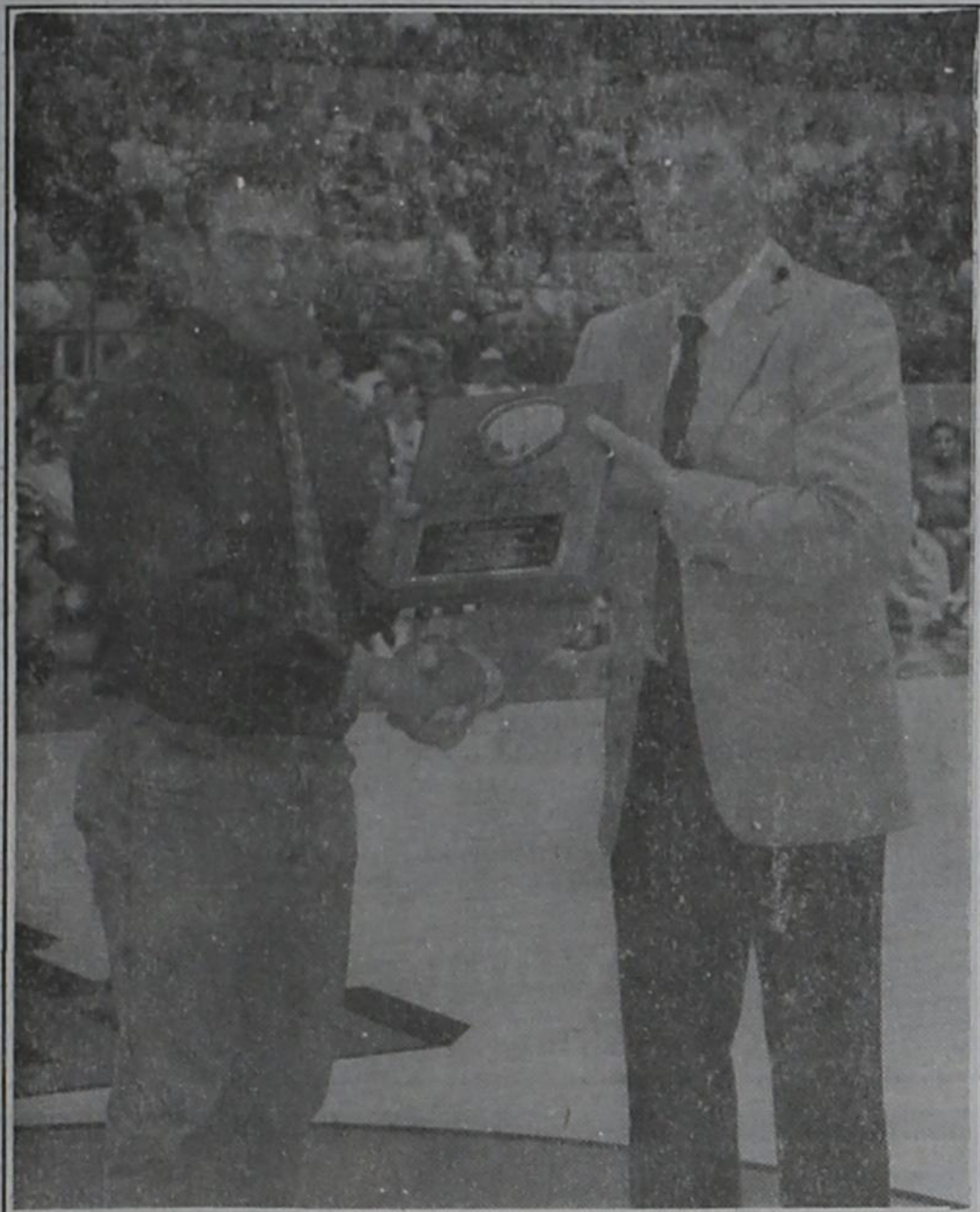

## Post grad earns E. J. Holub award

According to Texas Tech Sports information director Joe Hornaday, the award is given to the outstanding Tech player who exhibits dedication, desire, leadership and spirit. The winner is selected by a panel of Texas Tech coaches and members of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity, sponsors of the award.

