This is precisely why character matters so very much in our leaders and most especially for the person who holds the highest office.

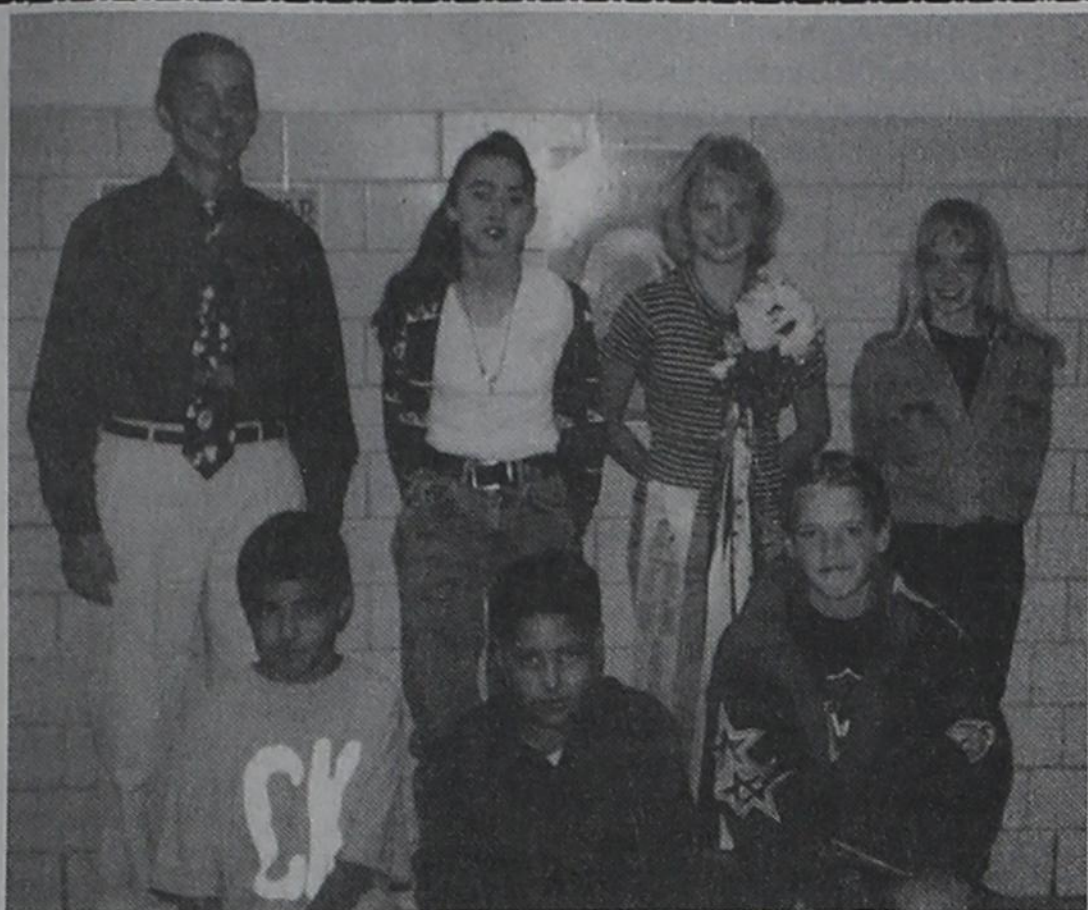
Pres. Clinton's big push toward making tobacco illegal among teens is nothing but a smokescreen to cover the fact that, during his administration, huge sums have been cut from drug enforcement funds; the DEA has lost 227 officers; the drug-policy office has been slashed from 147 positions to 25; drug-enforcement positions in the FBI, Coast Guard and Customs Service have also been cut drastically.

The result of such casual attitudes toward drug enforcement during the Clinton administration is this: drug use among teens age 12 to 17 has nearly doubled since 1992; the street price of cocaine and heroin has gone way down; LSD experimentation among high school youth has reached the highest level in 20 years (an increase of 183 percent between 1992 and 1995); cocaine-related emergency room cases are up 65 percent; heroin-related emergency room cases are up 120 percent. Hard-won gains in lowering drug use during the Reagan-Bush terms have just disappeared.

