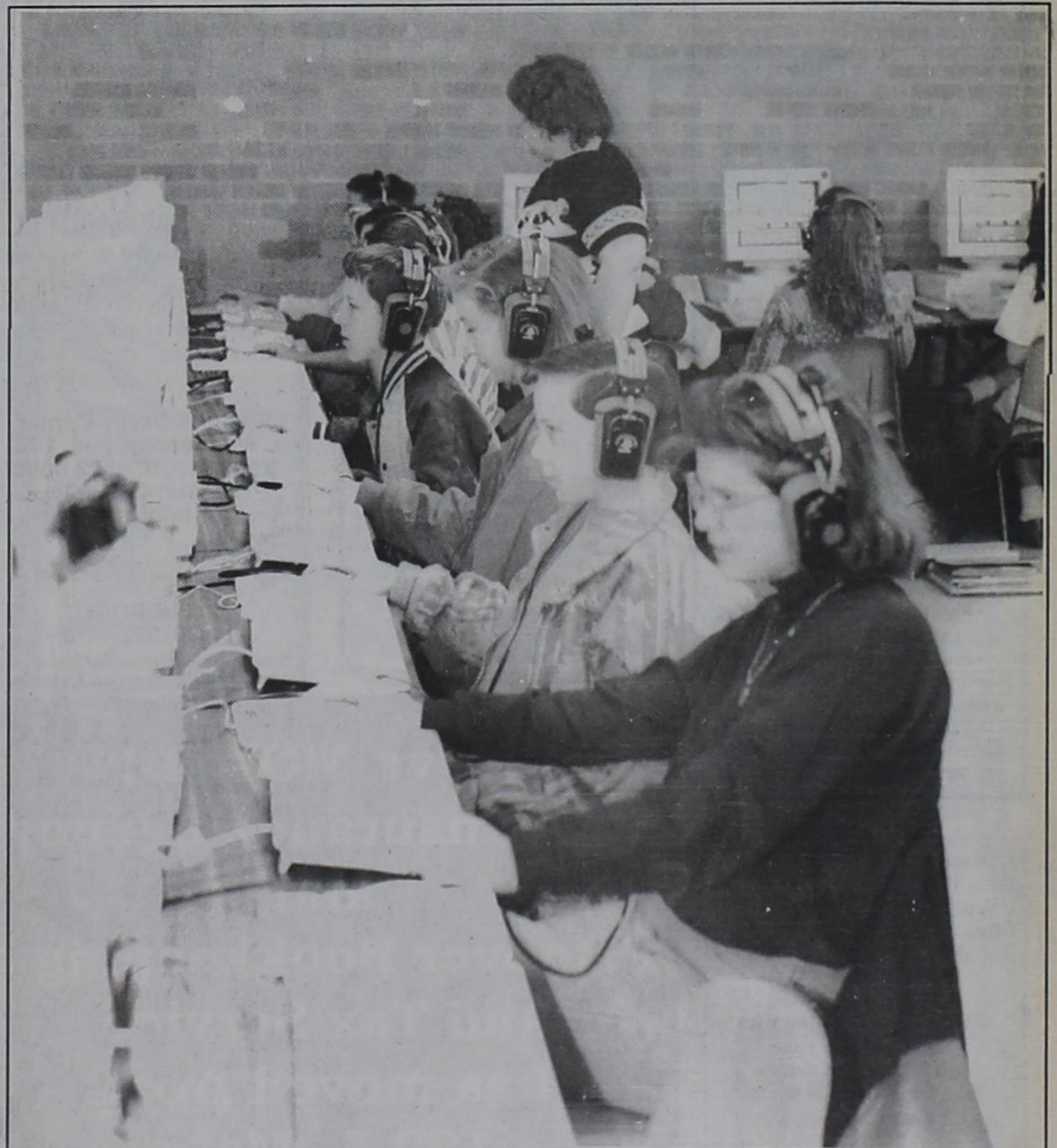

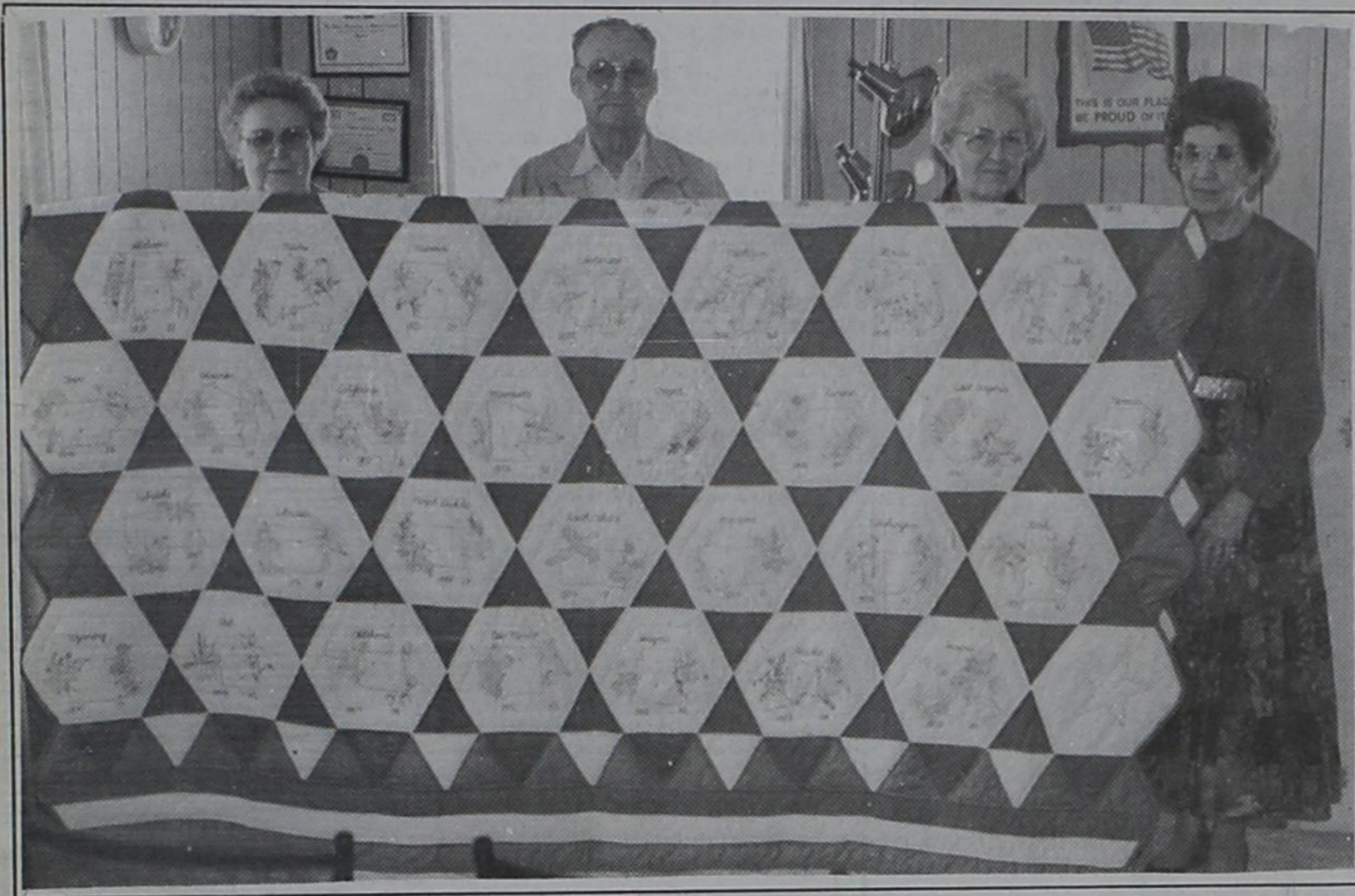

Lady 'Lopes win third straight

With the season winding down and district play just on the horizon, the Post Bold Gold Lady 'Lopes are coming together at the right time. Their latest efforts were wins over Idalou and Crosbyton, avenging losses earlier this season to the same two teams.

Post downed Idalou Tuesday, January 26 in Idalou by a 51-43 count. They came back Friday, January 29 in Post against Crosbyton and downed the Lady Chiefs by the same 51-43 score. The two wins gives the Lady 'Lopes a modest three game winning streak, their longest of the season and raises their record to 4-5 in league play

and 9-13 overall.

"We're playing real well," said Lady 'Lopes head coach Chili Black.

