several options on the choosing of a new plan, at no additional costs, wer discussed by the members. It was decided to go with a plan which would be more heipfuil are prestly serving the county. The commissioners accepted the results of the voting on the constitutional amendments for the county.

supply a clothing need which one of the subjects had.
Sheriff Bill Morgan was on hand to bring up the possibility of creating a Crime Stoppers program in the

The program would reward informants only for their information leading to the arrest and conviction of criminals.
