MISD superintendent resigns; board adopts new discipline policy

The MISD board of trustees against them.

approved a new discipline option and MISD superintendent Bill Everett resigned, effective Sept. 1st at a special meeting of the school board Tuesday night.

A crowd of about 200 people were gathered in the Merkel High Library for the special meeting. Everett silenced the crowd as he opened the meeting with his

decision to retire. The meeting was aired live on KTXS tv's 6 p.m. broadcast. Everett announced his decision with this letter to the Board of Education. It read "I wish to announce my retirement from public education effective September 1, 1987. I am grateful to have served under one of the outstanding boards of education in this state. You are professional, level headed, and dedication, giving a great deal of time and energy to a largely thankless job. appreciate your confidence as evidenced by my contract extension to 1990. You have here a group of administrators, faculty, and staff who are dedicated to carrying out the policies you set forth. I am proud of the loyalty

It is difficult to have lived in this community for seven years and to discover that there are those who believe I would have a man on my staff who would even consider using force with the intention to injure. It is tragic to hear on the media that a lead pipe or oversized board might be used in our school. I read increduosly that parents feared their students would be killed or maimed by men whose only commitment is to provide an environment where every child can become all he was born to be.

Many have sought publicly to discredit our schools. Few have stepped forward to defend what you and I have worked so hard to build up. I cannot lower my standards, and live with myself or be true to your trust in me.

I leave the superintendancy hoping that those who remained silent will voice their support of high standards at the polls on April 4th. My wish is for men with your integrity to join on this board, and for continued success in all you do.

State group explains taxpayers rights, responsibilities

Taxpayers can learn how to get property tax relief from their local appraisal district offices, according to Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB)

Patterson said the SPTB staff is working with appraisal districts and local news media to help make taxpayers aware of filing deadlines for property tax exemptions and other forms of property tax relief

'Property owners must file rendition forms by March 31 and apply for exepmptions and special productive valuation by April 30th this year," Patterson said. Taxpayers should file all exemption and productive value applications, as well as rendition forms, with the local appraisal district.

A rendition is a report a property owner makes listing taxable property owned or managed on Jan 1, 1987. On it, a taxpayer can record an opinion on the property's value. "If the owner renders a property value, the appraisal district must notify the owner if it places a higher value on the property," Patterson explained.

Some property owners are required by law to render their property. "Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on Jan. 1st must file a rendition statement with the appraisal district," Patterson said.

The chief appraiser may also require other property owners or managers to render property; if so, the chief appraiser will send a notice and the appropriate rendition form. Property owners must file renditions by March 31. Homeowners can usually get tax relief through residence homestead exemptions. "Homestead exemptions help homeowners because they allow a part of a home's value to be exempt from property taxes. This in turn reduces the amount of property taxes assessed on the house," says Patterson

Farmers and ranchers can also lower their tax bills," Patterson said. "If their land qualifies for productivity valuation, the land will be taxed on its ability to produce, instead of market val-

Productivity valuation comes in two forms, often referred to by the section of the Texas Constitution that porovides them: open-space or "1-d-1" valuation and agricultural or "1-d" valuation.

Property owners who last received homestead exemptions. disabled veterans' exemptions and open-space land valuation do not need to reapply in 1987, unless the chief appraiser requests a new application to confirm the owner's current qualification.

Patterson pointed out, however, that property owners who have not previously received tax releif on their present homesteads or land must apply in 1987. Farmers and ranchers who receive agricultural-use valuation must apply for it annually

People whose property is in more than one county appraisal district have an additional responsibility. They may have to file for exemptions and productivity valuation in each appraisal district in which the property is located. If they do not, taxing units may tax the property on its full market value.

Applications for exemptions and special valuation must be submitted to the appraisal office by April 30th

Complete information on tax exemptions and rendition requirements is in a pamphlet SPTB produces, "Taxpayers Rights,

Remedies, Responsibilities." The pamphlet also explains how taxpayers can challenge the values placed on their property by protesting to the appraisal review board. The free pamphlet is available from appraisal district offices or from SPTB in Austin.

'Local governments will generate nearly \$9 billion this year Patterson said. "It will help fund necessary services such as public schools, hospitals, fire and police protection, water, utilities and local colleges. "I urge all property owners to learn about the property tax process, to file renidtions and to take advantage of all forms of tax relief available to them," Patterson said.


