## Walters in jail on murder charge

Gerald William David Walters was in Taylor County Jail Monday morning charged with the beating death of Pam Byers, age 27 of Merkel.

According to the Taylor County District Attorney's Office, Walters will not be indicted on the charge at the grand jury's session Wednesday, but a spokesman for the DA's office told the Mail Monday Walters may be indicted on

murder charges December 3rd.

Walters was arrested Nov. 19 and booked in Taylor County jail.

Byers suffered fatal injuries at her home last Sunday morning. She had been in a coma until her death Thursday. She is survived by her three children.

### Pam Byers

Pamela Ann Mashburn Byers, 27, of Merkel died at 11 p.m. Thursday at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene. Services were held Monday at the United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Hugh Daniels and the Rev. Joe Allen, pastor, officiated. Burial was at Neida Cemetery at Neinda.

Born June 4, 1955, in Merkel, she had lived in Merkel all her life. She graduated from Merkel High School. She was a member of the Methodist Church. Survivors include two sons, Zak and Nathan, both of Merkel; a daughter, Karly of Merkel; two brothers, Billy Nichols of Soldotna, Alaska, and Chris Mashburn of Merkel; two sisters, Debbie Childers of Merkel and Kim Tripp of Konai, Alaska; her father, Don Mashburn of Tye; and mother, Jo Ann Mashburn of Merkel.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at Episcopal Church of the Heavenly Rest in Abilene.

The Rev. James Folts, rector, will officiate. Burial will be at City Cemetery, directed by Elliott-Hamil Funeral Home, 542 Hickory St.

Born Jan. 26, 1918, in Abilene, she was the daughter of John G. and Bertha Roberts Jackson. Her father was a former publisher and editor of the Merkel Mail. He later entered the oil business and was killed in an oil field accident in 1921. Bertha Jackson died suddenly in 1928, leaving three surviving children. Ms. Jackson and her brother, Jack, were raised by their grandmother, Mrs. Laura Scott Roberts, on the family ranch near Nugent. Mrs. Roberts' husband, John, died in 1903.

Dr. Rupert Richardson has cited John Roberts, along with his brothers, Emmett and Creed, as the first permanent settlers and Indian fighters of what was then Comanche territory. The eldest of the three children, Evelyn Jackson, lived with cousins Eva Mae and Bernard Hanks until she married John F. Hardaway.

Ms. Jackson received a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Texas and began her career with the Abilene Reporter News. She later worked for Texas Parade Magazine and as general editor of Nay-

lor Co. in San Antonio. She left Texas in 1950 to become associate editor of Flower Grower Magazine, now House and Garden.

She worked as juvenile editor for Abingdon Press and Abelard Schuman Publishing Co. in New York. At the time of her death, she was a free lance writer.

She was preceded in death by her parents; two brothers, Jack and Jimmy Dick; and a sister, Evelyn Hardaway Patillo, who died in 1967.

Survivors include two nieces, Mrs. Bob (Peggy) Beckham, 1416 Woodland Trail, and Patricia Patillo Maxfield of El Paso; a nephew, John Jackson Patillo of Richardson; four great nieces; five great-nephews; an aunt, Mrs. Otto (Grace) Roberts; and two cousins, Mrs. Andrew B.