Holub was the first Tech player to earn All-American honors. He achieved this distinction in 1959 and 1960. Holub is also the only Tech player ever to have his number retired (55). ## Commissioners eye creation of county wide water district

The formation of a Garza County water district could head off future water problems for the county, this according to Judge Giles Dalby. Dalby introduced the idea of forming a Garza County water district during the commissioner's court meeting Monday, February 22.

Problems Judge Dalby referred to while making the proposal didn't involve supply, they were centered around possible state and federal regulations. He said state laws handed down by people not living in Garza County could create problems for county residents.

"We'd be better off doing it ourselves than letting Austin tell us what to do," said Judge Dalby.

Foremost of the concerns Dalby expressed dealt with radical environmentalist demands on water use.

"As far out as some of these environmentalists are it is not too absurd to having them put up legislation which would dictate how people in Garza County could use water," he added.

Judge Dalby said State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) strongly urged the creation of a county-wide water district. According to Knox, once created, the water district could remain dormant until it is needed.

With the water district "grandfathered" in, Garza County

could retain more local control of water decisions made at the state level in the future.

To create a water district, the idea would be decided by a public referendum.

The commissioners court held off appointing a member to the board of directors for the SPCAA (South Plains Community Action), to allow them time to listen to recommendations from the community. Anyone knowing or someone or wishing to serve on the board is urged to contact a member of the commissioners court.

According to the commissioners court, the position is a worthwhile one, but one that needs to be filled by someone with the desire to serve.

With the special U.S. Senate election scheduled for May 1, the commissioners are looking into the possibility of combining all of the polling places within Post city limits to a single location. The election is scheduled for the same time as city and school board elections and the commissioners want to put the Senate polling booth at the same location. They directed county clerk Sonny Gossett to inquire as to the legality of the idea. If the proposal is approved, the voting in the county would remain at the traditional polling places, only those polling places within the city limits would be affected.

## Program on Teen Court features Lubbock speaker March 12 in Post

Lubbock Teen Court coordinator Ed Cooper will be the featured speaker at a community-wide program March 12 at the Post Community Center. The Women's Division of the Post Chamber of Commerce invited Cooper to speak at the program which runs from 7-8 p.m. A question and answer period will follow.

Cooper is a former juvenile probation officer. His years of working with kids in trouble have not caused him to develop a negative attitude about teens, but have prompted him to praise them as the most valuable resources of the community. In his workshops, Cooper tells parents how to raise

Election for the two city council

seats is more complicated. Because of possible redistricting within the city, the projected term for the new city council members is for one year. If a new redistricting plan is handed down, as is expected, Post will have to have another election for all positions, this according to city manager Bob Turner.

For now however, the two council positions and that of the Mayor will be filled under the old at-large system currently in use.

Turner was unsure of what redistricting would do to the mayoral position because it would remain an at-large vote.

Council seats up for election are currently held by Dr. Larry Mills and Dan Lamb.

## Ruby Kirkpatrick honored by TCU

For more than two decades Brite Divinity School faculty members at Texas Christian University and students as well as countless Christian Church ministers have benefited from Ruby Stoker Kirkpatrick's generosity to TCU.

Kirkpatrick, a well known West Texas civic and religious leader was honored February 11 by Texas Christian University and its graduate seminary, Brite Divinity School.

The occasion was the annual Brite alumni luncheon that traditionally closes TCU's Ministers Week. Several hundred Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) ministers and guests attended the event in the ballroom of TCU's Brown-Lupton Student Center. TCU Chancellor William Tucker presented Kirkpatrick with her honor.

The public recognition was an occasion for beneficiaries to say, "You have made a profound difference to TCU, Brite, the church and lives of both ministers and their congregations' members," said Dr. Gilbert Davis, longtime TCU church relations director and current development assistant to Brite's dean who read the citation.

