Fairfield man killed in I-20 crash here Monday

A Fairfield man was killed when the semi rig he was driving sideswiped an abandoned vehicle near Merkel's East city limits on Interstate 20 Monday

Merkel resident Johnny Jackson told The Mail "The semi just sideswiped that car and we got over there as fast as we could. When we got there, the engine was still running and we were afraid that there might be a fire.

Merkel Justice of the Peace Leo Mashburn pronounced Alvis Wayne Ward, 33 dead. Merkel Emergency Medical Service and Volunteer firemen had worked for almost an hour before they managed to free Wards' body from the crumpled cab. His body was taken to Starbuck Funeral Home here

Merkel Emergency Medical Service Paramedic Mitch Atkinson told The Mail at the scene the man was alive when they arrived at 11:58 a.m. but could find no signs of life fifteen minutes later

Ward's semi, owned by Dal-Har Distributing in Dallas was loaded with spools of aluminum wire. He was heading East on the Interstate when he lost control of his rig, sideswiped a car that had been abandoned on the Interstate Monday morning, with the impact forcing the semi on it's side. The sideswiped car is registered to Allen Tucker of Merkel and was parked on the shoulder. It was totaled.

Ward's death is Merkel's first traffic fatality of the year.

School board rehires

teachers, looks at

computer, adopts policies

The Merkel school board reviewed teachers, saw a computer demonstration and ammended their annual budget in regular session held at the Merkel High Library Tuesday night.

The board also discussed teacher contracts during a two hour executive session and following the session, made the following decisions.

The board gave blanket approval of all teachers at MISD campuses after discussing the performance of each teacher with the principal of the campus.

The board also accepted the resignation of high school science teacher Rose Davis, R. E. Bratcher who is retiring after 30 years, Cheryl Pieper, elementary art and granted Marcia Lester a one year leave of absence.

The board also renewed the contracts of the employees of the Taylor County Education Cooperrative.

Budget ammendments totaling \$48,000 were approved. Broken down, \$1,150 was added to the budget to take care of a doubling in the per student price for services rendered by Region 14 Education Service Center. The center had been charging \$1 per student for providing films, audio-visual aides and the like and the center now charges \$2 per student per year. Another \$150 was added for travel for the school nurse. Another \$1,948 was added because the purchase price of the latest school bus purchased and \$40,000 was acded for three construction related items.

Those items included \$7,798 that was not hudgeted for construction of the bus barn. The total cost of the barn was \$32,798. \$15,000 went for the first payment on the land purchased by the school district and \$17,201.25 will be spent on constructing two new portable buildings.

Board members were also introduced to the

capabilities of the Apple II Computer system by Leprechaun Data Systems. They are computer programmers that specialize in writing software programs that are individually prepared for specific needs of businesses and organizations. Board members asked for further information before considering purchase of the computer and business manager Peggy Gibson was to meet with the programmers to describe programs that will be needed by MISD.

Board members also received three new school policies that will go into effect next year. They include the new seven period class day (currently there are 6), a 70 minimum passing grade (current is 60) and a new four year English requirement for High School graduation (currently a student is only required three). Next year's Seniors will not be affected by the new rule but all other students will be required four years of English.

One more policy was adopted Tuesday that sets a limit of two fund raising projects per year for any school organization. MISD superintendent Bill Everett told the board "It's getting a little out of hand. It's not right to continually call on a town to buy, buy, buy.'

Board members also learned there would be a special meeting April 26th to hear an attorney from the Texas Education Agency discuss the legal aspects of lease-purchasing school buildings. The meeting was set up by Corbett Services, a group that designs and builds schools on a lease-purchase agreement. An earlier letter from the company said a school district could save \$26,000 per year, over a 15 year payoff period on a \$2.5 million bond issue if the facility is leased instead of purchased through bonded indebtedness.

Lone Star requesting 5.59% rate increase effective in April

The Merkel City council heard Lone Star Gas manager Marthe Harmon ask for a 5.59 across the board rate increase and heard a police report at their regular session held at City Hall Monday night.

LSG manager Harmon told council it had been 2 years and seven months since LSG had requested an increase and she cited an "insufficient rate of return on investment here" that predicated the change.

She pointed out the 5.59 per cent increase on Merkel's 950 gas meters would average \$1.97 per month per customer.

Harmon also cited growing inflationary woes that had and continues to erode LSG earning here and said LSG had continued to strive to keep the cost of service as low as possible.

Harmon told council "We feel like our rate relief we are requesting is justified and Leonard (Byrd) can back me up because he asks for things sometimes and I have to tell him no, we cannot afford it."

Harmon did not agree that the Texas Rail Road

Commission would end up setting the rate because she said the direct responsibilitity for the rate lies with the city. She said the RRC does have appelate jurisdiction on natural gas rates for utility companies, but said rate requests than end up at the RRC cost additional time and money that the local customers would end up paying for in the long run.

Council and Harmon got off on discussions of natural gas deregulation and pricing policies and said that LSG has as many as 3,000 seperate contracts to purchase natural gas.