Yet, the President is worried that one in three teens who smoke cigarettes will have his life cut short by tobacco.

For a person who is seeking re-election to the highest office, President Clinton is carrying around a very large basketful of burdens: draft dodging, Viet Nam War protesting, extramarital affairs, underhanded profiteering in cattle futures market, Vince Foster "suicide," attempted takeover of health care, Rose Law Firm, travel office firings, Whitewater scandals, the Mena Arkansas "mafia," veto of the partial birth abortion ban, "lost" FBI files, refusal to disclose his medical records, the Dick Morris prostitute scandal, FOB (friends of Bill) currently languishing in prison such as Webb Hubbell, the McDougals, Dan Lasater and others.

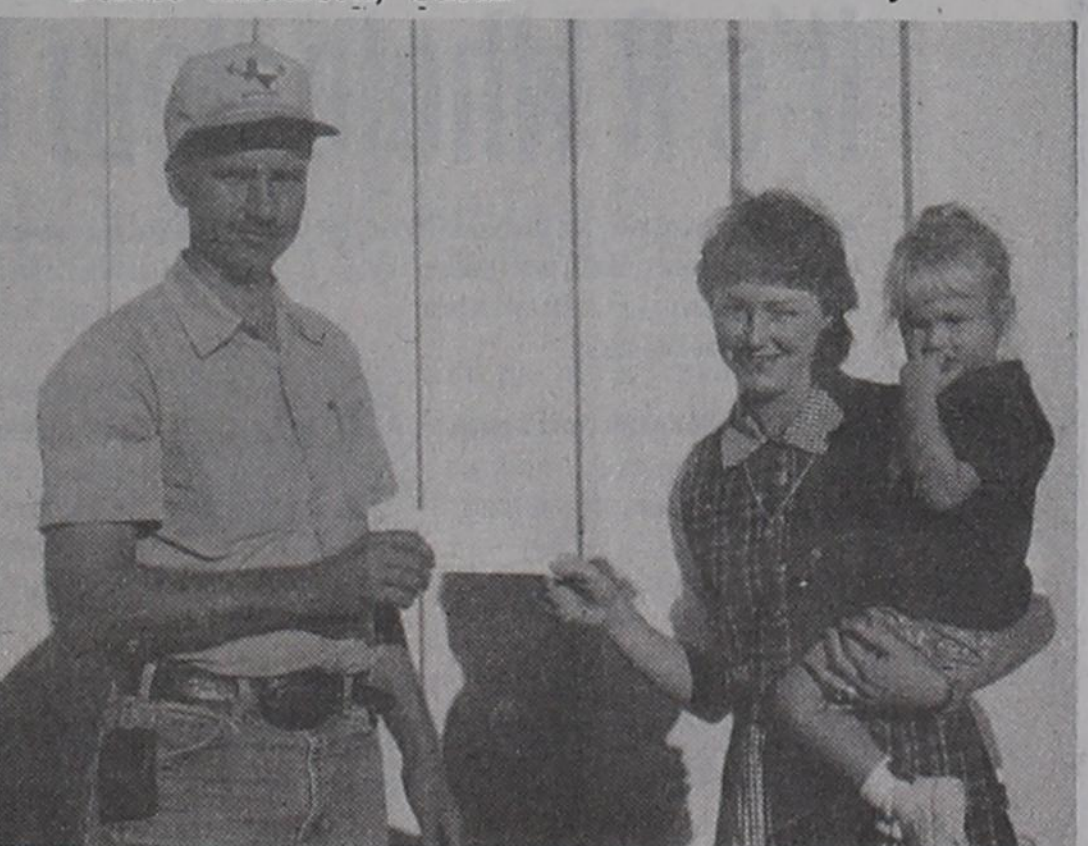

At a September 23 special meeting, the board voted unanimously to approve the ordinance to adopt the 1996-97 tax rate.

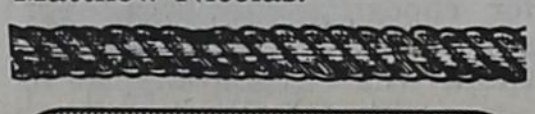

Mustangs Sonic Boom Buries Smyer Bobcats 35-6! Now 4-0

The Smyer Bobcats were no match for the well-oiled Mustangs at last Friday's homecoming game.