She wanted her gifts to be permanent, always useful and in keeping with ideals she feels are important," added Davis.

The major portions of Kirkpatrick's gifts to the university have been endowment and scholarship funds that have been named for family members. The university's endowed funds include the Ruby S. Kirkpatrick Disciples Scholarship Fund, the Willard M. Kirkpatrick Memorial

Disciples Fund and the first Christian Church of Post, Texas Disciples Scholarship Fund.

For Brite she has established memorial education funds in the names of Henry and Sarah Black, Willard and Ruby Stoker Kirkpatrick, R.L. and Belle Black McFall and K. and Lottie M. Stoker.

Her gifts also have endowed the Kirkpatrick Faculty Enrichment Fund and the Kirkpatrick Institute, which will offer a program of continuing education for ministers and events to provide practical help for their ongoing work.

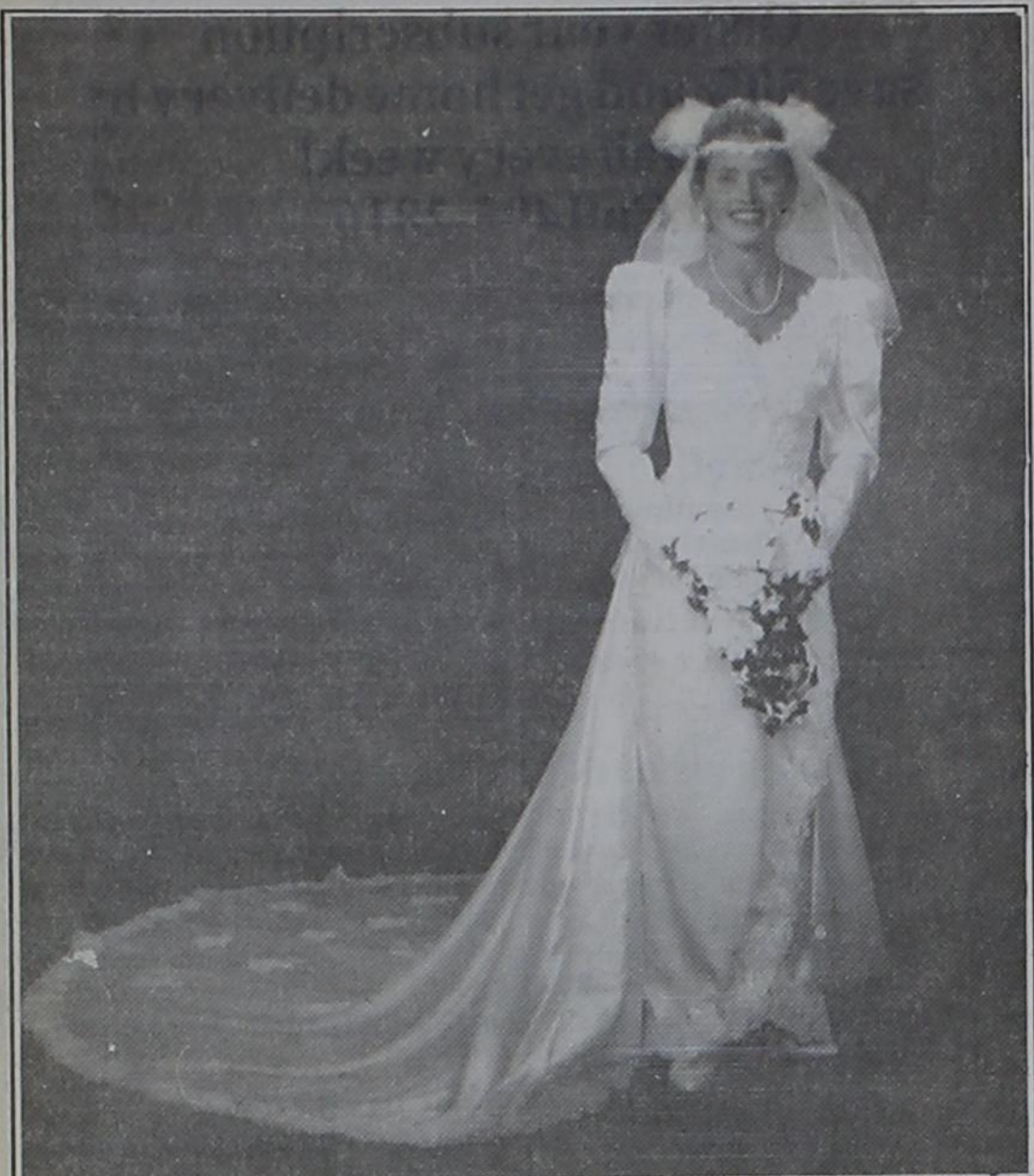
Kirkpatrick, a member of TCU's class of '27, was awarded an honorary Doctor of Laws degree by the university in 1977. That degree citation called attention to her "half century of