Against Crosbyton, the Lady 'Lopes played three quarters of good solid basketball. The only blemish on the night was a second quarter that saw the Lady 'Lopes score but two points while the Lady Chiefs ran off 11.

Post went into the second quarter seemingly in command of the game with a comfortable 16-8 lead. They were playing with confidence and were aggressive with their defensive pressure.

Crosbyton ran off a quick four points to start the period. The Lady 'Lopes

seemed to right themselves and held the Lady Chiefs at bay until there were three minutes left in the period.

Cara Cash gave Post its only points in the quarter when she connected on a shot with 3:29 left in the quarter. Even though the Lady 'Lopes offense was almost non-existent at this point, Post still held a lead of 18-12.

In the final three minutes of the half though, Crosbyton overtook the struggling Lady 'Lopes and at the buzzer held a slim, 19-18 lead.

As the third quarter began to unfold it looked like the Lady 'Lopes offensive

Time runs out on Antelopes in loss to Crosbyton

Time ran out on the Post Bold Gold Antelopes as they lost a close hard fought, 58-52, contest against the visiting Crosbyton Chiefs Friday night in Post.

Post had the Chiefs on the ropes as time ran out. The 'Lopes, down most of the night by double digits, overcame a 15 point, 49-34 Crosbyton lead heading into the final period to pull to within four, 54-50 with :49 seconds left.

The fourth quarter effort saw the 'Lopes hold the highly touted Chiefs to a single field goal in the final eight minutes. Crosbyton's saving grace was their ability to connect on crucial free throws down the stretch.

Crosbyton took control of the game early. Pushing the ball up court and smothering the 'Lopes on defense, the Chiefs broke open a tight (8-6) contest with nine points in the final 1:45 of the opening quarter for a 17-5 lead.

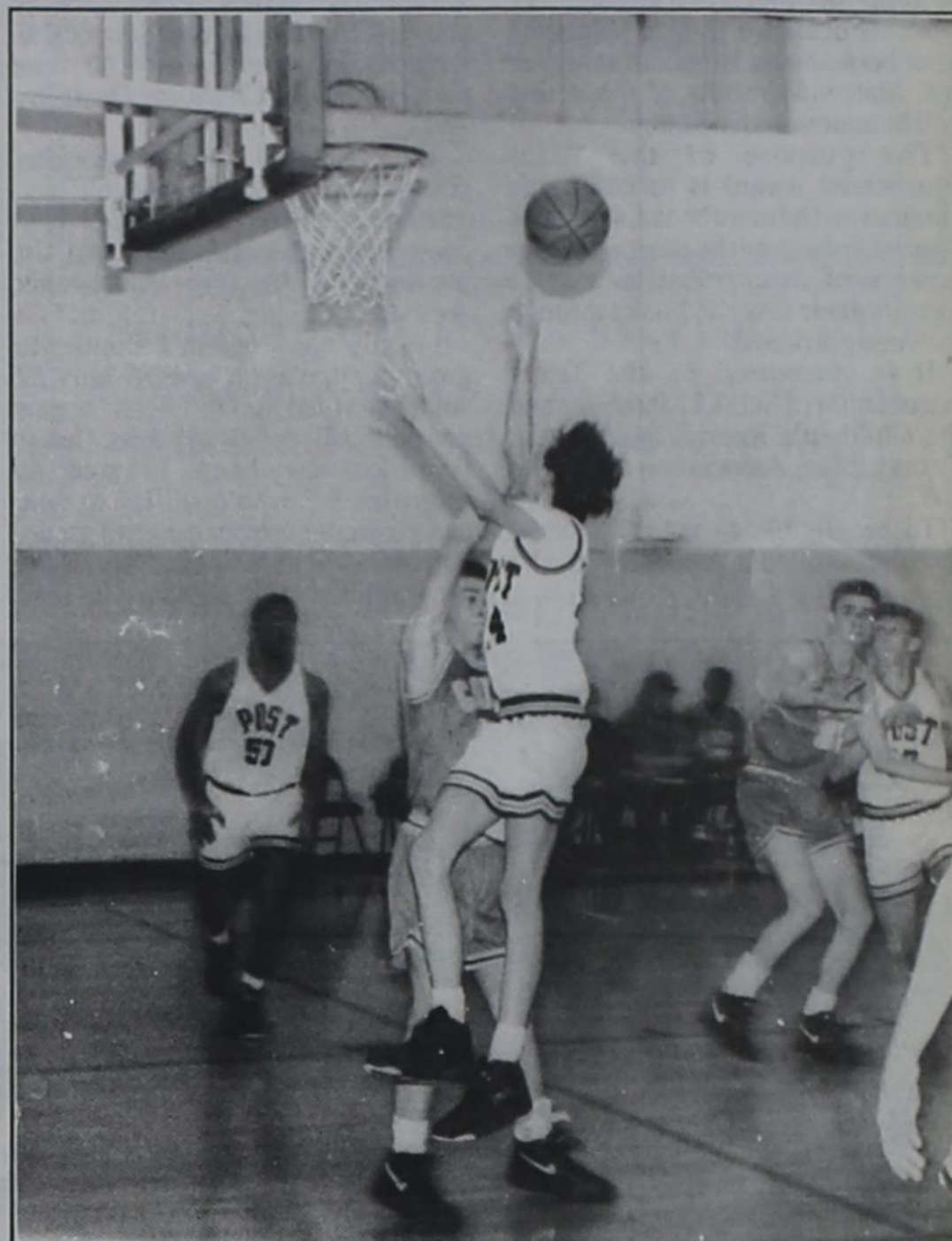
Post righted its ship some what in the second period as Cody Bain and Bodie Simpson hit on successive three pointers to pull the 'Lopes back to within 10 at 21-11.

