IS THIS A GREAT COUNTRY, OR WHAT! Last week the "Silent Majority" finally spoke out all over the country and Boy! did the rest of society sit up and take notice. Election Day, Tuesday November 8, 1994 may become known in future history books as the "Republican Revolution," the day when the electorate shouted to the rooftops that they were tired of governmental intrusion into their private lives.

A socialized society was not what our founding fathers had in mind for America.

But changing directions takes time. A system as big as this one cannot be turned inside-out overnight. Changes will require a lot of patience from a public that has already been impatient for a very long time.

Be aware that the disarmed Democrats, the White House left-wing elitists, the well-entrenched bureaucracy, the liberal media and the sewage spewers in Hollywood, will all be combining their efforts to undermine every step which is taken toward making the government more workable and cost-effective.

If you thought there was a lot of negative stuff on the airways before the election, just wait until the Republicans get busy changing regulations, discarding mandates, cutting costs and laying off government employees. The late night comedians have already started in on their jaundiced slant of the newly-elected regime.

Before we get all smug and complacent about what is going to happen after the Republicans take office on January 4, 1995, remember that we still have a lame-duck congress in office and they are being called back into session to pass on a major piece of legislation which will put the U.S. economy under the control of a One World Government.

President Clinton is pushing Congress to ratify GATT (General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade; 24,004 pages long) on November 29 (House) and December 1 (Senate). Congress will be given only four hours of debate prior to the vote.

The reason the President is seeking "fast-track" approval on this item is to sabotage the legislative process (no amendments, no deletions, no filibuster). This is the type of treaty which should require ratification by a two-thirds majority vote of the Senate, rather than just a simple yes or no vote.

Just the fact that President Clinton is so anxious to get this legislation passed, should be a red-flag warning to public. We've seen his "hurry up and vote on it" tactics used several times in the two years since he took office.

GATT will increase the federal deficit by \$31 billion in trade sanctions and imposed tariffs. (There goes your balanced budget amendment, Republicans.) There's a \$2 billion provision in the treaty which gives federal subsidies to the *Washington Post* and the *Atlanta Constitution* (both big Clinton supporters).

U.S. Agriculture will be a substantial loser under the GATT deal, and American workers will be competing with countries that pay 25¢ hourly wages. It eliminates the guaranteed minimum interest rate on U.S. Savings Bonds, and requires every newborn to have an assigned IRS ID number (the mark of totalitarianism). GATT and the World Trade Organization (WTO) will deny people in 123 nations any choice in protecting their own land, farms, food supply or health care.

The WTO is an international bureaucracy with authority to decide trade disputes, giving them power over U.S. domestic policies in the name of "unfair trade practice." All local, state and national governments will be bypassed in the interest of a global "free market" run by a few large international corporations and secret panels or boards. Our states will

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## Bovina Man Dies In Pickup Wreck

A Bovina man and a Clovis woman were killed and three passengers were injured last Friday night in a pickup rollover on Pleasant Hill Highway about two miles north of Clovis, the New Mexico State Police reported.

Julia Gutierrez, 21, and Andres Ortiz, 28, both died after the accident on New Mexico 77, authorities said.

Three additional passengers were hospitalized, according to police reports.

The NMSP accident report states that the 1984 Ford pickup, driven by Luis Gutierrez, 20, of Clovis, was traveling at a high rate of speed at 11 p.m. and was unable to negotiate a curve.

The vehicle apparently went off

the right side of the road and overturned twice, flipping end over end and ejecting all occupants except Gutierrez, the report states.

Gutierrez was listed in satisfactory condition Saturday at Plains Medical/Clovis, as were passengers Angie Ortegon, age unavailable, of Clovis, and Ruben Alfaro, 26, of Friona.

The report also states that Julia Gutierrez was pregnant.

The incident makes a total of five vehicular deaths on Clovis area roads this past week.

Ortiz was survived by his parents, Ireneo and Grace Ortiz and his sisters Celia Quintana and Delia Cantu, all of Bovina. He was also survived by three daughters of Amarillo.

# Combest Expecting Sweeping Changes

The next two years should see monumental changes in the U.S. government, according to Congressman Larry Combest, and he says he looks forward to being part of this change.

