IT HAS BEEN HAMMERED into our heads for years that we all need to go vote every time an election comes up. It is our duty as citizens and every vote is valuable to the democratic process.

The other day, I asked a young lady if she was going to vote in the election on November 8. She replied that she wasn't going to vote this time around because she had not studied the issues or the candidates well enough to be able to make good decisions about whom to vote for. I thought that was an extremely well thought out answer.

Far from being the be-all-to-endall, simply herding warm bodies out to the polling places on voting day adds nothing to the value of our governmental system. Of the approximately 32 percent of the eligible voters who are not registered, you have such fine upstanding folks as the functional illiterates, street people, petty criminals, the indolent drones of society, purple haired punk-rock teens, career welfare siphons, and people who can't speak English, can't read a newspaper, and couldn't understand a debate between the candidates if they had an opportunity.

Mind you, all of these people are eligible to vote and certainly have the right to vote if they so choose. I'm simply saying that those who are not interested enough to learn what they are voting for, should not be persistently harangued into marking a ballot just for the sake of numbers at the polls. For one thing, these are the people who, when lured to the polls, are most likely to cast their ballot for the cutest candidate, the one who spent the most on TV commercials, or the one who promises to dole out the most benefits to the free-loaders of





I believe that our right to vote is a priviledge which should not be taken lightly nor given away freely. The Voter Registration Act goes into effect in January next year. Under this new ruling, drivers will

automatically be registered when they renew their licenses. Good grief! You have to take a test to get a driver's license. Shouldn't you at least have to answer a couple of intelligent questions in order to be able to vote?

Also under the new Voter Registration Act, welfare recipients will be able to register when they go to pick up their government hand-outs. Oh, goody! A bunch of people who care nothing about economics except how much they can get out of other people's pockets, and they'll be easily enticed into voting for the most liberal politicians.

~Teachers Of The Week~



The Beet's are members of Central Baptist Church in Clovis, New Mexico. They have two cats, Kasota and Little Dude.




Marines **Slated For** Assembly

The assembly will discuss how the Marine's Air-Ground Task Force deploys and how the military combines with the embassies to evacuate.


Gunnery Sgt. Naughton has been in the Marines for 19 years.

Jerry Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Wright, escaped serious injury Sunday afternoon when his car overturned.


30 Yrs. Ago--Nov. 4, 1964