The Chiefs built the lead to 14 at 25-11 and 29-15 before the 'Lopes answered. Ricky Jefferson cut the lead to nine at 29-20 when he hit a three pointer from the same spot Bain and Simpson had earlier in the period. A late Crosbyton flurry as time ran out in the half pushed the Chiefs' lead back to 14 heading into the locker room.

Post clamped down on defense in the opening of the third quarter and a Brody Moore lay up mid-way through the period pulled the 'Lopes back to within 9 at 37-28.

Post went cold though and the Chiefs outscored the 'Lopes 12-6 down the stretch in the period to take the 49-34 lead into the final period, setting the stage for Post's run.

The 'Lopes slowly chipped away at

the Chief lead and when Terry Curtis hit a three pointer with :49 left in the game, Post was within striking distance at 54-50.

Crosbyton was able to connect on two free throws and the 'Lopes couldn't get a shot to drop until only :09 was left showing on the clock. By then it was too late and a foul with one second left gave the Chiefs their final two points of the contest.

"They played their hearts out," said Post head coach Mitch Rasberry. "I'm not satisfied with a loss, but they (the 'Lopes) can feel good about themselves."

Rasberry said the 'Lopes were well prepared for the Chiefs and the preparation showed.

"We handled every situation they threw at us," continued Rasberry. "We ran well and we handled their press."

Idalou

Post played a big Idalou team close all game on the Wildcats home floor Tuesday, January 26 in a 61-53 league loss.

The 'Lopes fell behind at the end of the first period, 17-12 and were never able to over come the Wildcats early lead.

Heading into the final two periods down 36-26, the 'Lopes fought to a draw in the third quarter as both teams scored 13. The 'Lopes were able to cut into the Wildcat lead a little in the final period, but not enough to win the contest.

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Bluebonnet readers choose favorites

The votes are in and Post students participating in the Texas Bluebonnet Master list selection process for 1992-93 voted *My Daniel* by Pam Conrad as their top choice in the annual event. A total of 145 Post Elementary students qualified to help select the three books on the Bluebonnet Master list. Statewide results of the voting will be announced in March.

The purpose of the Texas Bluebonnet Award is to encourage children to read more books, to explore a variety of current books, to develop powers of discrimination and to identify their favorite books through the voting process.

It is sponsored by the Texas Association of School Librarians and the Children's Round Table of the Texas Library Association for grades 3-6.

To be eligible to vote, a student must be enrolled in grades 3-6 and be

attending a school registered in the TBA program. The students must have read (or heard read aloud) five or more of the books on the list.

Along with *My Daniel* which garnered 23 votes, Post students selected *Houdini Box* by Selznick as their second choice and *The True Confessions of Charlotte Doyle* by Avi.

There were 75 students who read five or more books; 28 students read 10 or more; eight read 15 or more and 34 completed all 20 books on the list provided by the Texas Bluebonnet Award.

