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

Nobody likes every kind of weather

Nobody that anybody can stand, anyway. Maybe a few fluffheads. A few pom-pom girls. Mr. Greenjeans and Norman Vincent Peale. For the rest of us, weather can be a pain.

Personally, wind has always drawn my criticism - not that it ever stopped blowing because of it. But you know what I mean.

It's true, you have to have wind to keep the rocks weathering. Without wind vou'd have no evaporation. And without evaporation, you'd have no clouds. And without clouds, you'd have no rain. Without rain, you'd have no crops or vegetation. And without vegetation, nobody would eat. And without food, nobody would run marathons.

The problem is that wind is always throwing its weight around. It's not modest like snow and rain, elements that would never harm anybody if wind would just mind its own business.

Hurricanes are a good example. Tornados aren't bad, either. You couldn't have a good spaghetti western without wind to make Clint Eastwood's face dirty.

Wind, they tell us, is what made it possible for would-be Americans to get out of Europe. Without it, they'd still be paddling in the Atlantic. Wind causes skirts to fly in the air, thereby exciting sick men - not to mention the rest of us.

Without wind, there'd be no chillfactor, or wind-aided times in the 100meter dash. Wind blew Dorothy into the land of Oz, and made Judy Garland enough money to overdose on life.

Like all super stars, wind is cocky. Its arrogance can be felt almost any day this side of Tulsa. It can make the faces of women look like men - and men look like catcher's mitts.

It can make dogs walk sideways, and carry a child's favorite balloon around the world and back again.

Wind can make a mess out of people's yards. It can also blow the leaves into another county, sparing you from even having to make use of a rake.

CRP sign-up dates

Farmers interested in placing cropland in the government's Conservation Reserve Program will get another opportunity to do so during the Feb. 9-27 sign up period.

Land accepted into the CRP must be kept out of production for 10 years and prescribed conservation practices must be followed, he points out. This includes planting the land to grass or trees to prevent wind and water erosion, with costs shared by the government.