creative leadership in a single small community and its radiating effect throughout West Texas—in religious education, in church affairs generally, as first president of her community's Chamber of Commerce, as a leader in industrial promotion, senior citizen organization, local museum and historical society." At that time, some 45 family members had attended the university.

A teacher of the same class at Post's First Christian Church for more than 60 years and a longtime treasurer of its Christian Women's Fellowship, Kirkpatrick and her husband, the late Willard M. Kirkpatrick, were among leaders in building a drive for that church, where they established the Stoker Educational Memorial Fund

## This ANN That

Occasionally I see a child riding in a car without a safety seat and I want to stop the car and remind the adult who is responsible for that child how dangerous it is to let children ride in cars unrestrained. Many children are now riding in child safety seats, but we are saving about half as many lives as we could if all children were properly buckled into a safety seat.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has recently issued an additional caution to parents concerning the proper use of child safety seats. "The safest position for any type of child seat is in the rear seat. This is particularly true when rear-facing infant safety seats are placed in a car with a passenger-side air bag." The Child could be seriously injured if the air bag deploys because the rear-facing infant seat extends so close to the dashboard.

If it is absolutely necessary to place a child in the front seat, the passenger seat should be moved as far back as possible. This will maximize the distance between the dashboard and the child seat and lessen the possibility of injury. Air bags have saved many lives, but they are not compatible with rear-facing infant seats.

A properly installed and used safety seat will enable a child to survive 75 percent of the crashes that would otherwise be fatal. Similarly, an air bag used with a lap and shoulder seat belt provides the best possible protection for larger children and adult passengers.

I want to encourage everyone to get into the habit of properly using the safety devices which are provided in today's vehicles. They do help people survive traffic accidents.

I have a new video in my office which is available for check-out to groups or I can come to your group and present the program for you. I also have a resource list which would be helpful to anyone planning a passenger safety program.

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#### When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30th to take advantage of this benefit on your 1993 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

#### Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

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La ley de Texas permite a los granjeros, rancheros y madereros pagar sus impuestos de propiedad basándose en "la valoración productiva" del terreno calificado—no sea en su utilidad de producir cosecha, ganado o madera—ni en su valor en el mercado actual. Y esto le puede ahorrar en sus impuestos de propiedad.

#### ¿Cual es la hora del cierre?

Si su terreno nunca ha tenido una valoración productiva, Ud. debe solicitarla a su distrito de valoraciones antes del viernes, 30 de abril, para recibir el beneficio en sus impuestos de propiedad de 1993. Puede recibir hasta 60 días más si tiene una buena razón y si solicita el tiempo adicional antes del 30 de abril. Si pasa de esta fecha, es posible que todavía la podrá obtener, pero pagará una multa. Pregunte en la oficina de su distrito de valoraciones.

