Council passes resolution approving grant

Recycling efforts in Garza County received a shot in the arm with the announcement that the city has been approved for a \$14,280 grant.

According to Post Mayor Jim Jackson, the grant monies will be used to purchase five "igloos" that will be used to collect used oil. Jackson said an igloo will be placed in Post, Close City, Graham Co-op Gin, Southland and Justiceburg.

The grant was approved by SPAG (South Plains Area Government). Jackson said he was putting the final touches on the grant before passing it on for final approval.

Each igloo will hold 360 gallons of used oil. It includes several safety features and is designed to be eye appealing.

A resolution agreeing to the grant application was approved by the Post City Council during an emergency meeting held Friday, March 5.

Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony scheduled for March 22

The annual Taba'na Yuan'e or "Sunrise Wind" ceremony will be held Monday, March 22 at the City Park. The native American ceremony predicts the success of the coming year.

"Chief" Frank Runkles, who has conducted the ceremony since 1973, will begin the Comanche ritual at 6 a.m. Runkles is a longtime student of Indian lore and has been a legend among many youth groups for generations.

"I used to do programs for young school children all over the South Plains," said Runkles.

Sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, the Taba'na Yuan'e tradition began in 1906 when a pioneer of Garza County recalled the legends told by the Plains Indians.

According to tradition, the wind must be checked the day after the sun reaches midway in its journey from south and north at sunrise. Consequently, this is the day after spring begins.

According to Chief Runkles, the 94 percent accuracy rate of the ceremony assists Garza County residents in predicting their success in the coming year.

The ceremony begins with Kenneth LeBlanc building a fire, using only natural materials.

After the singing of a tribal prayer for thanks for the fire, "Chief" Runkles performs a four winds dance in which a pipe of peace is presented to the four directions of the wind. The pipe is then presented to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka, the Great Spirit Above, to seek their blessings.

Grass is placed on the coals and the smoke indicates the wind direction. At

Post City Council asked to drop suit against White River Water District

As it now stands, the city of Post will continue paying its White River Water bill under protest. Members of the White River Water District had hoped to convince the Post City Council to drop its lawsuit against the district during a personal appearance before the Post governing body at its regular meeting Tuesday, March 2.

"We want to get this litigation out of the audit report," said Al O'Brien, general manager of White River.

He said that auditors question the litigation every time they go over White River's books. Once the suit is explained, O'Brien says there is no problem, it is just a nuisance to have to continually explain the matter to the auditors.

"It's kind of like having a bad credit rating," explained O'Brien.

The protest stems from a 1988 increase in the water rates White River passed on to water users. City officials claim this increase was illegal since it broke terms of the original contract that treated the water district in the late 1950's.

Despite the objections of O'Brien, Post city attorney Harvey Morton said the issue was tied to another involving the original contract.

"There are two instances of not following the contract," said Morton. "If you solve one, you need to solve the other."

the moment of sunrise, a Smoke Dance is begun.

The ritual is ended when the dancer kneels and points a ceremonial feather in the direction of the wind.

The Indian legend says an east or northeast wind means a very good year, north or northwest an average year, west or southwest a poor year and south or southeast a very bad year.

A northwest wind gave an "average" prediction last year.

What does "Chief" Runkles believe the prediction will be this year?

"I don't give it a thought until I see that wind Monday morning."

The Post Chamber of Commerce will serve all you can eat pancakes, sausage, coffee, and juice for \$3.00 following the ceremony.

"About 150 to 250 people are expected to come," said Robert Higginbotham the head of the Taba'na Yuan'e Committee.

Umpires ruled the ball still in play. The hit would have driven in two runs and put the 'Lopes up 5-3 breaking a deadlock. Instead Leininger and Jim Riley Simpson were stranded on base as the 'Lopes were unable to push them across.

The loss was the 'Lopes second one run defeat at the hands of the green and gold clad New Deal Irish in as many games. The 'Lopes lost their home opener to the same New Deal team Tuesday, March 2, 6-5 in extra innings.

In the game in New Deal, the 'Lopes came back from a 3-0 deficit to tie the score 3-3 in the fourth inning.

"We had some big hits," said Post head coach Fred Postell. "We sent eight men to the plate in the inning."

