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Letters to the Editor

To the Editor:

As a mother of six graduates of Merkel High School, I would like to express my appreciation to the faculty and school board, both past and present, of the Merkel Independent School District.

My children attended MISD from 1973 to 1984. I feel the faculty and school board were responsible for the excellent education my children received. Those six children are graudated with honors. Those six children also received discipline in school and at home as they progressed through school. (Dr. Spock was not a household name in our home.) To impress upon you the quality education they received, one is a graduate of Texas A & M with a B.S. degree in civil engineering, is employed in that career field and is currently working on his masters degree at the University of Houston. One holds a B. S. degree in mathematics and is teaching high school math in another state. Two are currently enrolled in college. plus each holds a responsible job. Two chose to marry shortly after graduating from MISD, both do have background in bookkeeping and office procedures.

They all received a part or all of the foundation for their education in the MISD system. The older children received only part, as they entered MISD as a senior and the other a sophomore.

My reasons for writing this letter, however, are two-fold. In the twenty three years that I have had children in public school systems, this is the first time I have felt overwhelmingly compelled to speak out concerning a situation such as the present one at MISD. In addition to my concerns, the recent flood of letters to the editor of the Abilene Reporter News has incited me to attempt to make clear the misconception involving the school discipline program (ie) the belief that concerned parents and citizens are opposing discipline, per

There is a small percentage of parents "hysterical" if you will, who are loudly voicing their opinion against "corporal punishment." They too feel justified in their opposition. There are those who feel spankings for serious or repeated infraction are necessary. They are, however, concerned with the degree to which spankings are administer-

The parents want the choice whether their child is to be spanked or not spanked. The parents of my daughter's freshman math class in Almagordo, N.M. were given that choice. It is not a new concept-- that was in 1970.

These parents also want a female faculty member, with a female witness, to administer the spankings to female students.

TV coverage of the concerned parents meeting did not give adequate coverage of the "constructive" ideas that were given.

I was impressed by the high school student who spoke to the group under rather adverse circumstances. He was applauded by a large percentage of those in attendance when he left the podium. I feel he improved others as well as myself.

I signed the petition against Corporal Punishment for two reasons. One: I was appalled when I saw the bruises on the body of the MISD student. Two: I do not believe in corporal punishment; if one refers to Webster's New World Dictionary, one will find that the juxtaposition of "corporal" and "punishment" denotes a deplorable connotation.

Our young parents are faced with the teachings of Dr. Spock, pediatricians, psychologists, and psychiatrists telling them how mentally and physically harmful it is to spank children. This concept was also taught in HECE classes my daughter was enrolled in while in junior high and high schools in Arizona, Missouri and Texas. The basic premise in the teachings is to divert the child's attention to a posotive activity rather than use negative reinforcement or spankings. She has since learned the value of spanking as well as a hug and love as versus continued diversionary

tactics which lead to mother

becoming frazzled. Let us hope other young parents, or parents of any age for that matter, will realize that discipline beyond diversion is sometimes necessary. Discipline must begin at home and at an early age. Not when the child reaches school age and has already formed habits and characteristics that will follow the child through life.

In the eleven years my children were enrolled in the MISD there have been a number of obstacles which MISD has had to overcome: a fire, an influx of students

causing over-crowding, loss of tax revenues due to bankruptcy of a major business, the general state of the economy, and last but not necessarily least, House Bill 72.

I believe the school board and faculty should be applauded for bringing our school up to the high standards of academics that MISD students now enjoy.







Democratic president frontrunner Gary Hart met with members of the House Democratic Caucus last week, then went on to address the Senate. Hart endorsed the "Save The Family Farm" bill, sometimes called the Harkin-Hightower" bill. He went one-up on the farm bill's sponsor, Democratic rival Richard Gephardt, by suggesting even more far reaching measures such as collective bargaining powers for farmers. Democtratic politicians across the country seem to be lining up in favor of the Texas-written alternative to the current costly and unpopular farm law.

There is action in the Legislature to promote "truth-in-advertising" on constitutional amendments. I have co-authored a "Clear language" bill with Rep. Bob Richardson (R-Austin) that would require that proposition wording on the ballot would clearly explain to voters what they are deciding. Too often, constitutional amendments are worded to sell their idea rather than to inform the voters. The most flargant example of this is perhaps the recent amendment to do away with the state's 100 year long prohibition of branch banking. Fearful that the voters would not accept a change in the banking laws, the authors of the amendment specified wording to "fullservice banking" on the ballot. The bi-partisan effort by Rep. Richardson and myself would end this type of deception.

History was made last week when 82 percent of the House Republicans voted for increased taxes under the Clements tax plan. The tax bill which passed the House increases the sales and gasoline taxes on a permanent basis. A number of rural Democrats voted against the tax, saying it was part of a larger plan to gut services in rural areas like small school funding and the Extension Service. It was the contention of those Democrats that the bill making the spending decisions should be laid out on the table before asking Texans to pay more garding chemical control, har-

Depending on weather conditions the next few months, the disease once again could reduce yields sharply, says Dr. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M

University System. The fungus-caused disease successfully "over-summered" last year and then infected the new wheat crop in the fall, Horne explains. Infected fields have been observed from South Texas to the Red River

"With the current mild weather and good moisture conditions over much of the state, the disease could be devestating," says

The Extension Service has monitoring devices located over the state to track the disease and determine its development. Horne points out. These devices trap the disease-causing spores. The devices are checked weekly and reports are issues via a special radio network. Reports also go to county Extension agents, who in turn, advise farmers.

"We are working hard to minitor the situation as closely as possible so that a farmer can make an intelligent decision revesting the crop for grain or grazing it out," Horne points out. 'In addition to that, we are continuing to evaluate the suspectibility of various wheat varieties and to test the effectiveness of different fungicides.