With the field and the fans decorated in maroon, black, and white corsages and streamers, the Mustangs jumped out to a quick lead on their first possession.

With the Smyer defense keying on rush-leader Joe Villarreal, a handoff to senior Robert Perez resulted in a 64-yard touchdown run with 8:11 left in the first quarter. Perez was virtually untouched as he galloped into the end zone.

After Perez kicked the first of his five extra points on the night, the Mustangs had a quick 7-0 lead and were never in danger the rest of the game.

Mustang backs had 42 carries for 287 rushing yards, led by Villarreal with 20 carries for 101 yards. Through four games, Villarreal has carried the ball 82 times and racked up 601 yards, a 7.3 yard per carry average.

Albert Larrea had 12 carries for 60 yards, giving him a 4-game total of 51-298, a 5.8 average per carry.

Also against Smyer, Robert Perez had 2 for 70 yards, Martin Reyna, 2 for 10, Manny Quintana 1 for 8, and Tony Beauchamp, 5 for 38.

The Mustangs fumbled three times and lost all three, while Smyer fumbled six times and lost four.

In addition to Perez's long touchdown, Beauchamp scored on a 26-yard run, Villarreal scored on a 2-yard run, and Luke Steelman caught two touchdown passes of 10 and 11 yards.

The Mustangs have gained 1,333 yards rushing through four games. Another 439 yards passing gives Bovina a total of 1,772 yards total offense, a 443 yard per game average.

Quarterback Tony Beauchamp has completed 17 of 33 passes for the 439

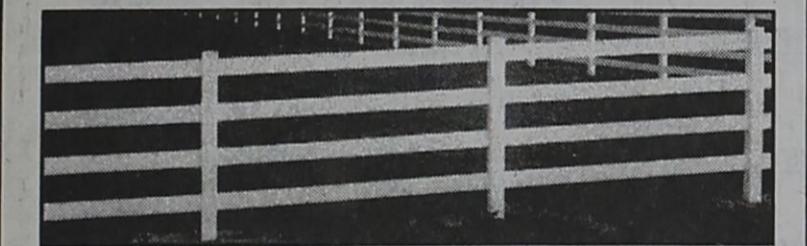
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Young Lady's Services Are Held Friday

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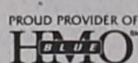

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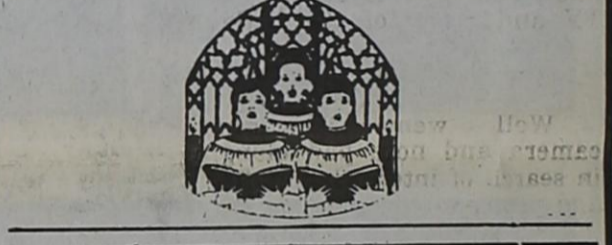
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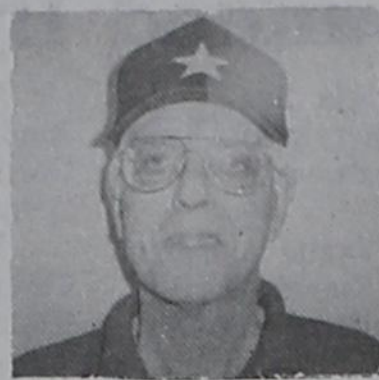
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Out Here

Maybe I am lazy. Or maybe I had enough of big cities when I lived in Dallas, Washington, D. C., and Tulsa.

Whatever the reason, during my year and a half as a resident of Parmer County, I haven't been moved too often to make the drive to Amarillo or Clovis like a lot of you do.

I have ventured up to Hereford once or twice and I drive to Canyon every Friday to get our award-winning newspaper printed.

But otherwise the shopping, visiting, eating out urge doesn't overwhelm me so that I have to drive up to Amarillo for entertainment, or worse, to shop.

I am not much of a shopper. I am more of a looker. So it was that last weekend, one looker and two shoppers loaded up and went to Amarillo.

The Country Peddler show was in town. My mother and a friend of ours, Sherry Allison, were going to the show so I decided to tag along.

Actually I was going along to look, take pictures, talk to some of the people, and maybe gather some unique information for a newspaper story.

