Top news & events of 1931,27,1925

The history of the next 10 year period will be rather spotted because Mail files are missing from 1930, 1929, 1928, and 1926. This week's copy will look at the top news and events of 1931, 1927 and 1925.

There are some unmistakeable events that occured in 1929 with the stock market crash and the general-nationwide depression of the early thirties and late twenty's.

We are again asking for detailed information concerning events from 1930, 1929, 1928 and 1926.

January-1931

Burl Wheller of Merkel was sworn in as Taylor County Sheriff. The state school attendance law went into effect. Prominent rancher and businessman Clyde Sears was buried here. A Noodle Creek well reported testing at 100 barrels per day. A new Ford Tudor Sedan sold for \$695 tops. A mass meeting was set to hear details of the new federal relief loan program.

Bob McDonald, Bob Mayfield, H.T. Rice and E.H. Cordell won grand championships at the Merkel Poultry Show. Texas Counties announced they would provide money for farm loans.

March
Merkel pioneers Allen Reed Cox and James
Doan funeral services were held here. A fire
severly damaged the Trent School. Favorite
Trent Cowboy, John Bowman, winner of the 1930
Rodeo Association Champion Cowboy, was
honored with John Bowman day in Trent. The
Merkel Volunteer Fire Department won praise
for their work in holding a blaze at the Sinclair
Refinery here to \$3,500 in damages.

Chicago based chewing gum magnate William Wrigley announced he was planning to purchase 100 million pounds of cotton for 12 cents per pound. Former Merkel resident H.C. Burroughs was elected to the Dallas City Council.

May
A news story in the Abilene Morning News
stated 40 per cent of Merkel's population
regularly attended church services. Merkel
resident, W.M. Elliott, was elected to his first
term as mayor. Jim McDonald, a pioneer Merkel
businessman, passed away.

June
The Mail reported Al Capone's conviction on a
variety of charges on the front page. Merkel
farmers had already shipped 16 car loads of
wheat

July Arthur Thornton, who came here in 1883, died. Merkel school, for the first time, set accreditation standards in all subjects offered.

August
A major fracas started between Abilene merchants and the Merkel Lion's Club when Abilene merchants offered a \$500 prize for the first bale of cotton delivered to Abilene. Merkel farmer, Elbert Dean, turned in that bale and received only \$55.96. The Lion's Club printed a ¼ page challenge in the Mail for Abilene merchants to live up to their promises. Dee Teaff brought Merkel's first bale that year.

September
Ed Lancaster won the annual Merkel Golf Club
championship.

President Herbert Hoover's six point prosperity plan gained world-wide recognition. The Mail reported Thomas Edison's death.

November Wheat prices reached a two year high at 70

December
Uncle Bill Sheppard, a Merkel merchant since
1890, was buried here. The trail of Merkel banker

R.O. Anderson started. He was charged with embezzlement.

embezzlement. January-1927

A Noodle Creek well was potentialed at 500 barrels per day. The Mail was calling Joe Winter the Noodle Creek Oil King when one well on his property earned him \$14,000 in royalities in four months. The well produced 65,344 barrels in the four month period. The Mail mast line read, All the Authentic news of the Noodle Creek Field. Mellinger's store was hit by robbers, that took \$1,500 worth of goods. J.C. Mason's lease at Noodle Creek had a 1,500 barrel per day producer.

The Merkel Chamber of Commerce built a road between Merkel and the Noodle Creek oil field.

March
The Queen Theater announced they were about
to install Merkel's first large electric sign.

A huge fire in Trent's business district caused \$100,000 in damages. Texas began requiring all sheriffs to be uniformed when they made an arrest.

The 17th well to be brought to production started flowing in Noodle Creek. Merkel citizens passed \$20,000 in paving bonds. Merkel High graduated 32 seniors.

June

The Noodle Creek field added three more producers bringing the total to 20 with daily production set at 2,000 barrels.