Council approved a resolution that will place Merkel in line with rural taxing entities in Taylor County in the selection of a new board member for the Taylor County Appraisal District. Trent resident Bruce McGlothlin is the only rural resident on that board and the rural governments are trying to consolidate their opinions to place a second rural resident on that board.

Merkel Poilice Chief Ray Pack gave his police report that found the Merkel Police Deaprtment handling 116 cases in February.

Merkel's tax rebates behind 1982

Merkel's tax rebates, which had been running at a 11 per cent increase over 1982 payments, took a nose dive in February leaving the city running at a decrease of 8.42 per cent over the 1982 pace. Merkel received a check for \$5,230.16, compared to last February's payment of \$6,707.39.

So far, the city has received \$16,085.51 compared to last year's payments of \$17,564.36. Tye's rebates are still running two per cent ahead of those last year and they are the only Taylor County town that is showing an increase so far. Tye's latest check of \$3,407.94 pushes their yearly total to \$14,333.75.

Trent did not receive a check last month.

According to state comptroller Bob Bullock. Texas cities are running 4.5 per cent ahead of last year's record payments.

The city sales tax is collected by local merchants along with the state sales tax and rebated monthly to the cities in which the tax was collected.

Chamber sets Easter egg hunt

It's fess up time again. One of the sad facts concerning weekly newspapers is that one must wait one week to correct one's mistakes.

We goofed last week in an ad promoting the Band Boosters Talent Show that will be held tonight (Thursday). We had the date wrong and we do apologize.

Another noof was having James Beasley, the Merkel City Councilman in the paper as Larry Beasley. We regret that error as well.

The most disgusting scene I could find at the wreck scene Monday along 1-20 were the number of people that came to look at the wreck, close up. People that had no business being on the scene other than satisfying curiosity. The reason I find that disgusting is because of the danger people place themselves in by being close to a situation that they do not know if there is any great danger or not. The other reason of disgust is what they were trying to see, a man that was dying.

One thing people forget at an uncontrolled accident scene is that there are plenty of people there in the first place, trying to do their job. The area immediately surrounding the scene should be left open for emergency teams to operate. I will guarantee you one thing, the Abilene Police Department sets up a police line and no one is allowed to pass it at accidents.

That line is set for for more than one reason, but their primary objective is to make the scene safe again and to make sure rescue teams are allowed freedom to move unimpeded. Police Lines are also set up for the public's protection. Innocent bystanders are injured or killed with regularity in this country because they are unaware of dangers that exist at an accident scene. Not only is the danger of fire always present at a motor vehicle accident, accidents involving trucks can get out of hand quickly when hazardous materials are involved. Not all truck in the US properly display hazardous material signs and the contents of a truck can only be obtained from the truck's manifest. When the driver

cannot warn officials, the threat of the truck containing hazardous materials must be

weighed.

I am not about to say the people that crowded around the truck did not have good intentions in mind, those few that actually helped try to free the critically injured driver from the crumpled cab. But most there were just trying to get a look at what was going on.

I learned my lesson about approaching an accident scene about three years ago when a Santa Fe freighter derailed South of Merkel. When I arrived on the scene, I could not find any railroad officials, law enforcement or anyone that could tell me what the train was carrying. Like an idiot, I began to start photographing a tank car that was spewing a liquid onto the ground. I had no idea of what the chemical was and was dumb to get close without knowing. Deadly fumes from some chemicals can kill anything within 100 feet of the accident and if wind conditions are right

like you can be of assistance. I don't mean to say you should not go out and see what is going on, but do so from a safe distance. Also, if there are kids with you when you decide to go check out an accident, leave them in the car. There were a few kids Monday who will probably never forget what they saw because of their age and the violence of that accident. Young kids can learn just as much about the hazards of driving by looking at junked cars in a wreck yard, the effects on a human body following an accident is not the type of thing a child needs to see.

New insurance industry weight

tables encourage realism

New height-weight tables recently released by the insurance industry may encourage people to be more realistic about their weight.

"Too many women look to fashion models as examples of the ideal weight, and this simply contributes to unrealistic weight goals and fad dieting," says Dr. Dymple Cooksey, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The new weight tables show a five to seven percent weight increase in most height categories.

"But people should be less concerned about how much they weigh, and more concerned about how much fat they have," staes Cooksey.

According to Cooksey, the problem is one of distinguishing "overweight" from "overfat." Overweight can result from many different factors, such as body frame, musculature, or fluid retention, and is not necessarily bad.

Overfat is purely the accumulation of excess fat, which has been linked to heart disease and

other risk factors. It is not always easy to tell the difference, particularly when a person is not too much overweight, says Cooksey.

A height-weight table won't tell people how much fat they have either, she adds. That is why a person should consult with a doctor before beginning a weight loss plan.

The new weight tables are based on insurance records and published by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. of New York. They indicate the weight ranges at which people of various heights and builds will be statistically at less risk of premature death.

Cooksey predicts that the tables will be widely circulated in diet books, publications and commercial diet programs as appropriate weight goals for the general public.

"However, most educational programs such as ours will continue to stress good nutrition as a means of weight control rather than acheiving the weights found in these tables," says Cooksey. Extension Service nutrition and weight control programs serve over adults and youth each year. THE MERKEL MAIL
