fines for persons that do not properly use the fines for persons that

operation. The City Council of the City of Merkel doe
hereby set the hours of public disposal of the city's landfill to be from 7:00 AM-12:00 noon and 1:00 PM-4:00 PM Tuesday-Wednesday-Thursday Friday and Saturday. Landfill to be closed Section IV. Closing
The City utility department shall have the
authority to close the City Landfill for authority to close the city landill
