Stock show draws to a close

A quartet of hard working Garza County 4-H and FFA members helped make the 29th annual Garza County Junior Livestock Association Livestock Show a success. Kathy Gerner, Labeth Jones, Kim Reiter and Rodney Meeks captured the Grand Champion titles at last week's show.

One hundred thirty-eight Garza County youth will receive a total of \$59,537.28 in premiums, add-ons, floor prices, prize money and awards for the 1993 show. This year's sale receipts are up almost \$9,000 from last year's sale.

Reiter, the daughter of Chris and Glenna Reiter, exhibited the Grand Champion Steer at this year's show. The 1240 pound animal brought a premium of \$1,000 from the First National Bank of Post and the Double U Ranch. Reiter is a member of the Post 4-H Club.

Gerner, the daughter of Gerald and Helen Gerner, won the Grand Champion Swine trophy with her Breed Champion Cross at Thursday night's show. She is a member of the Graham 4-H Club.

The Grand Champion Lamb trophy was awarded to Jones, daughter of Darrell and Ruby Jones. A member of Lucky Clover 4-H Club, Jones won with her Medium Wool Breed Champion lamb.

In the Rabbit division, Meeks exhibited the Grand Champion winning with his 1st place Aged Doe. Meeks, a member of Post FFA is the son of Cliff and Dru Ann Laws.

Reserve Grand Champion honors in the Swine division went to Ryan Wulfjen with his Breed Champion O.P.B. He is the son of Urda and Dwainna Wulfjen and a member of the Lucky Clover 4-H Club.

Angel Hammond won Reserve Grand Champion with her Reserve Breed Champion Medium Wool lamb. A member of Post 4-H, she is the daughter of Todd and Angela Hammond.

The Reserve Grand Champion Steer was exhibited by Braden Conner, a member of Post 4-H and the son of Tony and Karen Conner.

LaRinda Ledbetter's 1st place Aged Buck won Reserve Grand Champion in the Rabbit division. She is the daughter of Bruce and Debbie Ledbetter and a member of Graham 4-H Club.

The 29th Annual GCJLA Show and Sale began on Tuesday afternoon, January 19 with 13 steers being weighed in. A total of 137 hogs and 82 lambs were weighed in Wednesday evening and 39 rabbits were checked in Thursday afternoon. Exhibiting these 271 animals were 76 4-H'ers, 42 Post FFA members and 23 Southland FFA members.

Prior to the premium sale on Saturday, awards were presented to outstanding exhibitors. Shawn Pennell was presented the special "Over-all Sportsmanship" buckle for his assistance, hard work and cooperation shown to others throughout the show. Sponsored by Pat Green of Garza-Lynn Counties Farm Bureau, it was presented by GCJLA president, Steve Cooper.

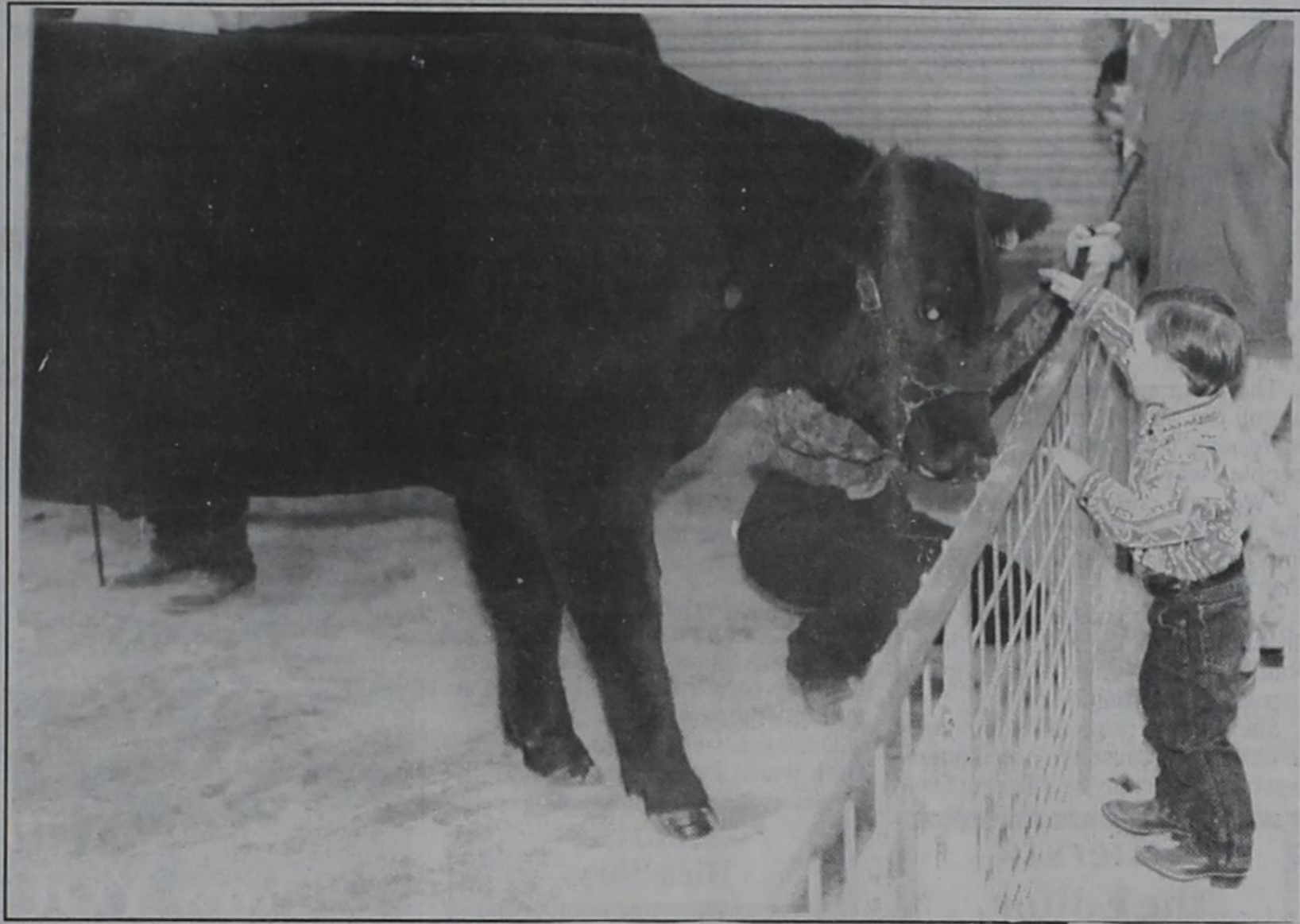
Brooks Connor was presented the "Rate of Gain" buckle and \$200 for his steer which gained a total of 275 pounds in 88 days for a 3.125 pound per day average. Presenting the award was Conner's grandfather, Syd Conner of Conner Herefords, a co-sponsor of the award along with Godbold Inc.