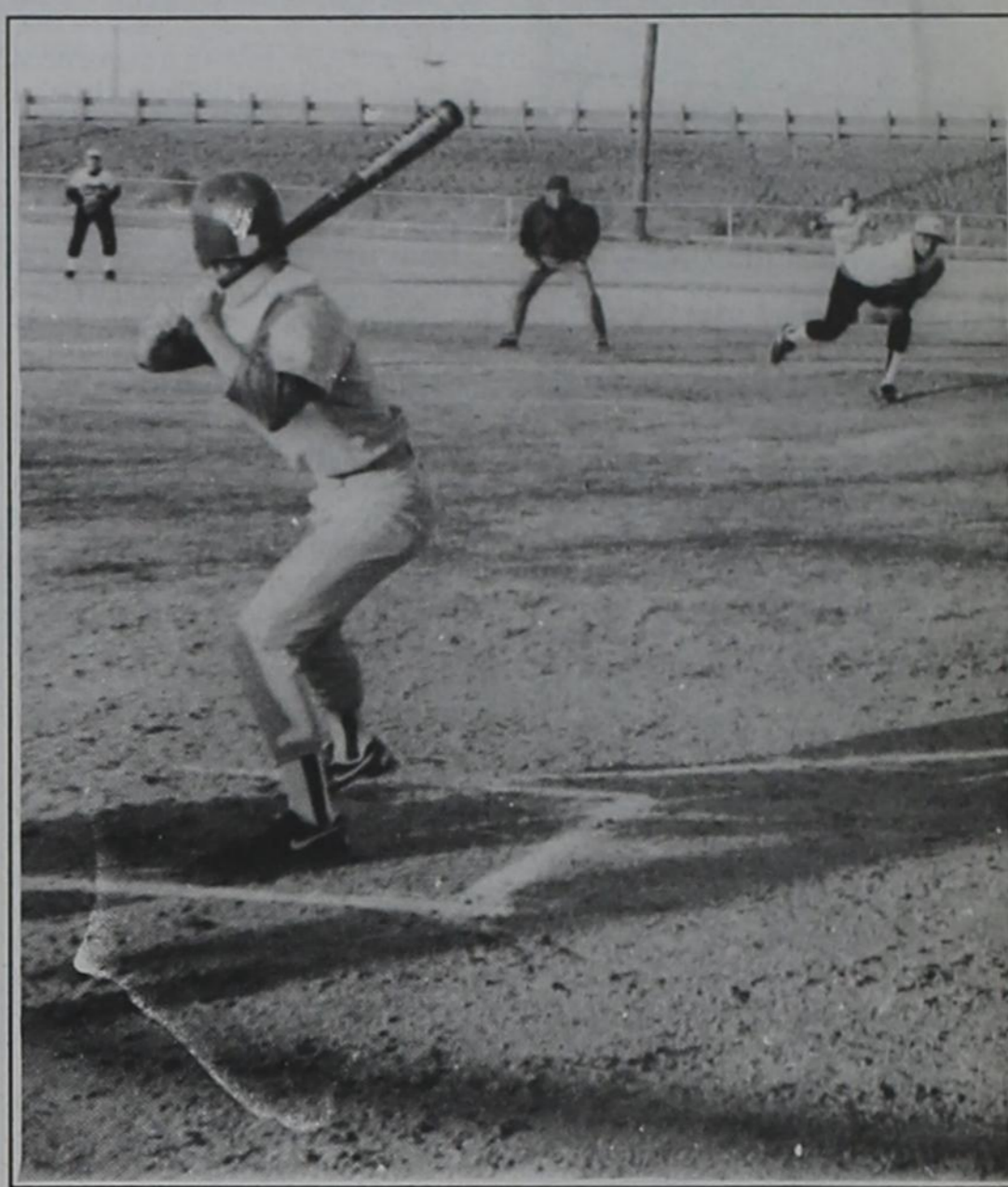
Post used three hits and a couple of walks to push across the three runs in the inning.

The 'Lopes were in position to take command of the game in the top of the seventh inning. With a man in scoring position on second base, New Deal pitcher Sam Adams struck out three straight 'Lope batters to end the threat.

New Deal took advantage of the 'Lopes missed opportunity, pushing across the winning run on a bloop single to the outfield. The ball barely eluded 'Lope outfielder Pete Torres.

"Pete might have had a chance if he could have gotten to it clean," said Postell.

Leininger went the distance for Post on the mound, recording seven strike outs while giving up two walks. The loss dropped his record to 1-2 on the season.

Tax 'n Facts

Estate Tax Rumors
A Congress that's looking for money to spend may well cast an eye to estate and gift taxes. For openers, the top estate and gift tax, which fell to 50 percent at the start of this year, will probably go back to 55 percent. But don't worry; it affects only estates over \$3 million.

For some time there has been talk about lowering the exemption -- the amount you can leave your heirs tax free -- from the current \$600,000 down to \$200,000 or \$300,000. This would affect some 15 percent of estates, up from the 2 percent that now pay federal estate taxes.