"The people sent out as clear a signal as they could send. It was a signal for massive changes, for pro-business and anti-regulations. The business climate should improve significantly during the next two years. We've always said that people are better qualified to spend their money than Congress is," Combest commented.

The congressman for the 19th Congressional District made these remarks, and discussed other ramifications of the recent election during a conference telephone call to several newspaper publishers and editors on Tuesday of this week. Publisher Bill Ellis was a part of the group.

Combest said that the newly-elected congress was looking forward to trimming thousands of government jobs. "Several thousand employees will be replaced by a lot smaller number of employees," he said.

In response to a question as to what his number one priority would be, the congressman said that the "de-regulation" of American citizens had been his number one aim for several years. "I want to help get

government off the people's backs," he said.

But looming as a threat to the new congress' ability to restructure government will be the Clinton administration. "The administration will try to legislate by executive order, as a method of by-passing congress," he predicted.

"The Democrats have been abusing their power for the last 40 years, by overloading committees. Instead of appointing a proportional number of Republicans, most of the committees have been virtually totally Democratic in their makeup," he said.

One of the things that the new congress will do is to write a new farm bill, and Combest hopes to be a part of that for the area farmers. With the new Republican majority, the area congressman might be offered the chairmanship of the House Agriculture Committee, although he has also mentioned in regard to other committees.

With the defeat of area Congressman Bill Sarpalius, that leaves Congressmen Stenholm, Combest and DeLaGarza as the Texans on the Agriculture Committee.

Concerning the House action on the pending GATT treaty, Con-

gressman Combest said the Republicans in the House tried to have the decision on GATT delayed until the new congress convenes after the first of the year.

However, there is a time frame connected with the bill in which some action was deemed necessary. "We hope to accomplish some changes to the bill. There are some concerns as to the way the bill is structured. It's not the bill we'd prefer.

Passage of the bill threatens America's trade balance, requiring it to compete against countries where goods are produced by virtual slave-labor, it has been pointed out by opponents.

Congress is scheduled to take up the bill on November 29, and it is to be considered on a "fast track" basis, which means no debate.

Concerning the GOP congressmen's "Contract With America," Combest said that he and his colleagues had taken a calculated risk when they signed the treaty, but that they were confident that their promises could be delivered.

"President Clinton may veto some of the measures, but we plan to deal with a number of bills that

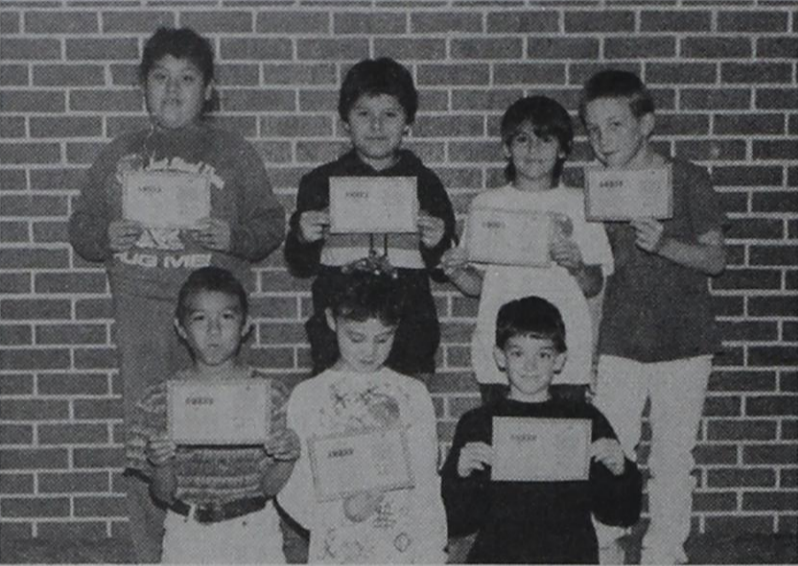

# Switching Center Introduced By GTE

GTE has installed a new telephone computer in the Bovina central office. The new digital switching center is scheduled to begin processing all telephone calls beginning November 15, when the present electromechanical "switch" will be retired from service.