Belt buckles were presented to the top Junior and Senior Showmanship winners in each division. Juniors are exhibitors 13 years of age and younger and Seniors are 14 and over.

GCJLA president Cooper presented buckles sponsored by Quick-Lay Pipeline Inc. to Juniors, Ryan Wulfjen, swine; Rebecca Stelzer, lamb and Brooks Connor, beef.

Garza-Lynn Counties Farm Bureau sponsored showmanship buckles for Seniors. They were presented by Wayne McDonald. Senior winners were: Heath Eagle, swine; Angel Hammond, lamb and Amber Cooper, beef.

Sponsoring all expenses for the Rabbit Show were Junior and Diane Stelzer. Winners of the Showmanship buckles in the Rabbit division were Stephanie

Six Seniors were honored with gifts for their participation and support through the years. Honored were Joel Basinger of Southland High School and Heather Dickson, Heather Wulfjen, Angel Hammond, Brad McDonald and Stephanie Palmer, all of Post High School.

Presenting awards throughout the show were Chelissa Williams, Garza County 4-H Sweetheart; Melissa Williams; Labeth Jones, 4-H Council President; Rebecca Stelzer, Jill Stelzer and Lori Hudman representing Post FFA.

Retired Garza County Extension Agent Syd Conner served as announcer for the show and attorney Rafe Foreman served as auctioneer.

Stanley Young, Lubbock County Extension Agent-Agriculture, served as swine judge with Ronnie Dunn as swine superintendent.

"Big John" Kearney, Vo-Ag instructor from Sterling City served as lamb judge and Rusty Morris was lamb superintendent.

Beef judge was J.D. Ragland, Castro County Extension Agent-Agriculture. Jay Pollard served as beef cattle superintendent with Rafe Foreman assisting.

Jennifer Beckham of Plains judged the rabbit show with Junior Stelzer serving as superintendent.

The association accepted the high bids on the animal floor prices from Plains Hog Company of Lubbock at .40 cents per pound for the hogs; .665 cents per pound for the lambs from Ken Cook of San Angelo and .74 cents per pound from Tom Middleton for the steers.

Special items were donated for auction during the show to earn money for the building fund. Jerry Osborn donated a quilt rack, Ruby Carpenter donated two cakes and two painted sweatshirts were gifts from an anonymous donor. The items raised \$145 for the building fund.

The GCJLA Concession Committee included Ann Nobles, CEA-HE; Mary Basinger, Southland FFA; Jaynie Dickson, Post FFA and Debbie Ledbetter, Garza County 4-H. The Holy Cross Catholic Church Ladies cooked breakfast and lunch on Saturday.

Assisting Diane Graves, Corresponding Secretary, with the bookkeeping during the show and sale were; Andra Dunn, Melanie Morris, Diane Stelzer, Sherry Pollard, Jamie Cooper and Judy Bush.

