

Excel Friona Awarded \$75 Million Defense Contract

Representative Larry Combest issued a release today announcing that the U.S. Defense Commissary Agency awarded a \$75,298,608 contract to the Excel Corporation of Wichita, Kansas.

Combest said, "This funding will be used to provide fresh beef to our nation's commissaries and our armed forces. Because the beef will be processed and supplied by the Excel plant in Friona, Texas, our beef industry will benefit greatly from this contract.

Steve Thompson, general manager of Excel-Friona stated, "We are pleased to have been awarded this contract. We have participated in this program for a number of years and look forward to successfully fulfilling our contract."

The award will be used to provide fresh beef for delivery to the Defense Commissary Agency's Northern Area, Eastern Region commissary stores. The beef will be produced in Excel's Friona plant and shipped to commissaries in the northeastern region of the United States. The contract completion date is September 30, 2001.

Thompson said because Excel had the small contract to supply beef to the armed forces for a few years, their excellent performance led to the granting of this major contract.

The contract actually began on Monday, October 16. Thompson said the shipments began this week and would average about 50 truckloads and 2 million pounds of beef a week



THERE ARE NO WORDS to describe the fall tour of New England back roads that we took last week with over 50 other folks from this area. Since most supermarkets are chains these days, they say it is more cost efficient to have steaks and other cuts such as roasts, wrapped and ready to put in the display case when they arrive at the store.

About the closest you can get to a meat market these days are those fancy deli counters which serve up potato salad, cole slaw or slices of honey baked ham.



You might want to clip the rest of this column and carry it around in your coupon holder for reference. Even if you already know about steaks, you could sure impress folks by using some of these steak terms. Here goes.

Steak is all about flavor Then he wrapped it in and texture. A good butcher in one piece of meat.

about marbling but you don't want too much of it. Really big streaks of fat won't melt all the way into the meat as it cooks.

For maximum juice look for fine streaks of fat throughout and a nice thick layer around the outside doesn't hurt either. It'll keep the edges moist.

Whether you cook on a grill or in a cast iron pan, always wait six or seven minutes before cutting into hot steaks: that way the juices will stay in the meat.

A RIB EYE is the perfect summer steak. Its easy to cook and the fat keeps it juicy. This is the one for spice rubs and barbecue sauce. Always grill rib eyes.

The PORTERHOUSE is the most impressive steak you can serve. You get the best of all worlds. Flavorful sirloin on one side, butter-soft filet on the other and a big bone for the dog. Rub a little butter on it and cook it medium rare.

Women like FILET small enough to seem feminine and you can't see any fat on it. Good texture but not a lot of flavor. Press coarse-ground pepper and kosher salt into it before cooking.

When its just you and some friends, FLANK STEAK, SKIRT STEAK, AND HANGER STEAK are cuts. Marinate them in soy sauce, red wine, garlic or ginger. Cook them to almost medium, slice thin and make steak salad. If you don't have a personal butcher like George and all this is too much to remember, you can do like I do and hustle up to K-Bob's or Big Texan. Here's to you, George!





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

Clinic Set In Friona

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a breast cancer screening clinic at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue in Friona on November 6.

A minimum of fifteen women need to register for mobile mammography clinics to come to area towns. Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammo-gram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening mammogram. Each woman will gram. Each woman will receive a breast health risk appraisal and individual instruction by an RN in breast self-examination. 

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

Florence Schlenker Observes Her 100th Birthday At Prairie Acres

Florence Dorsey celebrated her 100th birthday Tuesday, October 10 at Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona. The following is a brief summary of her life history.

Florence Amelia Schlenker Dorsey was born October 11, 1900 on a dairy farm near Des Moines, Iowa, the sixth child and third daughter of Amelia and Charles Schlenker.

Her family moved from Iowa to Texas in 1906, arriving at Bovina on December 6. Her mother and nine children traveled by train to Texas after her father built them a home here. The home was fifteen miles northwest of Bovina.

Frank Spring and Mr. Schlenker organized things and built a school house. Florence and her siblings got to school by horse and buggy.

In 1914 Mr. Schlenker bought his first car, a four door Ford sedan. The next year he took the children o Bovina to school that year. He rented a home in Friona and mother and all the children lived there and went to school. Father and the oldest brother, Willard, weather permitting.

Florence's sister, Mabelle graduated from Friona in 1917, the only one in her class. Florence was next in 1918 with four in the class. Her sister Bula, was the next with three.

Florence went to West Texas State College the summer of 1918 and stayed there until the end of the 1919 summer semester. She then received her teaching certificate. She taught school at Rhea for three years.

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Fog Is A Factor In Two **Fatality Wreck Monday**

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BY RON CARR It was a nasty, foggy morning in Parmer County last Monday, October 16. At 5:45 a.m. visibility was near zero as the fog and mist lay in the darkness like a blanket.

Donald Cobb of Bryan, Texas, was hauling a load of cattle to Paco Feedyard. He was northbound on Highway 214 when a westbound 1993 Dodge pickup, driven by Richard Williams of Sudan, pulled in front of his rig at the intersection of FM 145.

Cobb's 1979 Kenworth Cobb's 1979 Kenworth truck struck the pickup in the left front, spinning the Dodge into a ditch and ejecting Williams. The semi swerved in an attempt to avoid the collision but rolled onto its side. The loaded cattle trailer landed on Williams, 37. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto. The overturned cattle The overturned cattle trailer, which was blocking a

portion of the southbound day rounding up the stray lane, was then rammed in cattle. As late as 8 p.m. lane, was then rammed in the fog by a southbound grain truck loaded with corn.

The grain truck, a 1999 Kenworth, struck the rear portion of the overturned trailer, scattering debris and cattle. Fragments of the cattle trailer shattered the windshield of the grain truck, killing 43-year-old Bruce Robison of Hereford.

His truck traveled another 1,000 feet before coming to rest in a cotton field. Robison was also pronounced dead at

the scene. Officials reported at least 20 cattle dead in the wreck. 20 cattle dead in the wreck. The rest of the cattle wandered away from the scene into the fog causing dangerous driving for rescue workers. Sheriff's Deputy Joe Lopez, responding to the scene, reported bumping into a cow as he neared the intersection intersection.

Deputies and volunteer cowboys spent much of the

Monday night, calls were coming in to the Sheriff's office about cattle sightings.

DPS Trooper Trey Ellis was first on the scene. He was joined by Deputy Lopez and Reserve Deputy Mac Fields who directed traffic around the site in the foggy

conditions. Sheriff Gary Blair and Chief Deputy Keith Payne were also on the scene. Trooper Ellis was joined

by Trooper Craig Hunt, several other troopers out of the Hereford office and officials from the state Weights and Measures Division from Canyon. It took them until after 3 p.m. Monday afternoon to clear the scene

Also responding were the Lazbuddie EMS and wreckers from TransMatic out of Clovis who brought equipment large enough to handle the semitractors and trailers. The Hereford Brand

reported that citations were pending against Cobb for unrelated mechanical and paperwork faults. The paper also reported that DPS Sgt. Ben Urbanczyk said inves-tigation into the cause of the accident is ongoing but indicated that alcohol may also have been a factor. The site of the accident is

at Clay's Corner, about 18 miles south of Friona on Highway 214.

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
