# Council hears police ask for help in handling local dog problems

The Merkel City Council held a routine meeting Monday night at the Merkel Emergency Medical Service building, with most of the discussion during the meeting taken up by the local dog ordinance and enforcement.

During the police report, Merkel Police Chief Ray Pack asked council for some help with enforcing the dog ordinance. He said, his opinion was "that police officers shouldn't have to go running down alleys chasing dogs, but we do." Pack asked for a pick up to be used for dog calls, or a dog catcher.

Pack said his department handled over 200 dog calls last year and said a couple of recent cases have included an officer feeling threatened enough by a dog to shoot the animals.

Council expressed total support for the officers to enforce the dog ordinance to the limit. The ordniance says that a dog, not in a fence or on a leash, within the city limits of Merkel is a stray and can be taken to the veterinarian's office.

An agreement was made to construct cages that can be lifted easily in and out of the current city pick-up's and to use those vehicles on dog calls.

Council tabled accepting a bid from Riggan Construction on the

demolition of eight homes and clearing the lot they sit on. The Riggan bid was the only bid received and city manager J. A. Sadler said he wanted to check with officials from Hamlin and Colorado City to see if the bid is in line for similar work payed for under Housing and Urban Development Block Grant work.

Sadler said he was not questioning the bid but added "it's a government program and I'll have to be able to tell them (the government) that this is a fair price, so I want to check it out."

Council members also formally called the April 7 election.

# Religious training is the responsibility of the home

person to have a strong conviction about some small thing and to have a weak conviction about some important matter. Misguided convictions can produce radical movements and destructive results. Strong convictions are not always good. I once knew a man who had a strong conviction that he could raise his children better out of the church than could his neighbors in the church.

I was driving the school bus in the area that picked up his children. I will have to say this-his children were the best behaved children on the bus. In that same year I conducted the funeral service for that father with the strong convicitons after he took his own life. People with strong convictions can at the

same time be absolutely right.

There are some questions concerning the matter of Prayer in the public schools from people with strong convictions on both sides. Our president says that Prayer ought to be restored to the public schools. Personally, I have just as strong conviction that we are better off like it is. Here are some reasons for this conviction.

In the beginning of this issue there were schools - especially in the north, with written prayers that were read before the class or general assembly. The ruling against Prayers in the public shoools was against the forced prayers, or the forced listening to such prayers. The whole idea of banned prayer in school is very misleading and harmful. Prayer has not been BANNED in any SCHOOL in the United States. There was no intention to ban prayers in the public school, and besides that it is impossible to do so. Any student or teacher can pray in shoool any time they choose. This truth should be taught to all the children by all the parents.

Many parents protesting the ban on prayer in schools never have prayer in the home. The tragedy is - prayer has been banned in too many homes by the hurry of present day living and the indifference of so many parents. What we need more than anything else is the RESTORATION of prayer and devotions within the home. People who pray at home will find a time and a way to pray wherever they are, and no person or power can keep them from this priviledge. The silent prayer of a sincere heart is much better than the kind that call attention to self and makes a show of religion.

Since we have freedom of religion in America - that means all religions have equal time and chance to present their own

Devil worship is a form of religion and could claim their equal time and place in shoool if prayers were restored in shoool. Do we want that. This is a new day in which

we live. Have prayer with your child before they leave for school, and teach them that religious training is a responsibility of the HOME.

## 1984 cotton crop

# should be similar to the 83 crop

The 1984 cotton crop could be headed for the "same song, second verse" scenario— overproduction followed by lower prices

"Because the 1983 PIK program reduced supplies and thus caused some strengthening in prices, many farmers will be inclined to plant more cotton in 1984," believes Dr. Carl Anderson, ecenomist with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. "That will bring prices down again by harvest time."

again by harvest time."

Anderson views the government's '84 cotton program as not sufficiently attractive to cotton producers to keep them from planting substantially more acres than in 1983. Such increased production in the U.S., coupled with an expected increase in foreign production, would cause the world crop to exceed consumption levels. This would also put pressure on the export market for U. S.cotton.

"Because the '84 cotton pro-

gram allows for a large deficiency payment— the maximum is 26 cents a pound for eligible producers, many large scale operators will probably reach the \$50,000 payment limitation," points out Anderson. "This drastically reduces the program's effectiveness to cut production."

With a base cotton acreage around 15.5 million with no paid diversion or other incentives to producers, Anderson speculates that planted acres will reach 12 to 13 million. This could mean a 13 to 14 million bale crop. The economist pegs domestic use and exports at 11.5 to 12 million bales, so an average production year in 1984 could add 1 to 2 million bales to an already adequate carryover from the '83 crop.

"All this points to a weak cotton market in the second half of 1984." says Anderson. "So growers may want to take a hard look at pricing part of their expected crop fairly early in the year."

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## Treat poison victims quickly

Poison

§ Poisoning is mostly a problem associated with children. Of the 1 million poisonings reported in the U. S. each year, 75 per cent of them are reported in small children under five years old. Most of these poisonings are from household products.

There are more than 350,000 toxic substances which you can be exposed to. Therefore, we will not attempt to tell you what to do for each one.

If you or your family are exposed to any substance which you are not sure about, contact your doctor or call your ambulance immediately. Don't wait to see what it will do. Time can be a major factor in the

treatment of poison. Even if there are no warnings on the bottle and the patient or victim acts different in any way, make the call. In your home, if the label says for external use only, the contents should not be swallowed, inhaled, and possibly not even put on tender skin of a little child. Don't pour the contents from one container into another. If it should become necessary to treat for poison, the wrong treatment could be given because of the different

You should suspect poisoning in anyone who has a sudden onset of unexplained illness, especially if stomach pain, nausea, vomiting, headache or strange acting behaviour.

While you are waiting for the ambulance, read the label of the container if you are sure where the poison came from. It could have instructions on how to begin treatment. If you are unsure about what was taken, a few guidelines could help you save a life.

1. Vomiting is not always best for the patient. If the poison caused redness, itching, burning or numbness when it came in contact with the skin, mouth or hands, don't make the victim

If the substance smells like oil, gasoline, furniture polish or lighter fluid, don't nake the victim vomit.

If the patient is sleepy, unconscious or in a stupor, don't make the victim vomit.

Induced vomiting is best done by professional people with proper equipment. Remember to go by the above guidelines if vomiting is to be induced.

If the victim should vomit on their own, don't attempt to stop them. Try to keep their own head down or turned to the side. This will help keep the vomit out of their air way and they can breathe.

In any case in which you can suspect that someone has taken something they should not have taken, contact your doctor or call us immediately. Sometimes it takes several minutes to hours for the effects to take place. If you are unsure, call us.

If the poison is on the surface of the skin or on the clothing.

remove clothing quickly and flush the skin with a large ammount of water. A shower would be ideal or a hose if the victim is outside. Continue with water for at least 20 to 30 minutes.

If the poison comes in contact with the eyes, flush with water for 20 to 30 minutes. You will probably need to hold the eye lids open. Don't use a stream of water with a lot of water pressure. Let the water trickle in to the eye. Water from a glass or picture will work real well.

Remember, if you use water to flush skin or eyes, have a large ammount and continue for