"We're excited about this new switching system," said Larry King, Brownfield District manager. "It will allow telephone users in Bovina many more options. Although the old switching system was adequate, it didn't provide the technical capabilities of digital switching. It was time to retire the old switch and bring digital technology to Bovina."

The new switch will allow customers to receive such custom calling services as Touchtone, Call Waiting, Call Forwarding and Speed Dialing to all customers not on a party line.

Local calling will be faster because the called phone will ring as soon as the last digit is dialed. Dial tone, ringing signals and busy signals will all sound different. GTE is adopting frequency tone standards with the change, and customers are advised to dial all seven digits when placing local calls. Persons on the same party

line may call one another simply by dialing the directory number.

Solid state components have eliminated moving parts, which reduces maintenance and improves reliability. The computer has an ongoing test program called 4-Tel which looks for faulty circuits within the switch. Should it find a problem, the computer reroutes calls to other circuits and alerts technicians by displaying a message on an electric typewriter built into the system before the problem affects the customer.

"This equipment upgrade will give GTE customers in Bovina access to new features, as well as provide them state-of-the-art technology," said King.

GTE Telephone Operations is the largest U.S.-based local telephone company, providing voice, video and data products and services through more than 22 million access lines in portions of the United States, Canada, South America, the Caribbean and the Pacific.

GTE Telephone Operations, based in Irving had total revenues of \$15.8 billion in 1993. It's parent organization, GTE Corporation, is the fourth-largest publicly owned telecommunications company in the world.

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## Jones Ends Naval Course

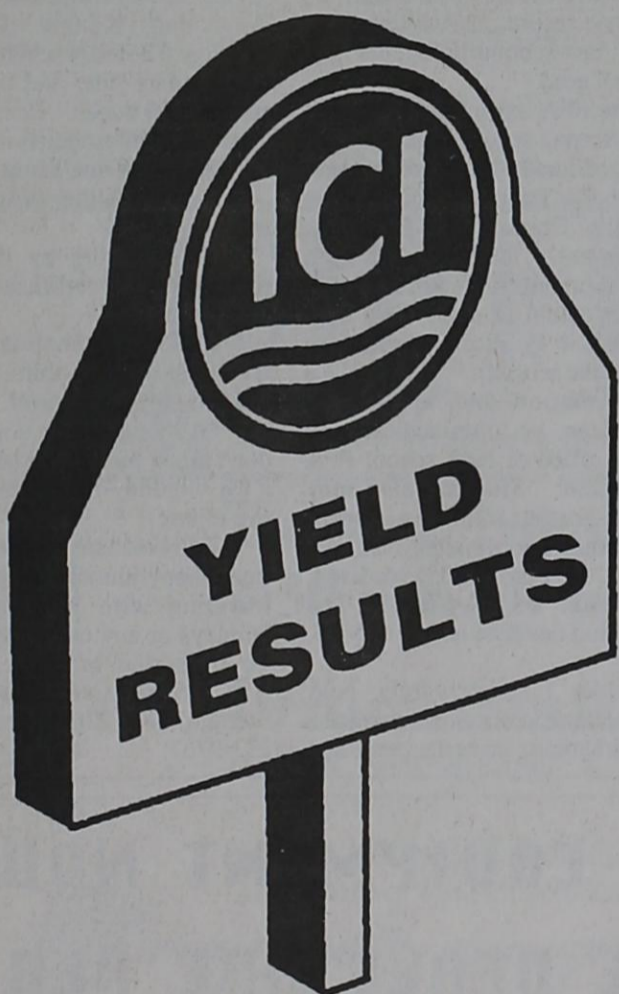

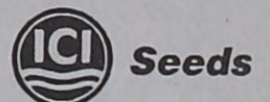

Should Americans have the freedom to set their own trade policies? If GATT/WTO passes, Congress cannot exempt any of our American rights, because the WTO agreement states "No reservations may be made in respect to any provisions of this agreement."

President Clinton enjoys comparing himself with the late President Truman. When internationalists tried to get GATT started back in 1947 (known then as the ITO), Congress and the American people were so opposed to it that Truman didn't even submit it to Congress for a vote.

Traditionally, lame duck congressional sessions have only been used in cases of national emergency. There is no emergency connected with GATT/WTO. Trade will not cease. World trade will continue based on the previous GATT rules.