#### ¿Debo solicitarla cada año?

Por lo general, si su propiedad ya recibe una valoración productiva agrícola o maderera, no hay necesidad de pedir una nueva cada año—al menos que se le pida por la ley de valoraciones. Si una solicitud nueva se requiere, el distrito de valoraciones le mandará un aviso por correo.

The Walkers and Davis' count it a rare privilege to share Dr. Roger Carstensen with the Post community.

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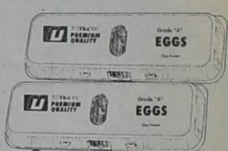

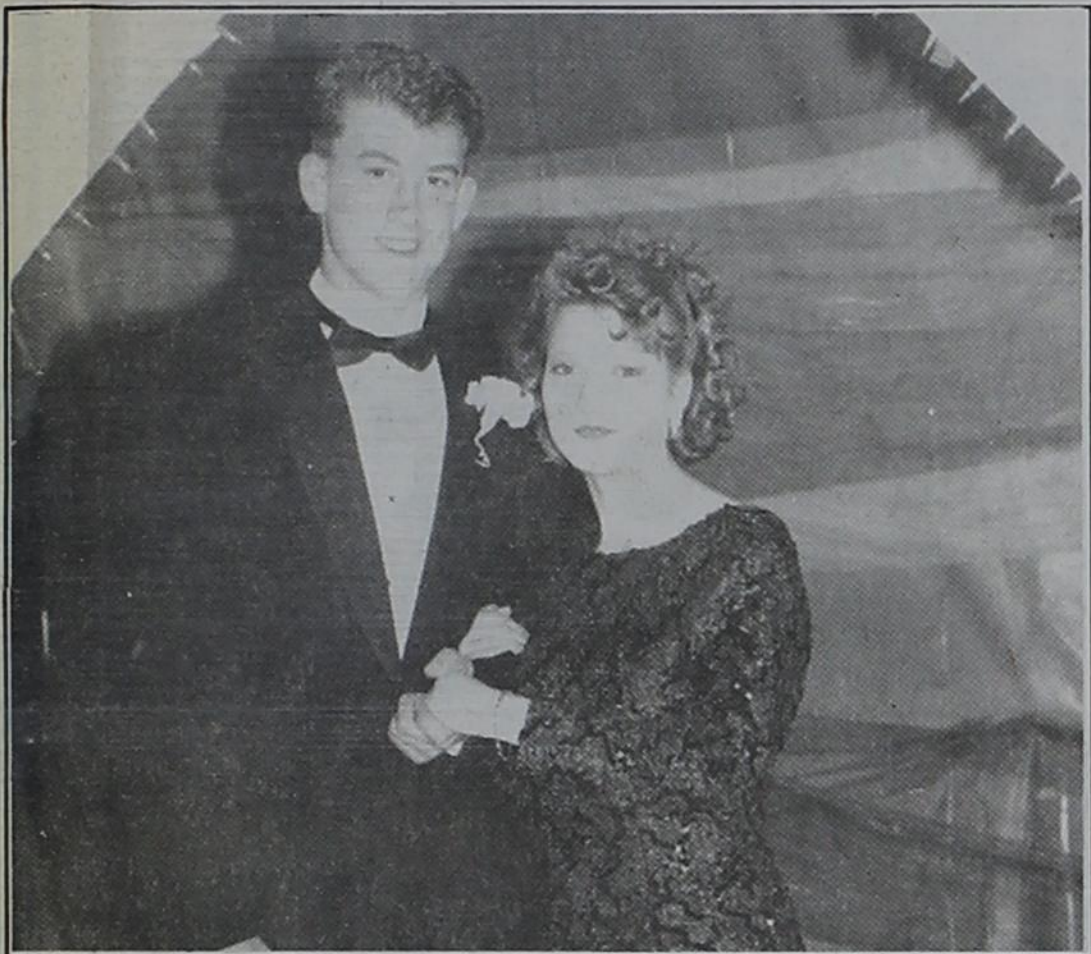

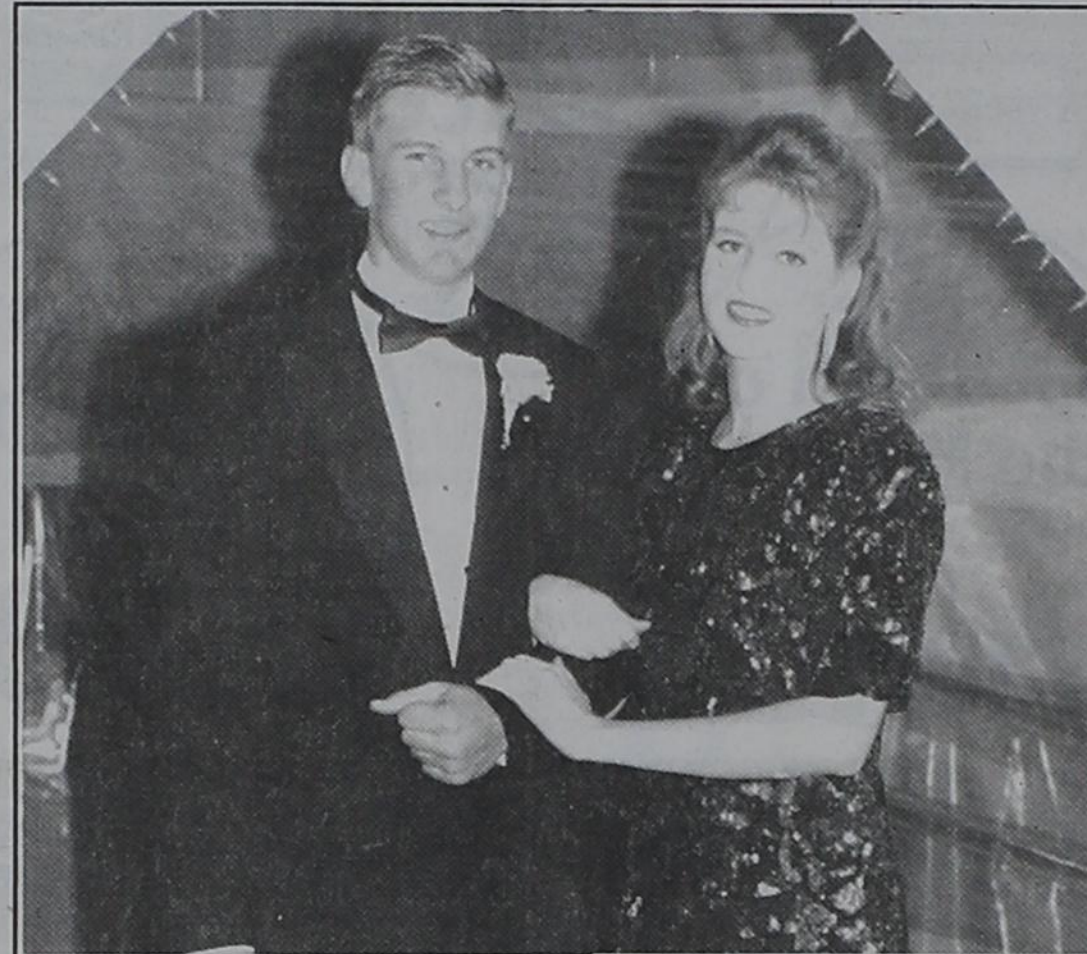

### Tax 'n Facts

When you must take out Retirement Money

You can't keep your IRA or other retirement accounts tax-deferred forever. Eventually -- at least by the April 1, after you turn 70 1/2 -- you must start drawing down the money. The how-to rules are obscure. There are two choices: the more common "recalculation method" or the "term certain" option, which is often more advantageous.