The city announced a contract with Community Gas in Dallas for natural gas. T&P announced they would make side track additions here. The Mail announced Charles Lindbergh would be in Abilene.

August

W.A. Shepard turned in Merkel's first bale. Merkel cotton buyers were paying the highest price in West Texas-22.10 cents according to the Abilene Merning News.

September
Merkel cotton weigher, Thomas Bearden,
reported daily earnings of area cotton farmers at
\$3,000. T.J. Toombs, a pioneer Merkel citizen,
was buried here. Merkel school dismissed Sept.
26th so students could see Charles Lindbergh.

Gas mains constructed by Community Gas were completed at a cost of \$55,000. The city announced it would build a new City Hall. A petition was being circulated through Oak Street residents to have that street paved. A Merkel coach and seven chemistry students were burned when phosphuros ingited in the science lab. December

A record bootleg liquor haul was made in Jones County. January-1925

R.O. Anderson and W.L. Diltz purchased the Farmers State Bank here.

February
Mrs. M.J. Lowe was killed in a house fire on
Oak Street.

Planter's Gin here burned to the ground. Most of Elm Street was burned down in a fire that caused \$100,000 damages. A Mexican national, who killed constable George Reeves and Big Spring Sheriff W.W. Satterwhite, was killed in a massive manhunt. The Mail reported the mexican was being charged with the murder of another Mexican national. After a two day search, with about 2,000 people looking, the man was cornered in a rail car near Ovalo and the car

When the availability of fuel becomes more important to agricultural producers than the price, Texas A&M engineers will be able to tell them all about an available alternate fuel-ethyl alcohol or ethanol.

The engineers have been running a research and demonstration ethanol production plant for the last five months. It produces 184 proof alcohol from grain through a series of fermentation and distillation processes. It's just a matter of cooking the alcohol up, as Henry O'Neal explains.

To this point, we have used only grain sorghum and corn as the feedstock for making alcohol," O'Neal says. "The general process is to, first, grind the grain, put it into a cooker, add water and add an enzyme to keep the mixture liquid during the heating process.

"This mash is heated to just below boiling and cooked for about an hour. Then it is cooled down to between 95 degrees and 100 degrees F. Another enzyme is added to change the starch to sugar, then yeast is added to begin the fermentation of the sugar.

It's allowed to ferment for three to four days, after which we have an alcohol concentration of about 10 percent.

"We will be using the alcohol we produce in a 1,000-hour engine test," O'Neal says, "so we can get a feel for any out-of-the-ordinary wear or maintenance that might have to be taken into account if we're going to use this alcohol as a fuel under long-term conditions.

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

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Basic test scores will be announced

Results of the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests taken by Trent ISD third, fifth, and ninth grade students last February will be presented at the June 8 meeting of the Trent Independent School District board of trustees.

The 8:00 p.m. session will be held at Trent School Tax Office. Roy Neff, district superintendent, will present the results and a detailed analysis of what they may mean for future planning and programs. "While district and campus aggregate scores will be reported to the public, individual results will be released only to the student, parents, or guardian, and school personnel directly involved," Neff points out. Some 700,000 third, fifth, and ninth grade students participated in this second statewide assessment required under Senate Bill 350 passed

by the Texas Legislature during its 1979 session. Detailed analysis of the test results will include scores compiled according to ethnic background, sex, and whether or not the student is enrolled migrant or other programs for the disadvantag-

"Particular emphasis will be given on plans already underway to work on improved programs for both individual schools and students next year," Neff explains. These programs and their related costs will be supported by state compensatory education funds made available under Senate Bill 350. "Our purpose is to develop more effective ways of teaching children," Neff says. "We believe the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills results will give us the specific data we need to better meet student needs." Neff said much of the planning and advanced work to be completed this summer will point toward curriculum and other changes to be implemented next September.

"Materials to be presented at the Trent board meeting will include summary reports and other information designed to better inform school patrons concerning the district's needs for improvement," Neff added.



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
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