We have until June, 1995 to pass or not pass on this one. The issue is self-government. Democracy should not be coerced by power-hungry politicians and global corporations. There is still time to write and call your Congressmen and Senators.

## Students May Be Eligible For Cargill Scholarships

In the not too distant future most homemakers will begin to concentrate on holiday baking. Since we have freezers and most cakes which we think of as substitutes for fruit cake, which was considered a must when I was a child, freeze well, it seems that more and more we are eating alternatives.

## PRUNELLA CAKE

Phyllis Sanders

- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1-1/3 cup buttermilk
- 3 cups flour
- 2 cups stewed prunes-mashed
- 1-1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 3 tablespoons cocoa

Blend sugar, shortening and add eggs. Stir in flour, which has been sifted with all other dry ingredients, alternately with milk. Add prunes and pecans. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 25 minutes. This makes four large layers.

## BOILED ICING

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup water

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1 teaspoon vanilla  
Boil until mixture spins a thread. Pour over two stiffly beaten egg whites. Beat until right consistency to spread.

This one probably would not freeze well. I would expect most homemakers who are concerned about the diets of their family members to reduce the amount of salt--or leave it out all together.

Layer cakes must be losing some of their popularity to other types. Perhaps the trend toward eating less sugar is responsible for the change. How long has it been since you've baked a layer cake or been served a slice of one?

## APPLE CAKE

- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs

## WALNUT APPLESAUCE CAKE

- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered cloves

- 3/4 cup seedless raisins

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Grease and flour two-eight inch layer cake pans. Turn mix into bowl. Add soda and spices. Then add applesauce to take the place of the 1/2 cup liquid called for in the first beating on the cake mix box. Now, complete as directed on the box. Bake 25 minutes or until done. Let set on wire rack a minute, then turn out to cool.

## APPLESAUCE CAKE

- 3 cups brown sugar or 2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups applesauce
- 3 cups flour
- 4 eggs
- 1-1/2 teaspoon cloves

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup dates and candied cherries

(All kinds of fruits may be added to make fruit cake.)

Bake in a loaf pan or skillet or in layers just as you want it, but the loaf cake keeps moist longer and will take 2 to 3 hours to bake in a moderate oven--250 to 300 degrees.

- 1-1/2 cup buttermilk

Mix butter, sugar, eggs and milk well. Add flour. Put pecans, coconut, dates and orange peel into first mixture and mix well. Bake 1-1/2 hours at 350 degrees in loaf or angel food cake pan.

## FILLING FOR ORANGE DATE CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
  - 1 cup orange juice
  - 3 teaspoons grated orange peel
- Combine in saucepan and cook until it comes to a boil. Put on cake while it is hot.