Locally the program continues to grow in popularity. In 1989 only 27 students voted for the TBA winner and none had read all 20 books. Today, Post Elementary boasts 145 students in grades 3-5 who qualified to vote and six students from the sixth grade. Another sign of the popularity of the program is the 34 students who read

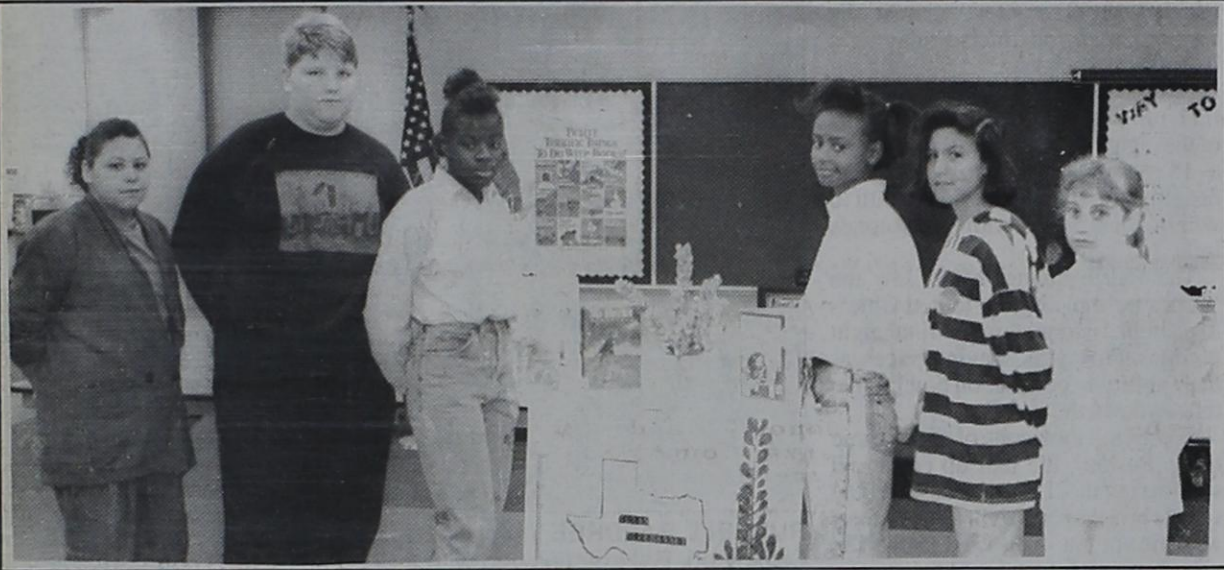
all 20 books. Statewide, 235,211 students participated and voted in the TBA last year.

School officials want to extend a special recognition and thanks to each individual who helped make this year's reading program the success it was. Mrs. Don Tatum helped track down the books and saw to it that they were delivered as the students needed them. Janette Bell provided copies of the Bluebonnet books at the public library and recorded summer reading rosters and Nancy Vaughn, middle school librarian helped provide extra copies of the Bluebonnet Books for the elementary students.

