Wellman eliminates Trent

The zone champion Trent Gorilla's season came to a crashing halt last Friday when the Wellman Wildcats shocked the 'Rilla's 62-20 in the District 4 playoffs. The Wildcats, who came into the game as the West Zone co-champs, used their quickness to roll up 553 yards offense and the pursuit to shut down the potent 'Rilla ground game. Even though Lewis Knapp picked up 131 yards, it took him 27 carries as the Wildcat defense here. keyed on him all night long.

The game opened with Trent kicking off and Tony Timmons brought the ball back 80 yards for six Wildcat points. J. Rowden ran in the extra point and the 'Cats had a quick 7-0 lead with only 13 seconds gone in the game.

The 'Rillas came right back Behind good gainers by Knapp and Mike Payne, the 'Rilla offense drove the length of the field before the drive stalled and Scott O'Kelly put the Rillas on the board with a 33 yard field goal. That brought the score to 7-4 with 7:36 left in the



The 'Rillas racked up 498 yards of offense with 401 coming from the ground game. Lewis Knapp led the way with 127 yards on 18 carries and Oden had 80 yards on 10 carries.

The 3rd week of the season saw the Guthrie Jaguars hand the Rillas their only regular season defeat 28-20. The loss was a tough one for Trent to digest as the 'Rillas led 20-8 at the half. Despite the loss, the 'Rillas got good efforts from Knapp with 111 yards on 17 carries and Brian Massey who had 5 receptions for 61 yards.

The following weekend, Trent traveled to Ira to take on the Bulldogs in the first district game of the season. The 'Dogs were never really in the game as the Trent defense, led by Payne, Chris Jones and Hunt, and a strong rushing attack led by Knapp, Oden, Noe and Cipi Flacon dominated the 'Dogs with Trent rolling to a 36-0 shutout win.

Two weeks later the Hermeligh Cardinals got a taste of Knapp and the salty Trent defense; losing to Trent 40-19. Knapp led the 'Rillas to the win with 231 yards on 17 carries and four touchdowns, all in the first half while the Trent defense, led by Payne and Scott O'Kelly, stuffed the Cards holding them to 143 yards on the night.