Even more likely, though, is that the exemption phaseout would be lowered. Now, that \$600,000 starts to phase out as taxable estate and gifts exceed \$10 million, disappearing totally at \$21 million. New regulations might start the phaseout at a "mere" \$5 million or less.

Another possibility is collecting a capital-gains tax on assets owned at death. Currently, those gains are not taxed at all, and the heirs get a stepped-up basis determined by value at the time of death.

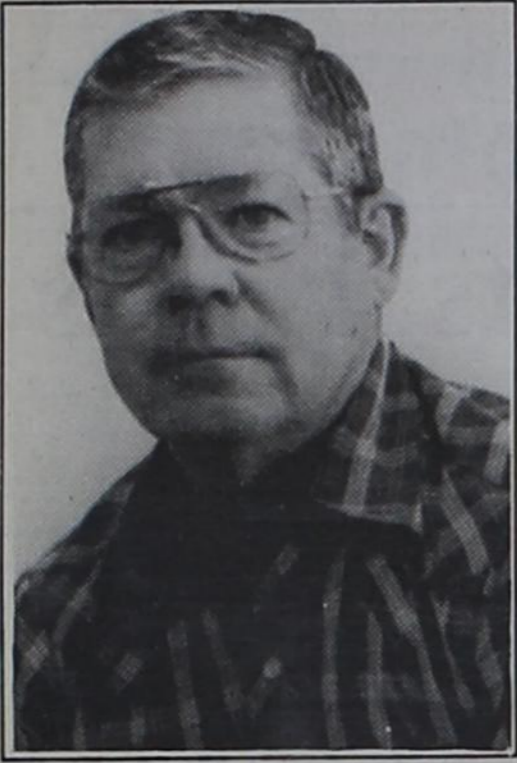

Living on the Edge of the Caprock

Weeding through weed killers
One of the first items on folks' minds this time of year is home lawns. Seems as though several phone calls and "town tours" show a concern for weed control in home lawns. After all, it is getting to be spring and it's only natural to begin early season yard work.

Simply saying that one type of weed killer will work on any type of weed is about as true as saying that one type of tennis shoe will fit everybody. Not so--today's tennis shoe market has shoes for aerobics, anaerobics, walking, jogging, basketball--that's enough to keep anyone's feet thoroughly confused.

It is much the same way with weed control chemical and weeds. We must first come to the understanding that there are basically two types of weeds--cool season and warm season types. Cool season weeds primarily germinate and produce most of their growth in the cool season part of the year. This is the type of weeds we are seeing right now. Warm season weeds on the other hand are dormant now and will not germinate and produce growth until later in the year after the temperatures have warmed considerably.

Weed killers, or herbicides are also formulated in two basic different forms, pre-emerge and post-emerge. Pre-emerge weed killers are made to be applied during a time frame so that the active ingredient of the herbicide is present in the soil when the weed seeds germinate and thus kill the sprouting seed before it begins its growth. Post-emerge herbicides are effective on weeds after emergence from the soil. Misapplication of either type of herbicide will do very little, if any good in controlling weeds.

Also important to note that there are two basic varieties of weeds that can be classified. Broad leaf weeds and weedy grasses. Some examples of broadleafed weeds are dandelion and henbit, like we're seeing now. Conversely, dallisgrass and crabgrass are two more widely recognized grassy weeds. This point is made to emphasize the need to select the correct herbicide for the type of weed you plan to control.

Timing is another important aspect of effective weed control. Broadleafed weeds require the herbicide to be applied when the weeds are actively growing and/or are in the seedling stage--usually late spring or early fall.

Some of the available herbicides for pre-emerge weed control are Balan and Betasan. On the other hand, Banvel, Basagran and Roundup are the preferred choices for post-emerge control. Formulations of 2, 4 D and Dicamba will offer post-emerge

control of warm season broadleaf weeds in most instances. An Atrazine (Aatrex) will offer both pre-emerge and post-emerge control on a number of species.

As you can see, it is necessary to fit the particular type of herbicide to the particular situation in question, much like fitting tennis shoes to your chosen activity. Some folks are still waiting on "couch potato tennis shoes".

As always, with any kind of chemical applications, knowing the label directions, amounts and application techniques is the responsibility of the user. Make sure to read the entire label prior to purchase and follow the directions fully before use. Many of the herbicides listed above are restricted use or limited use chemicals so a private applicator license is required for use or purchase. It is also noteworthy, a good mowing and fertilizing plan will go a long way towards organic weed control and these two things hold weed growth to a minimum while boosting grass growth and competition with weeds.

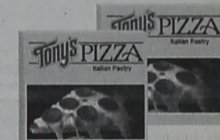

PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."