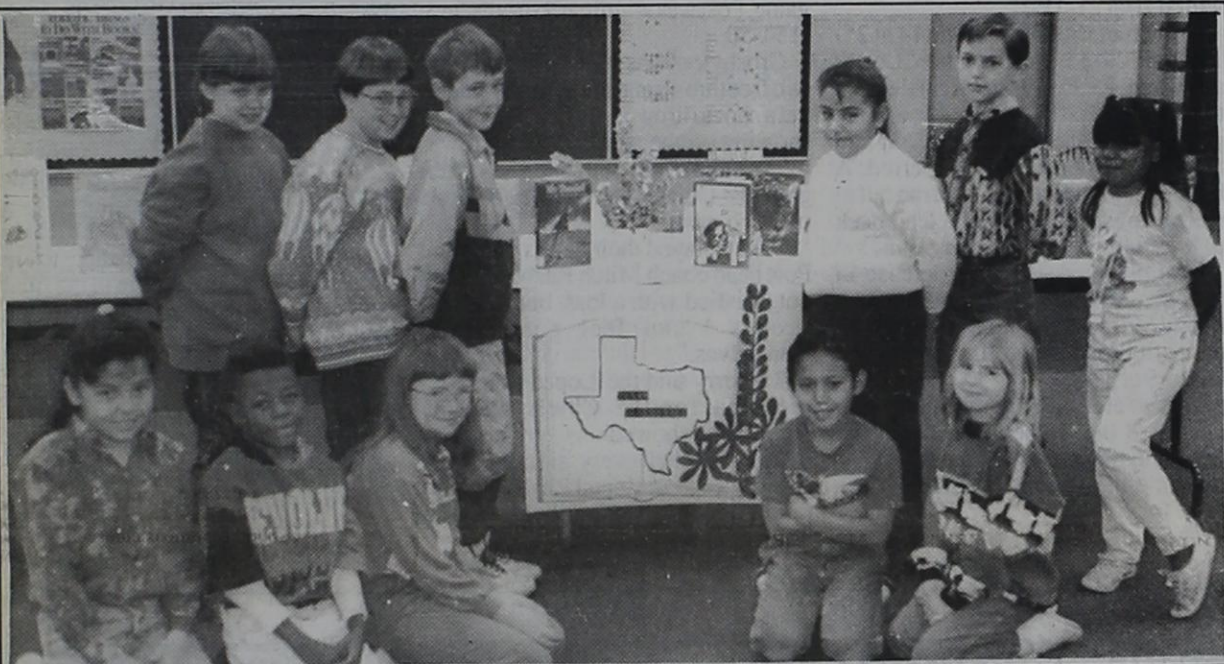

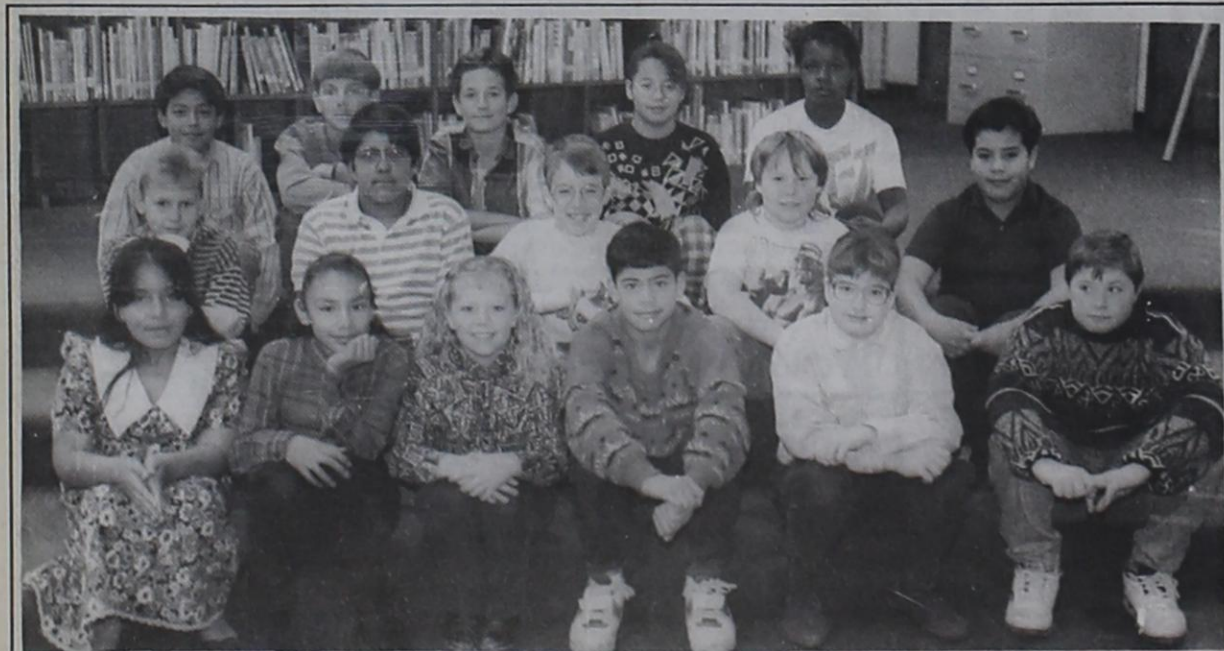

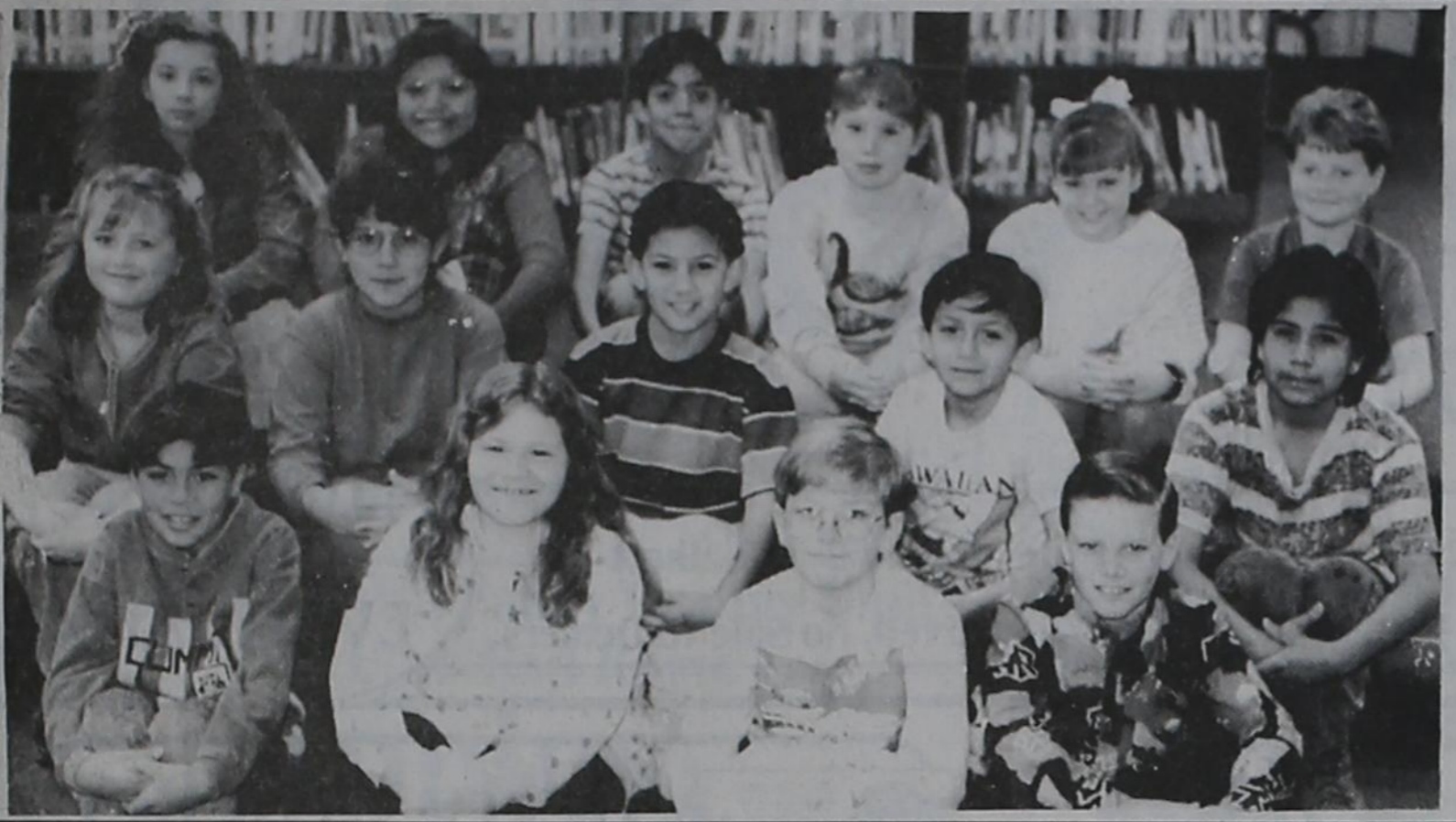

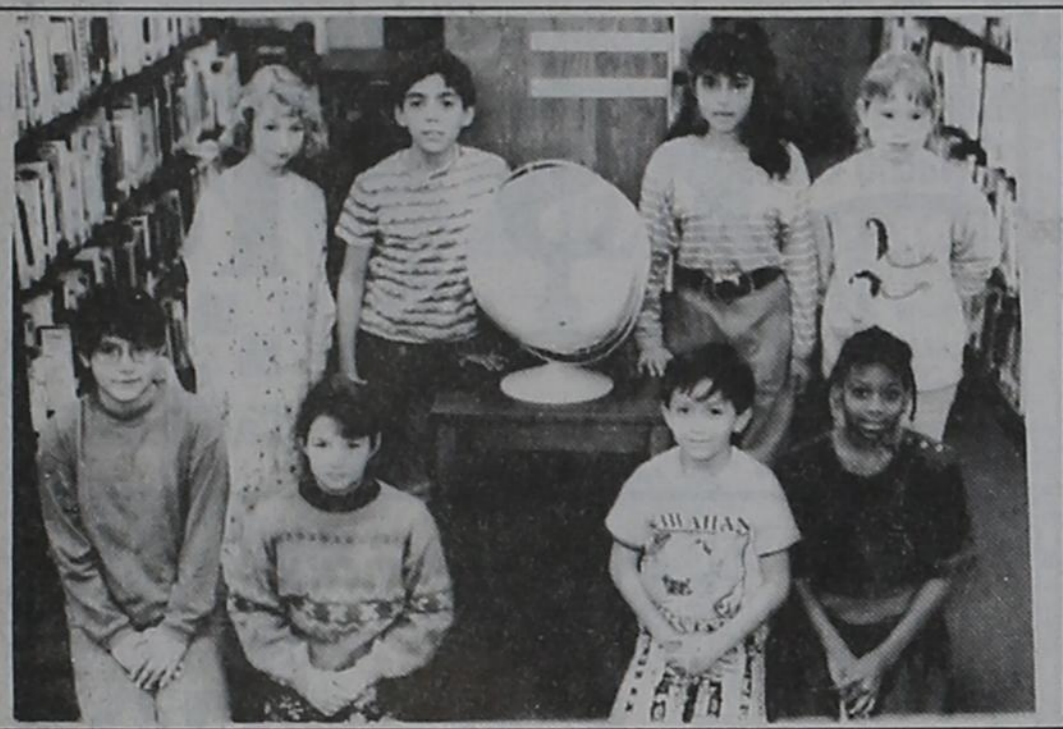

Organic Cotton New Topic of Discussion

The latest "buzz words" around the South Plains, in cotton circles, seems to be the newly found interest in organic cotton. There has been a good deal of interest in organic cotton production in Garza County and there appears to be some information and insight ahead for folks with a genuine interest in this specially grown commodity. Organic Cotton Production will be the topic of focus at a seminar for interested growers. The program will be sponsored by the TDA's Organic Certification Program and is set for Monday, February 8 in the auditorium at the Texas A & M Research and Extension Center, north of Lubbock. The center is located 1/2 mile east of Interstate 27 on FM 1294, just north of the Lubbock Airport.

