

# 1987 was a good year for Texas agriculture

1987 was a banner year for the production of many agricultural commodities in Texas despite

some extremes in the weather. as winter conditions were generally mild. However, a late spring freeze devestated fruit and berry crops and also damaged the state's pecan and wheat crops.

Cash receipts from agricultural production should total about \$10 billion for 1987, up about one-anda-half billion dollars from 1987. would put cash receipts back at the level they were two years ago. So, essentially, farmers and
