## Carriker says current proposed state spending bill will close schools across Texas

Gov. Clements' continued vow to veto new state taxes will mean very severe cuts in programs and huge increases in local property taxes, state Representative Steve Carriker (D-Roby) announced this week.

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The appropriations bill adopted by the Texas House of Representatives last week makes major categories of state spending contingent on passage of an adequate revenue-raising bill. If the Legislature failts to approve the required tax measure, slated cuts in basic state services will automatically take effect.

"The House appropriations bill mandates grave consequences for the entire state," Carriker said, "and our area is by no means exempt.





The House took the first step to avoid closing our state's public schools, as the Legislature is finally making headway on the state budget. The House last week forwarded to the Senate both a spending plan and a tax bill to fund it. The \$38.4 billion state budget adequately funds basic state services without excessive spending. The final face of the tax measure will be shaped to a great extent by the Senate, while the House spending plan should remain largely intact.

In trimming state spending, the House voted to eliminate the Texas Commission of the Arts. The move was requested by 91 percent of my constituents responding to the questionnaire at the beginning of the regular session. A portion of the funds previously used for the Arts Commission were transferred to deal with the child abuse problem in Texas.

In the frenzy of trying to package a spending plan, some create jobs and diversify its legislators get out of hand. One Republican proposed to take





# Save-the-Family-Farm Act will do what it claims

#### By Jim Hightower Texas Agriculture Commissioner

The Save-the-Family-Farm Act is the one farm proposal before Congress that will do exactly what its name says --save America's family farm system.

Drafted in dozens of grassroots rural forums across the country, the Save-the-Family-Farm Act is sponsored by Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Congressman Richard Gephardt (D-MO).

Specifically, the Save-the-Family-Farm Act is the one option offered to Congress that could help Texas farmers start earning a profit again, according to a study recently released by Texas A&M University. A&M's policy analysts found that the Save-the-Family-Farm Act would do the most to increase farm prices and profits at the same time it would drastically cut taxpayer subsidies. (See charts.)

Of the 640,000 full-time commercial farmers that remain in the U.S., about 120,000 are predicted to be put out of business before this bill can help them. Another 160,000 are on the brink of broke, but this Act would save at least 44,000 of them immediately, and the debt restructuring provisions would let another 120,000 work their way back to financial health during the next 10 vears

#### Taxpayer Relief

By selling America's farm commodities in the marketplace instead of to the government's warehouses, our legislation zeroes out the humongous sums that taxpayers have been forced to pay in the form of crop subsidies to farmers, conglomerates and syndicates. Our supply-management approach would eliminate all crop subsidy payments to farmers, saving taxpavers \$18 billion in its first year, and \$22 billion thereafter. Under this Act the only taxpayer outlays are for Food for Peace purchases, a conservation reserve and a disaster reserve.

#### **Debt Restructuring**

In addition to providing a significant tax savings, the Act defuses a massive 'debt bomb' that is set to go off in our agricultural economy. The debt owed by American farmers is a staggering \$205 billion -- more than the combined debts of Mexico and Brazil. Under current farm policy, at least one-fourth of that debt (\$66 billion) cannot be repaid, precipitating either a massive federal bailout of farm lenders or causing a default of crash proportions



The Save-the-Family-Farm Act now before Congress was developed during dozens of farmers' meetings held around the country, like this one held last year in St. Louis, Missouri. Here, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower addressed the crowd of more than 2,000 farmers who came from 40 states to the gathering.

Eating this debt, either by public or private institutions, will result in an estimated increase in consumer interest rates of two to 2.5 percent. By preventing default on more than half of the \$66 billion in otherwise unrecoverable farm debt, the Save-the-Family-Farm Act also softens this major blow to consumers.

#### **Falling Farm Prices**

Of course, someone has to pay the true cost of America's food production. Since 1981, farmers have been forced to pay by receiving ever-lower prices that have fallen well beneath their breakeven costs. In these last six years, the farmers' share of U.S. food expenditures has fallen \$18.8 billion (with inflation removed), even though consumer expenditures have risen by 30 percent. Consumers have been paying more and farmers getting less. It's as simple as that

Since 1981, farmers have seen their wheat prices fall from \$4.21 per bushel to \$2.42 -- a 42 percent drop. Yet in that time, a box of Wheaties has gone from \$1.04 to \$1.41 -- a 36 percent increase. In the manufacture of many food items, conglomerates can hold prices down on the farm and up on the shelf, pocketing the difference. The majority of consumers have accepted this practice without major outcry because the price increases have been modest but steady

#### Sharing the Cost

competitive family farmers producing our food, their share of the consumer's food expenditure must at least allow them to break even. The Save-the-Family-Farm Act achieves this goal by reestablishing a fair price floor at a costof-production level for several of our basic commodities.

This floor will pump farm-saving income directly from the marketplace to thousands of family farmers, and it will produce either no increase, or a very modest increase, in consumer prices. For example, going back to the 1981 price the farmer received for wheat would increase the value of wheat in a box of Wheaties by only 1.5 cents. Since General Mills has already raised the price of Wheaties by 37 cents a box in the last six years, it can certainly afford to absorb that 1.5-cent increase now.