The morning session will begin at 8:30 p.m. and will last until noon. Topics on the morning agenda will include discussion on management of organic cotton production and regulations and procedures required for certification.

After an "on your own lunch", the afternoon session will begin at 1:30 p.m. with information on marketing organic cotton and manufacturing organic cotton

products.

The newly formed Texas Organic Cotton Growers Association will discuss the organization's goals and membership procedures beginning at 3:30 p.m. and the seminar will conclude at approximately 4:30 p.m.

There is no official word on the cost of the seminar, if any. However, if you are interested in possible organic cotton production, this meeting will hold the resource folks to help answer your questions. There will certainly be some concern with the Texas Boll Weevil Diapause program as it relates to Garza County.

Also, from limited conversations with the TDA, it appears that the certification process will be an item of much discussion.

When all of the stipulations and certifications are outlined, we should all have a better idea of just how organic cotton production fits into the scheme of Garza County. However, at prices reaching into the range of \$1 to \$1.50 per pound, this commodity could fit nicely.

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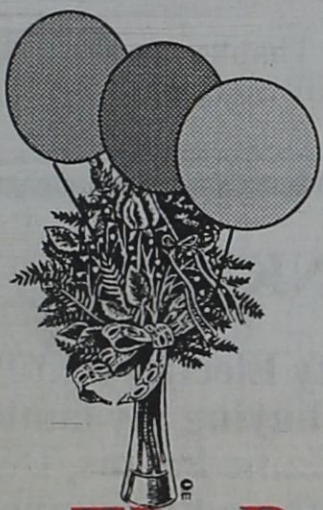


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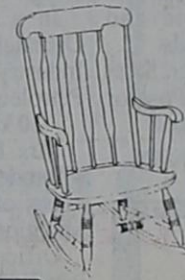
