County group stresses need for new jail

Taylor County Sheriff John Middleton said he would not guarantee Merkel and Tye city prisoners could be housed in the proposed \$8.9 million jail, but said, when it comes to the federal courts and the state jail standards commission, noone could make too many guarantees.

Middleton's comments came at a public meeting held here last week that drew a light crowd.

The meeting was held by county and private concerns to explain the proposed new county jail and juvenile detention center,

Middleton told the Mail, "the new facilities will have enough space for the coun y commission to extend their contract with Merkel and Tye to house prisoners.

According to James Wheeler. project architect, the jail is designed to meet the needs of the county until the year 2000. He also said the jail is designed to make expanding the jail a simple process if it is needed.

Taylor County officials have appeared before the state jail standards commission on hree occasions in the pase six mon hs o explain what is being done abou building a new jail or remodeling the current jail o meet sale standards.

Taylor County Commissioner Downing Bolls said plumbing maintenance alone in the old jail is costing the county about \$1,500 per month and Sheriff Middleton said they even have problems getting the bars on some cells opened and closed.

The state objects mostly to overcrowding in he jail according to the sherift.

The state jail standard commission postponed any actions concerning Taylor County until after the March 20 bond vote,

The sheriff told the audience the standards commission would probably limi the county to housing about 50 inmates if the bond issue fails. Current jail populations is ar id 90 per da Retiring Precinct 2 Commi oner Joe McDutf said he hoped people did no end he mee ing because they were ready to vote. County officials had no better luck in Abilene Wednesday, as the town hall hearing there only drew three voters.

Council opens alley, sets meeting

The Merkel City Council began land acquisition for the new water chlorinator station, payed \$125,078.91 in HUD funds for construction projects, opened an alley and set a special meeting Friday for election-related decisions.

Major expenditures under HUD funds went to Rhodes Pipe-\$68,387, Hawkins Air Conditioning-\$13,000, Dean Jones Construction-\$18,000 and Lone Star Construction-\$15,467

The city also began the legal proceedings for buying a 20 x 24 foot plot of land for the city water chlorination station and passed a resolution stating their interest to purchase the land.

The city also decided to open an alley in Block E of the Martin Addition. The city wanted the alley opened to allow for easier trash pick-up but a local citizen sponsored the item. A small portable building, not on a foundation, will have to be moved a few feet but the owner has already agreed to the move.

Cotton reduction? Experts agree Texas, U.S. farmers must comply with 15% acerage

reductions to control surplus

Most Texas cotton farmers will likely participate in the 15 percent acreage reduction program recently announced by the Secretary of Agriculture.

While participation is voluntary, farmers must comply if they wish to be eligible for tar, price projection and Commodity Credit Corporation loans on their 1982 cotton crop. And that's incen ive enough.

"Cotton farmers in Texas as well as in other s a es really have little choice but to participate in the program," believes Dr. Carl Anderson, cotion marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Farmers are faced with a poor price ou look for this year's crop due to surplus cotton supplies," he says. "So they really need the price protection offered by the program, especially with current prices hovering near the loan rate."

Cotton farmers are geining their first deficiency payments in history on their 1981 crop because the average market price fell below the largel price of 70.87 cents a pound. The largel price for the '82 crop will be 71 cents a pound, and farmers will likely get another deficiency payment unless something happens to strengthen the market, notes the economist. The '82 loan rate will be 57.08 cents for Base Grade 41-Staple 34, Mike 35-49 Upland cotton.

To illustrate the bleak price situation that cotton farmers face, Anderson points out that the price of Upland cotton averaged 50 cents a pound in mid-January compared to 76.60 cents in January of 1981

"This was brought on mainly by a bumper U.S. crop last year that was the largest since 1953," he says. "At the same time, domestic use of cotton has slackened so that carryover on August 1 is expected to be around six million bales-more than double last year's level.'

As far as the acreage reduction program is concerned. Anderson says that farmers must reduce their plantings by at least 15 percent of their established cotton acreage base-the higher of their '81 acreage or the average of the '80-'81 acreages. However, where farms have been following a definite rotation pattern, the base will reflect such rotations.

Land taken out of production must be eligible cropland and must be devoted to conservation uses. It may be grazed except during the six principal growing months.

"Neither off-setting compliance or cross-compliance is a requirement in the program," adds the economist. "This means that farmers owning or operating more than one farm will not be required to participate on all farms to obtain program benefits on participating farms. Also, farmers need not participate in the Upland cotton program to qualify for program benefits on other crops. Of course, the \$50,000 limitation on program benefits remains in effect."

Cotton farmers can obtain additional information about specific provisions of the acreage reduction program from their local ASCS offices. says Anderson.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with rule 052.01.00.043(a) of the Public Utility Commission of Texas' Rules of Practice and Procedure, Continental Telephone Company of Texas announces it has petitioned the Commission for increased rates to offset costs associated with a change in accounting for inside station connection costs.

The increase is the result of an order by the Federal Communications Commission, directing telephone companies to expense certain station connection costs in their accounting procedures. The increase in rates to result from the accounting change will produce an increase of less than one half of one percent in gross intrastate revenues of the Company. The increase will not affect monthly recurring charges but will be reflected as an additional element to nonrecurring service connection charges when a premise visit is required.

In a separate action, Continental Telephone Company has petitioned the Public Utility Commission to amend its tariff by adding a \$7.50 service charge for each check returned to the Company unpaid due to insufficient funds. The new service charge is intended to offset costs of administering unpaid checks and will affect gross revenues by approximately \$35,000 annually.

The effective date of these rate changes will be based upon approval by the Public Utility Commission.



As the clinic is aimed at strengthening the area youth's ability in the equestrien world, the clinic is not limited to youth and is open to adults as well.





Reagan V. Brown said. "To have safe use of pesticides in the state, we have been very conscientious in enforcing EPA regulations as well as Texas laws through our testing and investigations."

Since 1979, the EPA and the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) have been working under a grant agreement, primarily initiated to eliminate duplication of duties.

In the fiscal year 1981 the Department made inspections on 646 formal complaints of possible pesticide or herbicide damage. Of these 154 were valid.
