Hunter's Insight

§ Archery season begins Saturday (Oct. 3rd), hailing the beginning of the real hunting season. Birds are fun, but the serious hunting is big game. During archery season, a hunter may use his entire tag if way, they would be larger he is capable, but he may not exceed the four deer limit in both archery and regular season.

Reaching the limit during archery season is difficult anyway, in spite of the 4 million plus deer population in Texas this year. Texas Parks & Wildlife estimates the archery success rate between seven and ten percent annually.

By far the most popular system for bowhunting deer in Texas is stand hunting over feeders. While this can be effective, it usually d s not produce the most mature deer. Even early in the seasons the most desirable deer will feed

approach would be to position a stand in heavy brush along the route to a feeder in anticipation of catching one of the older deer. While you would see less deer this

Speaking of large deer, the potential for record book deer is good for our general area. Boone and Crockett records list a Taylor County deer in the top 50 best deer ever shot; and, the number 3 nontypical White Tail is from Brady. This is the legendary 70 point

Lone Star Brewery buck that was killed in the 1800s and stood as the number 1 non-typical until just a few years ago. Over the next few years, I feel we will see some spectacular bucks from this area. Perhaps one of you will be the one



Amendment No 10: "The constitutional amendment to allow the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation certain personal property not held or used for the production of income."

The amendment would allow the Legislature to exempt most types of tangible personal property (except residential structures) from the property tax. Examples might include boats, planes, and recreational vehicles. Local taxing entities would have the authority to override the state exemption and tax these items. Supporters say that most areas do not tax these items anyway, and those areas that need the revenue this taxation would be allowed to continue to tax tangible personal property. Opponents caution that this exemption will save money for the wealthy, while leaving the less fortunate to make up the difference. Further, a blanket statewide exemption

would be better than the proposed local-option system

Amendment No. 11: "The constitutional amendment providing for the exemption from ad volorem taxation of certain property that is located in the state for only a temporary period of time."

This so-called "treeport" exemption would eliminate the property tax items which are in Texas for less than 175 days for assembling, storing, manufacturing, processing or fabricating. Supporters say the amendment would reinstate a previous tax exemption that has been a proven incentive to economic development in Texas. The exemption would apply, for example, to cloth which is in texas to be sewn into blue jeans. Ten other states offer similar limited exemptions to attract assembling, manufactur-Another 37 states (not including Texas) exempt all inventory goods. Opponents say the amendment would deprive school districts, cities and counties of

AARP wants medicare payments monitored

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) today urged congressional over sight hearings on Medicare's recovery of overpayments to beneficiaries and physicians in Texas.

In Texas, the Health Care Financing Administration, which runs Medicare, inaccurately reimbursed physicians and some beneficiaries for certain physician services. The overpayments total \$15 million. Approximately 15,000 beneficiaries are involved.

"An overpayment of such magnitude needs to be examined and lessons learned. AARP will be monitoring carefully the process by which beneficiaries repay the amount owed to ensure they are being treated fairly. For some beneficiaries repaying even \$100 could be a burden," said AARP Executive Director Cyril F Brickfield.

If the overpayment is not the fault of the beneficiary, and repayment would be a financial hardship, in some cases repayment can be waived. Beneficiaries should contact their local Social Security office or Blue Cross-Blue Shield office for more informa-


