



### Church of Christ dedicates new facility Preacher says morning service







Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines

1. 35-40 years of age . One baseline mammogram

II. 40-50 years of age · A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.



1987 Constitutional Amendments

This is the fifth in a series of informational columns on the constitutional amendments which Texas voters will consider on November 3rd. The amendments are presented in the order in which they will appear on the ballot

#### Amenament No. 17: "The constitutional amendment to define for all purposes the governmental and propriety functions of a municipality."

A city's liability is determined by whether its activities are "governmental" (such as police and fire) or "proprietary" (such as water service or public parks). This amendment could give cities protection from lawsuits similar to the protection state and county governments now enjoy. Proponents note that legislative clarification of city functions will lead to more uniformity in lawsuits against cities. Opponents say that the courts should continue to interpret the city's liability on a case-by-case basis. Opponents also say this amendment will not lower municipal costs for liability insurance. Amendment No. 18: "The constitutional amendment relating to the creation, operation and financing of jail districts." This amendment would allow multiple counties and communities to work together to create regional jail facilities. Supporters say this could be a valuable cooperative tool for rural areas. Any taxes levied by the jail district and any bonds issued by the district would require the approval of local voters.

'In addition, the taxable values of industrial, mineral and agricultural properties have been declining, and homeowners and other owners of real estate have been making up the difference."

The decline in value has been particularly pronounced for oil and gas reserves. "The price of oil and natural gas has been going of Clergy and Churches in Social downhill since 1981," Patterson observed. "In addition, oil and gas reserves in Texas have been shrinking, in part caused by price drops that discouraged exploration for new reserves. Declining reserves are also the result of the advanced state of production in Texas-- all the large, easy-to find fields have been discovered."

During 1985, the taxable value of Texas mineral reserves dropped by \$21.8 billion, or 26 percent, according to SPTB studies. This declines in oil prices that took place in early 1986.