Under the first payout option, a minimum withdrawal is calculated on the owner's life expectancy, according to actuarial tables, or the joint life expectancy of owner and beneficiary. Each year the distribution is recalculated for the change of life expectancy. When one spouse dies, though, the recalculation based on the remaining spouse's life expectancy may boost the distribution -- and the tax bite.

With term certain, distribution is determined by the life expectancy at the start. If it is 20 years, say, 1/20th is taken out the first year, then 1/19th, 1/18th and so on. If one spouse dies, the distribution amount is locked in.

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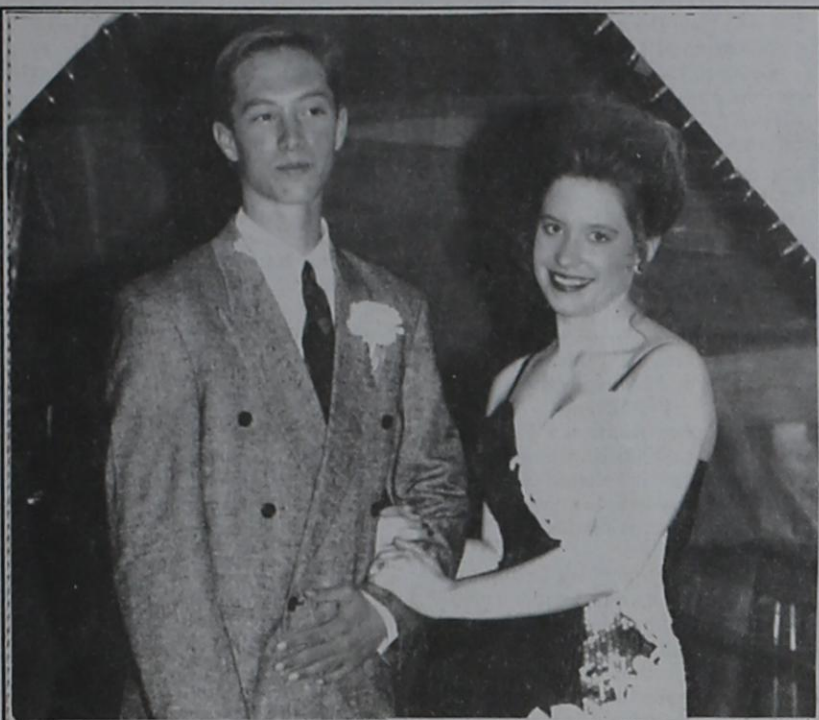

## Smart jobs fund program bill passes

A bill creating an innovative program to assist Texas businesses in training workers and provide financial incentives for businesses expanding in the state passed the Texas House of Representatives in mid-February. The Smart Jobs Fund Program will be administered by the Texas Department of Commerce.

"The Smart Jobs Fund Program will help businesses train and retrain workers, building a world-class work force second to none," said Commerce executive director Cathy Bonner. "Previously, Texas had only limited financial assistance for worker training and retraining. Through the Smart Jobs Fund Program, Texas will have the second largest state training fund in America - a financial incentive that will give us the edge when competing with other states for new jobs."

In 1991, Commerce and the Texas Industrial Development Council conducted a study that showed of all the factors determining where a company will locate, by far the most important factor was the availability of a skilled and trained work force. In

most cases, Texas lost out to competing states for new jobs because the other states have financial assistance for worker training and retraining.

The Smart Job Fund is created by diverting one-tenth of 1 percent from the state's Unemployment Insurance Tax. It is estimated there would be approximately \$50 million per year in this fund. The Fund will not raise taxes, but will train the existing work force to be the most competitive in the world.

To help existing Texas businesses be more competitive, the Fund will pay for training and retraining for their employees. Matching grants will go to Texas businesses for the training of new workers or upgrading of existing workers' skills for jobs that pay the state average weekly wage or better. As an incentive for new business to expand or locate in Texas, the Fund will offer matching grants to pay for new job training or on-the-job training. There also will be special assistance to finance the conversion necessary to implement workplace innovation training or Texas companies losing defense industry contracts.