Besides, mother was driving and she bought lunch, so it was some good entertainment on an otherwise quiet Saturday.

The Country Peddler Show had been advertised on TV and many of the little ladies around town were buzzing about it. Figured it must be a big deal.

Well I went. Took my camera and note pad along in search of interesting crafts and people.

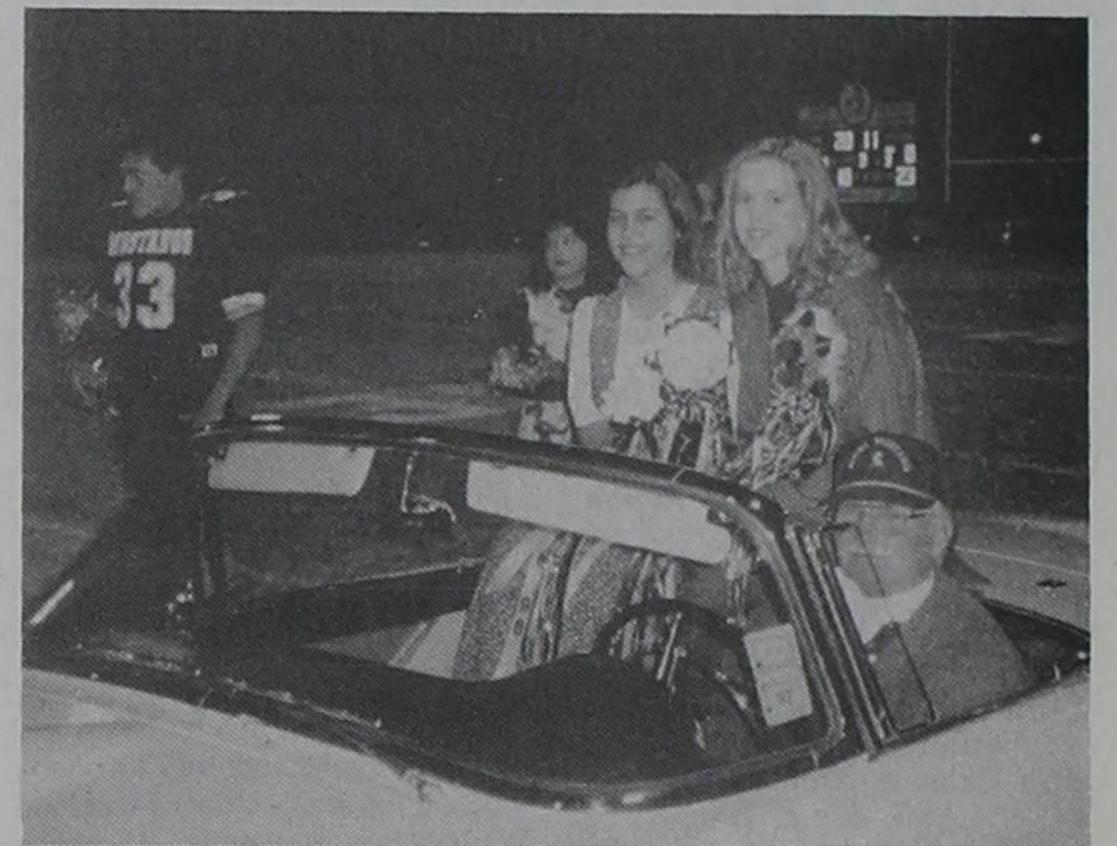

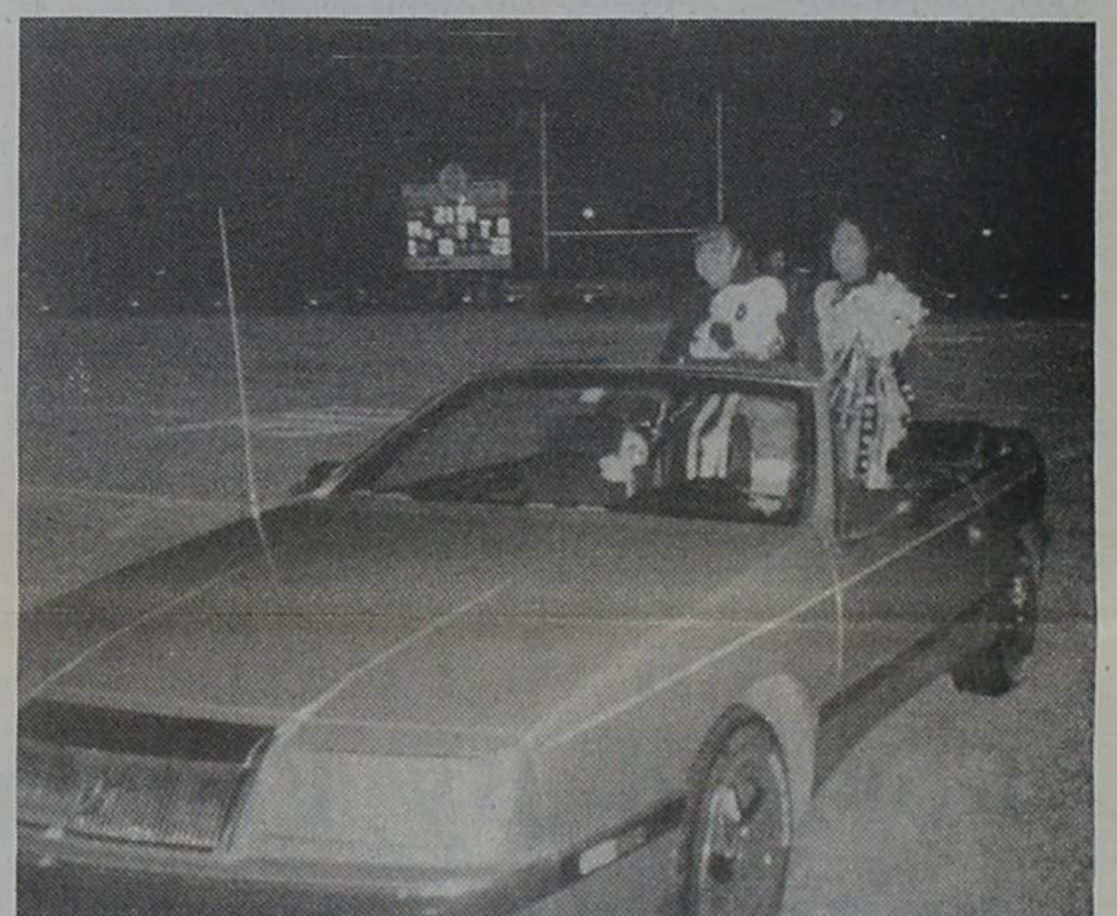

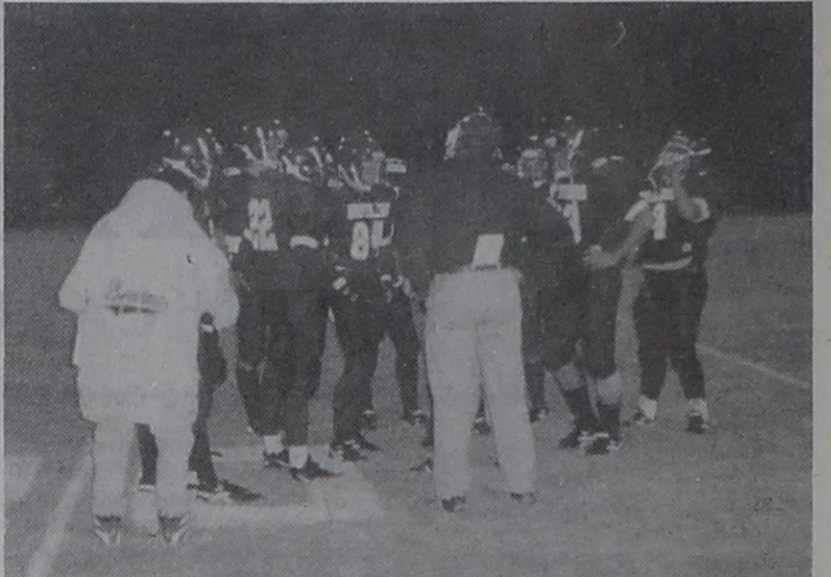