Serving as officers of the association for 1992-93 have been Steve Cooper, president; Milton Williams, vice-president and Rusty Morris, recording secretary.

Commissioners prepare to battle clinics closure

The abrupt closure of the Post Public Health Center has brought about threatened legal action by the Garza County Commissioner's Court.

Legal action may be delayed pending the outcome of a meeting between Judge Gile Dalby and Bill Powell, administrator of the program run by South Plains Community Action out of Levelland.

The Court, during its regular meeting of Monday, January 25 gave Judge Dalby the go ahead to talk with Powell.

Dalby said of negotiations fail the county will file suit in district court to force the agency to provide services for the county until its contract expires in September.

"As far as I'm concerned they signed a contract for the fiscal year and it is not up until September," said Dalby.

Dalby said officials said the clinic that serves 1,500 people in Garza County was closed because South Plains lost \$80,000.

High winds fuel grass fire 18 miles east of town

High winds that buffeted Garza County Saturday threatened to push a grass fire out of control 18 miles east of town. Post Volunteer fire fighters battled the blaze for the better part of five hours before gaining control and extinguishing the fire.

When fire fighters were called to the fire at noon the winds were moderate. This would change as soon after fire fighters were on the line the winds kicked up, creating a bit of excitement for the firemen.

"They kicked up (the wind) and boy did it take off," said Delbert Rudd, Post Volunteer Fire chief.

Fire fighters fought the high winds to contain the blaze that scorched approximately 1,300 to 1,500 acres of CRP and pasture land.

Thick clouds of black and gray smoke could be seen from town.

Rudd said the fire was contained to the north side of Highway 380 except in a couple of spots where it managed to jump the road. Fireguards on the south side of the highway allowed firemen to quickly extinguish the fire in the two spots it did cross the highway, preventing the fire from gaining a foothold south of the highway where it could have done considerably more damage.

Luckily for the firemen, they were able to keep it away from the highway in other spots because as Rudd said, "when it came up against the highway, it went on across."

Five fire trucks, the county judge's road maintainer and scores of firemen were used to squelch the fire.

Rudd said the cause of the fire is unknown.

Schools host "Black Legacy" educational program

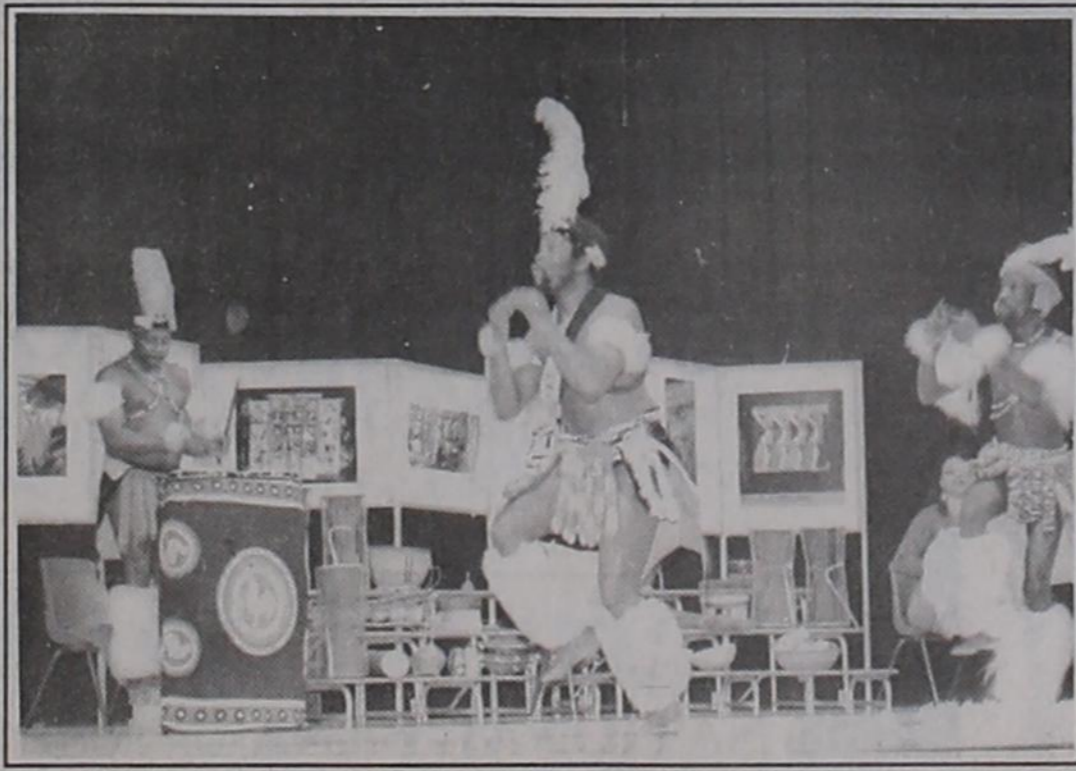
