

WTU got quite a bit less than it asked for when the Public Utility Commission finished it's hearings on rate increase requests, and that is both good and

Since the Merkel City Council denied the rate increase, Merkel customers will not be eligible for refunds that will be payed to customers that live in cities that approved the interim rate. Hightower questioned

Dear Editor; What type of grain inspection do you expect from an agricultural commissioner who knows nothing about Agriculture? A shoddy one at best.

Earlier this fall, Jim Hightower executed a grain inspection of 23 million bushels of corn stored at a Plainview elevator. His results and the U.S. Agriculture Department's results of the same grain show an overall difference of 85 per cent.

Hightower found 53 per cent of the grain to be of the poorest grade and 87 per cent to be of grades 4, 5 and sample. USDA, on the other hand, found only 10 per cent of the grain to be of the poorest grade and only 45 per cent to be of grades 4, 5 and sample.

This great discrepancy exists because Hightower used an unrepresentative 86 samples to test the corn. USDA used nearly 100 times that number.

Hightower put out those inaccurate numbers, based on inadequate samples, knowing full well he was deceiving the public and the farm community. For a state official to present his case in this way is the lowest form of deceit.

The worthless inspection came about when Hightower tried to get USDA to release the grain without congressional approval which they are prohibited from doing under three statutes. In order to back up his claim that most of the corn was rotting and should thus be released, he put together an obviously poor inspection of the Plainview facility.





Hay improvement is possible

Results from the hay amoniation demonstration conducted on the Duane Bartee farm have been received according to Taylor County Extension Agent Jow Wilson.

A sample of the coastal hay before the anhydrous amonia was applied tested 2.19 per cent crude protein, A sample from the sample bale two weeks following treatment showed 9.45 per cent crude protein equivelant.

The demonstration was conducted by the Tuscola Farm Supply and the Extension Cr-

op and Livestock Committee. The hay was covered by plastic and the anhydrous was injected under the plastic. The amount used was about 4 to 6 per cent the weight of the hay.

The cost of the anhydrous per ton of hay treated would be under \$10. Adding the price of plastic would increase the costs to just under \$15 per ton, which would still be an ecenomical way of increasing the feeding value of low quality hay, according to Wilson.
