

The council approved the appointment of Mike Prather as an alternate judge on a temporary basis. At 7:55 p.m. the council

The council came out of closed session at 8:55 p.m. No action was taken on the proposed land purchases. The council adjourned at 9:35 p.m.

In a separate action, city manager Terry said that a new police officer has been hired and will begin work on July 1.

Tornado Strikes Near Lazbuddie

Wednesday night. Coker and Blackburn were standing outside a barn at the farm four miles south of Highway 86 on FM 1172, when a funnel dipped out of the cloud overhead and touched down about only a

touched down about only a few yards east of the house. "When the dirt started flying, we took off for the cellar," Blackburn said. Coker's wife April and a brother-in-law joined them in the cellar while the tornado ripped through three quonset ildings, moved a farm tractor about 20 feet toward the house, snapped electricity poles, and tore part of the roof off the barn where the two had been standing. The twister continued north, scattering the debris, overturning two center pivot sprinklers and snapping off about 15 more poles along

Don't tell Joe Don Coker morning repairing the lines. his friend Mike Black- Windows in the house were also broken and the house was full of dirt and debris afterwards. Donnie and April Coker spent Wednesday night with relatives.

By Thursday morning, friends and neighbors gathered to assist with cleaning up the mess. Pickups pulling trailers, front loaders, graders, farmers and teenagers all were on hand to help.

Amarillo TV meteor-ologists did not describe the twister as a tornado. Instead they referred to the rotating cloud as a "dustnado."


R. Trevino **Buried In** Bovina

An additional mass will be held Saturday, June 15, at 10 a.m. at Sacred Heart Church in Menard. Burial will be at Garden of Memories in Menard.


Mrs. Bermea passed away Tuesday, June 11, 2002, at her residence.

Division. Officers found gambling violations at all three locations. A typical violation was one where "cash" prizes and prizes that exceed the state limit were given to winners at the stores. Geries said there were other violations of state laws gambling allegations governing 8-liner parlors.

The businesses, all located gambling promotion, keeping a gambling place, possession of a gambling device and possession of gambling paraphernalia. All charges are Class A misdemeanors.

Only the owners of the apparently without a businesses were arrested, although under state law, both employees and customers Things changed abruptly this could have been arrested and charged too.

Don't bet on either. There are some things in life that even a big dose of goodness can't change.





Charlsie Eubank Submits Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for submitting in this week's issue. This month we are featuring Charlsie Eubank.

By CHARLSIE EUBANK I was born Janaury 5, 1907 in Greenville, Texas, Hall County, to Edd and

Sara Courtney. I had one brother. His name was William but we called him Bill. He learned to ride a bicycle, but I never did. I did learn to play the piano and spent a good deal of time playing it.

My parents had a farm. I loved to help work on the farm. We would raise a garden every year and we canned alot of fruit and vegetables.

We moved NW of Idalou, Texas, and that was when I met Gilbert Eubank. We were married on July 12, 1925 in Slaton, Texas. Gilbert said he didn't want any children, he wanted a house with a picket fence around it. We went on to have seven children: four boys and three girls.

The girls took piano lessons and I helped them learn to play. I played for church services and my own enjoyment.

We had a neighbor who had an old mule that kept coming to the house at night. One night Gilbert decided to tie him to the tree. Well the kids had misplaced the rope, so he used a chain to tie him to the tree. Later that night we heard a commotion out where the mule was. Upon checking, the mule had wrapped the chain around the tree, fell down and was choking. We all went out in our night clothes and tried to help him, but he died before

we could get him loose. Gilbert explained to the neighbor what had happened and paid him \$10 for the mule.

We had to work hard on the farm, but had a lot of fun, also. One day Gilbert fun, also. One day Gilbert noticed that his pigs were unusually hungry and they weren't eating their food, so he was on the lookout to see why. He would out why. One of the kids was dropping a wire over an electric fence into their food to watch them jump. After the spanking he got, that didn't happen anymore.

Our best vacation I can remember was when we loaded a 38 Ford truck with a mattress, sleeping quilts, for the kids to sleep in on the ground, and a 55 gallon

drum full of gasoline. We traveled throughout New Mexico and Colorado. Gilbert had put a squeeze bulb bicycle horn on the mirror and when we saw something interesting, he would squeeze the horn and point for the kids to look. We went to Carlsbad Caverns and the zoo in Albuquerque, where we saw baby lions and

got to hold them. We ran out of gasoline on the way home and had to buy some at a truck stop. After we left the station, Gilbert learned the station, Gilbert learned he had put diesel in the gas tank. We could barely get up the hills and the truck smoked all the way home. In 1956, after all the kids had married, except for one,

we moved to Bovina, Texas, where we farmed until Gilbert died in 1973.

My friends and I helped to build the Senior Citizens Building in Bovina. We did hand quilting and sold quilts to the public to raise money. This paid for the building and some of the inside work. I lived in the family home

in Bovina until 2000 and then I moved to Prairie Acres and enjoy being here very much. The people are very nice and the atmosphere is great.

425,000 Children Expected To "Read Across Texas"

425,000 children are expected to practice their reading skills and participate in a variety of free programs at their local public libraries throughout the summer.

A partnership between the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and Texas libraries, the Texas Reading Club is a summer reading program that encourages children and their families to become library users and lifelong readers. This year's theme, "Read Across Texas!." invites children to explore the culture, history, and geography of Texas through the portal of books and their local libraries.

Director and Librarian Peggy D. Rudd notes, "Research has shown that children maintain or improve their reading skills if they participate in some kind of summer reading program. That's what makes the Texas Reading Club so important. The interactive programs offered at the local level stimulate kids mentally, physically and culturally, while fostering a lifelong love of books and reading."

Almost 700 Texas libraries are hosting a creative summer reading program for their communities using the "Read Across Texas!" theme. Local Local libraries bring the theme to life with special story times for all ages, reading incentives and prizes donated by local businesses, reading certificates, special speakers and programs, and prize drawings. Artwork for this year's program was created by noted illustrator and artist James Warhola.

New this year, Singer/ Songwriter Willy Welch composed the official Texas Reading Club 2002 theme song, "Reading Across Texas." The playful song will be used by librarians in their programs this summer. The song is recorded on Welch's CD Won't Eat That! Snappy

Library volunteers and Friends of the Library groups help plan special events such as hot air balloon demonstration, communitywide picnics, and magic shows. The Texas Reading Club focuses entire communities on a common goal: to foster the love of reading and books in children.

Particularly in smaller communities, where there may be few free of inexpensive activities available for families, the Texas Reading Club provides an array of free educational and fun activities for the duration of the summer. In addition, children practice their reading skills so they begin school again prepared for success. As a public librarian noted, "Teachers tell us that children who join the reading club do better with maintaining and improving their reading skills over the summer." Since 1958, the Texas State Library and Archives commission has worked with local libraries to implement the Texas Reading Club.