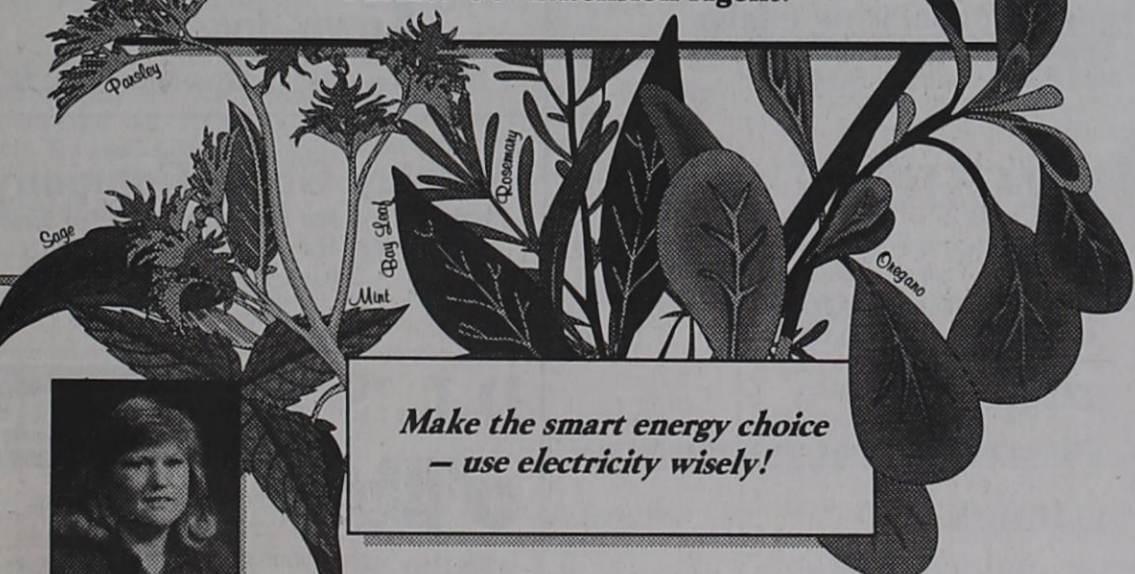

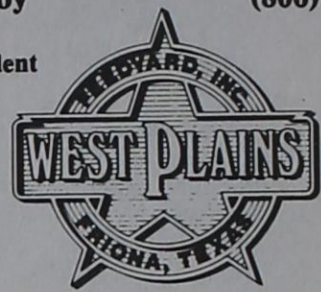

(Continued from Page 1) haven't been introduced before. At least we'll get them through the congress," he said.

Also discussed was welfare reform. "Much of the money spent on welfare goes to the government for administering the programs. There is no incentive for the recipients to work. In fact, those receiving welfare are often penalized for working. We have made poverty an institution in America. We need to set a time limit to get the long-term recipients off welfare. The people have spoken in this regard. Last Tuesday they said 'Enough is enough,'" the congressman said.

He said that there should be many positive things passed to strengthen business growth. Government has taken away the incentive for businesses to grow and expand, he said. "We plan to change that," Combest promised.

Regarding the helium plant in Amarillo, Combest pointed out that it returns \$20 million to the government each year. "This isn't the case in most government-subsidized programs," he said.

An estimated 14.2 million acre-feet of water will be needed in the state in the year 2000 for agriculture, manufacturing and municipal systems. Ground water, from aquifers beneath the ground, is expected to supply 6.3 million acre-feet, or 44 percent of the need. Surface water, from rivers and lakes, is expected to supply 8 million acre-feet, or 56 percent of the demand.

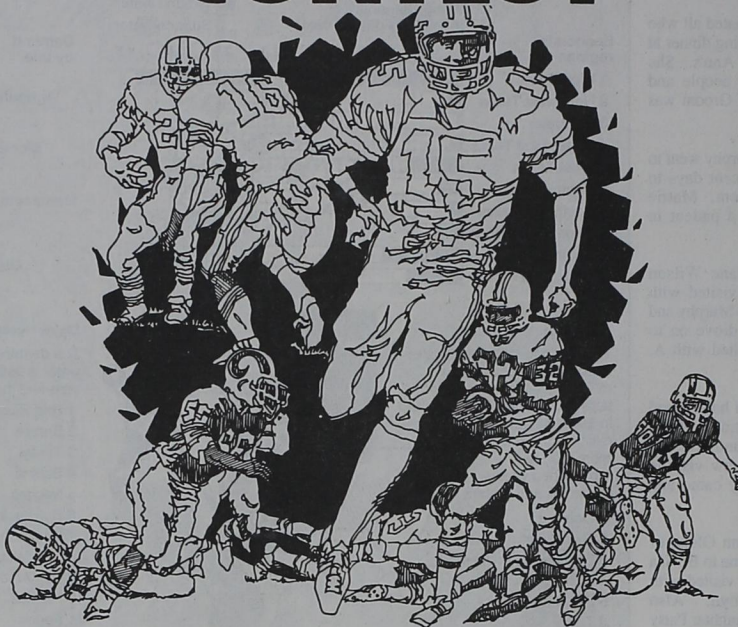

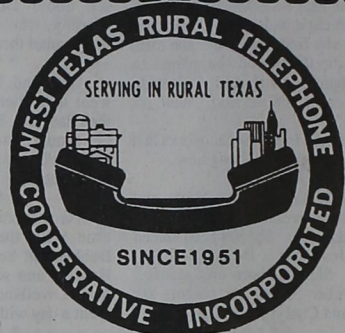
