(Continued from Page 1 I farm 620 acres of dryland cotton and some 50 acres of irrigated. I have 32 mother cows and
200 head of ewes, plus some 100 head of lambs, I 200 head of ewes, plus some 100 head of lambs,
am holding 1770 bales of 1973 cotton that wasn't
ginned until February of this year when the ginned until February of this year when the
market was going down and it's gone down every day since
"These 170 bales of cotton in January, if you could have gotten them ginned, would have been
worth 63 cents per pound, now they are worth 42 cents per pound.
"Those 32 (two year old) cows were worth $\$ 300$ per head last October and calves another $\$ 250$
making pairs being $\$ 500$ to $\$ 600$ Now a young cow might bring $\$ 200$ if there was any market and a calf $\$ 100$; maybe, if there is a
market Steers have droped in the last six weeks market. Steers have dropped in the last six weeks
from 41 cents to 24 cents here. from 41 cents to 24 cents here.
$\$ 50$ per head now are bringing $\$ 16$ wer worth Lambs last fall brought 60 cents per lb . and now are only worth 35 cents, maybe These would be "Wool brought
worth only 50 cents to 60 cents. "Hogs six weeks ago brought as much as 50
cents per lb. and now are down to cents per lb. and now are down to 4 cents.
"On top of all this, we are sitting in an area that is dry. Very little cotton has been planted and what has isn't doing any good since our dryland moisture is very limited. Many acres in this area haven't been planted at all due to dry
weather.
"Now all these things I have mentioned should tend to disgust a fellow farmer, but we have to live with this from day to day. Yesterday
afternoon we ruined a front tractor tire size $7: 50$ $x 16,6$-ply, and my supplier says he doesn't have any and doesn't know when he can get one. (Shortage). This, to me, is the most absurd thing
I have ever come across-- a shortage of tractor tires.
"This one item alone has put my operation to a standstill. I can't feature a $\$ 120$ tire (that used to
be $\$ 50$ ) being short when they are made for the be $\$ 50$ ) being short when they are made for the
American farmer to keep him productive. Securing replacement parts for tractors (farm) is almost impossible. It's an out and out rout of the American farmer who has seen a lot more famine than feast and seemingly
his fair share of unmitigated hell.
"What in thunder is the American public (industry or whoever) trying to do to us as a producer--make us quit?
"The banks have upped my interest from $71 / 2$ to 11 percent in less than a year, fuel costs have doubled, I tell you we can't operate for long under these circumstances if we can't get some
relief on the market end. We are living in an era relief on the market end. We are living in an era
of depressed markets, inflationary prices, high

Information on the Form 1099s should be provided to income recipients by Feb. 1. Form 1099s are information returns that are during the tax year to another person in the course of trade or business. Several variations of Form 1099 relate to payments of interest, rents, royalties, fees, commissions and other compen-
sations for services to persons other than employees.
"Many agricultural producers make payments to others in their normal course of business, and these should be reported on a Form 1099," says
Lovell. "An exception is if the recipient of a payment is a corporation.
Agricultural producers also have until Jan. 31 to file Form 943 (Employer's Annual Tax Return
for Agricultural Employees). This is required if an employers withholds and pays Social Security laxes or if he withholds income taxes under
voluntary withholding agreements on farm labor voluntary withholding agreements on farm labor wages paid during the tax year. If timely tax
deposits were made, an employer has until Feb. 10 to file Form 943.
Lovell suggests that farmers and ranchers consult their tax advisors and review the X" available from the IRS to learn more about recent changes in tax laws and the various tax forms and deadlines for filing.