Jim Riley Simpson pushed the 'Lopes lead to double digits at 58-48 with two free throws.

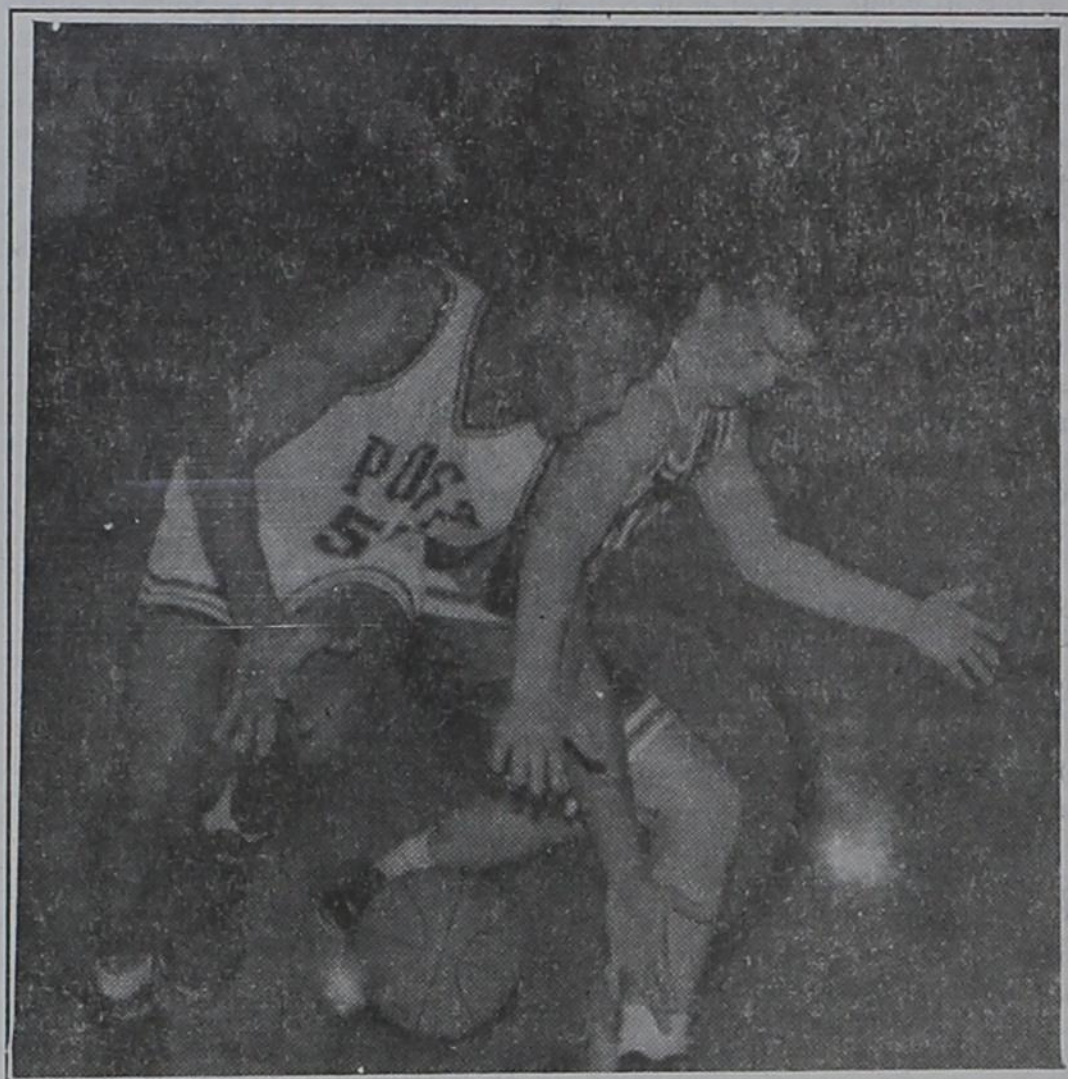
