Council to drop its lawsuit against the district during a personal appearance before the Post governing body at is

"We want to get this litigation out of "We want to get thislititgation out o
the audit report," said AI O'Brien, general manager of White River. He said that auditors question the
litigationevery time they goover White River's books. Once the suit is explained, O'Brien says there is no problem, it is just a nuisance to have to auditors. "t's kind of like having a bad credit raing, explained O Brien.
The protest stems from a 1988
increase in the water rates White River passed on to water users. City officials claim this increase was illegal since it
broke terms of the original contract that created the water district in the
late 1950's. Despite the objections of O'Brien,
Postcity attorney Harvey Morton said the issue was tied to another involving the original contract. "If you solve one, you need to solve the other."
