engress-Egress

Any person other than City of Merkel Personal not in the act of disposal of refuse shall obtain written permission from the City utility office before entering said landfill site. That if any provision of any section of this ordinance shall be held to be void or unconstitutional, such holding

Mr. Lassiter's idea is a valid one and that is basically the way the community celebrated the golden calvacade and Merkel's 75th anniversary of it's founding in 1956.

Then, the community organized a celebration and hired a professional consultant to come up with a play depicting the community's history.

The Mail would certainly like to see a copy of the script that was used in 1956 and we believe that local resources could be used to put on what ever type of pageant that will depict our historical background.

A couple of moves must first be made. A local centennial celebration committee needs to be organized, and sanctioned by the Merkel City Council, The Merkel Chamber of Commerce, and the Merkel Independent School District Board of Trustees

Once that centennial committee is formally organized and recognized by the various local governing bodies, committments of time, resources and promises of help could be obtained

The Mail would like to suggest from the start that the centennial celebration be either held with or comfortably separated from the Fun Day festivities held on July 4th. Last year was the first Fun Day celebration and it had enormous success. That celebration also required two months of dilligent preparation, the centennial celebration would require at least that much preparation. The Mail suggest that either late August or July 4th be used because a date earlier would conflict with all of the summer youth baseball here.

It will take more than the interests of a couple of folks here to make the centennial celebration successful. If you are interested, please contact Mr. Lassiter or the Mail. The Mail will seek a spot on the agenda with

the Merkel City Council next Monday night to guage the council's feeling on the proposed celebration.

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Writer suggests celebration

Dear Editor:

The Centennial of Merkel, Texas, Identifiable as a community, will be in 1981. It was in 1881 that a Mr. S.H. Merkel came to make his home in this part of Taylor County and he gave his name to the community, so Merkel became a recorded spot on the map. Taylor County had been created in 1859 by an act of the Texas Legislature, carved from the counties of Bexar and Travis. We, the people of Merkel, joined by residents of its trade territory, ought to mark the 100th year of our town with proper and appropriate ceremony and celebration. Whatever expression of recognition is chosen, one which includes the participation of all the people of Merkel and its trade territory should be implemented. There are various methods by which proper recognition may be expressed. I would submit a scenario depicting the general life style and major accomplishments of the people, covering the period from the creation of Taylor County, 1859 to 1981, broken down into detailed eras of 20 years: 1859-1879 (The Pre-Community Period); 1880-1900 (The Formative Period); 1900-1920 (City Charter, Trade and Business Expansion, World War Period); 1920-1940 (Post War Adjustments, Drought, Economic Depression Period); 1940-1960 (War Jitters, War Hardships, Rural Electricity, Pipe Lined Water, Modernization, Paved Roads, Economic Recovery Period); 1981 (Happy Birthday!).

Each of these eras could be presented with local talent in the form of a Pageant. To 'Flesh' out the eras in desired detailed portrayls, commentary and film could be used. The setting for the presentation of the Pageant could be the Football Field with the stands for the spectators. The year 1981 is upon us! I trust there is someone or group in the greater Merkel community who will share their plan of how to honor our 'Town Of 100 Years'.

Dye earns GED



(c) Public Research, Syndicated, 1980

The Republican victory of 1980 will have a major effect upon the American political system for years to come. Liberal, anti-business legislation, like Ralph Nader's Corporate Democracy Act, are dead for this Congress and probably for the rest of the decade. But while the McGovern brand of liberalism may appear to have been firmly trounced in the Republican Senate and the conservative Democratic House of Representatives, we may expect to see it rear its head through that fourth branch of government often overlooked by political reformers, the independent regulatory agencies. Regulations issued by these agencies have the binding force of law and can only be revoked by the agencies themselves or, in rare cases, by a court.

As President, Ronald Reagan will quickly learn that controlling the independent regulatory agencies is no easy task. Creations of Congress, these agencies are responsible directly to that body, but even then only marginally. Like profligate children, they return yearly to Congress for additional funding and, like the busy but saddened parent it is, Congress reaches deep into the taxpayers' pockets to reward its offspring. With their funding thus secured, the agencies are then free to direct their own regulatory policies and prosecute whom they please. Particularly aggressive agencies like the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission can execute wide ranging guidelines that force businesses to go absurd lengths to avoid appearing the slightest bit discriminatory in their employment practices. Like many of the other independent regulatory commissions, the EEOC can choose which regulations it will enforce vigorously and which it will leave on the back burner. In short, the independent regulatory agencies draw up their own legal agendas and

Democratic Party will likely live on long after the Republicans have assumed their new seats in the House and Senate.

Another roadblock President Reagan will have to surmount is the existence of an activist, liberal, federal judiciary, one that will lend a sympathetic ear to liberal complaints from the public interest law community outside of government and the well placed liberal bureaucrats within it. President Carter has appointed nearly 40 percent of this country's 678 federal judges, and unlike agency appointments, these positions carry life tenure.

The new administration, promising to sweep away many of the regulations of the last ten years, may expect constant court battles with the emboldened public interest movement of the Left which will be undergoing a transition all its own. It is likely that radical, Naderite "public interest" law firms will grow over the next few years to absorb many of the thousands of liberal politicians, lawyers, and bureaucrats who will be in search of jobs after Inauguration Day January

Rejecting the American voters' November verdict on their policies of regulation, interven-tion, and control, the public interest groups on the Left will begin a new activist campaign in the courts as well as in the media to safeguard their policies and preserve a remnant of their accomplishments. Swelling armies of public interest lawyers will intervene in agency proceedings, file court challenges to slow economic development, harass business and challenge Reagan inspired deregulations. This wave of increased public policy lobbying and confrontation will shortly emerge to rock Reagan's presidency and to make any progress of the new administration slow and elusive.


Republicans, Independents and moderate Democrats have won an extraordinary victory in 1980, one that promises to transform the face of American politics. But the victors of this election should not forget that our system is one which prevents any Party from immediately translating election results into policy changes. A full

of federal regulatory agencies. Only by paying close attention to the independent federal bureaucracy can Mr. Reagan expect to enjoy the full fruits of a landslide victory at the polls.
