**ONE THING WHICH** has been a mystery to this writer since the hostage crisis involving the passengers on TWA Flight 847 is the fact that with all of the terrorist acts, President Reagan would even have to ask Americans not to travel to potential trouble spots, such as Greece.

Whatever happened to common sense?

With the additional acts of terror against airlines, such as the Air-India and Canadian-Pacific bombings, both of which originated in Canada, bound for overseas, it seems to us that this would make for a very strong argument for Americans to curtail overseas travel, at least for the immediate future.

## Change Noted For Spraying

The Texas Department of Agriculture is suspending the issuance of blanket spray permits in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Collinsworth, Donley and Hall Counties effective Friday, June 21. The action is being taken following the recent confirmation of several hormonal herbicide drift cases involving more than 1,000 acres. In the last two years, more than 50,000 acres of cotton in the Panhandle were severely damaged by drift from hormone herbicide, the most recent the 1984 Big Drift in Parmer and Deaf Smith Counties.

Angela Lamb, TDA Supervisor of the Amarillo District Office, said "We checked with several aerial applicators in the area and discussed the situation with them. They agreed that we should take the steps necessary to stop it, given the magnitude of the 1984 drift situation."

Effective immediately, no blanket spray permits will be issued for the four regulated counties (Hall is already covered until October 15), and all permits previously issued will be rescinded. That action means that the use of hormone herbicides must be covered by an individual spray permit for EACH application. In addition, no permit may be issued if there are any susceptible crops within 4 miles of the target area.

TDA has a team of field inspectors in the Panhandle as a direct result of last summer's drift

problems in which more than \$16,000 in fines have been collected so far. The field inspectors are maintaining a high visibility in the area with the emphasis on obtaining voluntary compliance.

The high volatile (Butyl Ester) formulation of 2,4-D is used to treat broad leafed weeds, but can cause severe damage if it comes in contact with cotton or other susceptible crops. The Butyl Ester formulation can move off target even after being properly applied, if the temperature reaches 85 to 90 degrees. Its use is already prohibited in Deaf Smith, Parmer and Hall Counties during warm weather months. The confirmed drift cases so far are not believed to involve heavy losses, but any additional contact with the herbicide would only make the situation worse.

Lamb said, "As a farmer myself, I know those herbicides are necessary to modern farming practices, but we at TDA have a duty to protect people and crops from off-target pesticides. It's against the law to let those chemicals drift off target. We need to know who is doing the spraying and when."

## Man Killed By Train

An accident occurred Monday morning June 24, at 1:23 a.m. at the railroad crossing on Third Street.

Manuel R. Fyrias, 26, of Bovina, was driving northbound on Third Street in a white 1981 Chevrolet station wagon. He disregarded the railroad cross-bars which were in operation and drove around them. His automobile was struck by a westbound Santa Fe freight train.

Fyrias was killed instantly. A passenger in the car was a 14 year old male hispanic, also of Bovina. The youth suffered serious injuries and was taken to Clovis High Plains Hospital in Clovis by Bovina ambulance.

The young man underwent surgery and his condition is listed as very critical with chest, head and abdominal injuries.

Officers reported that alcohol was possibly a contributing factor in the cause of the accident.

Funeral services for Manuel Fyrias are pending with Blackwell-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona.

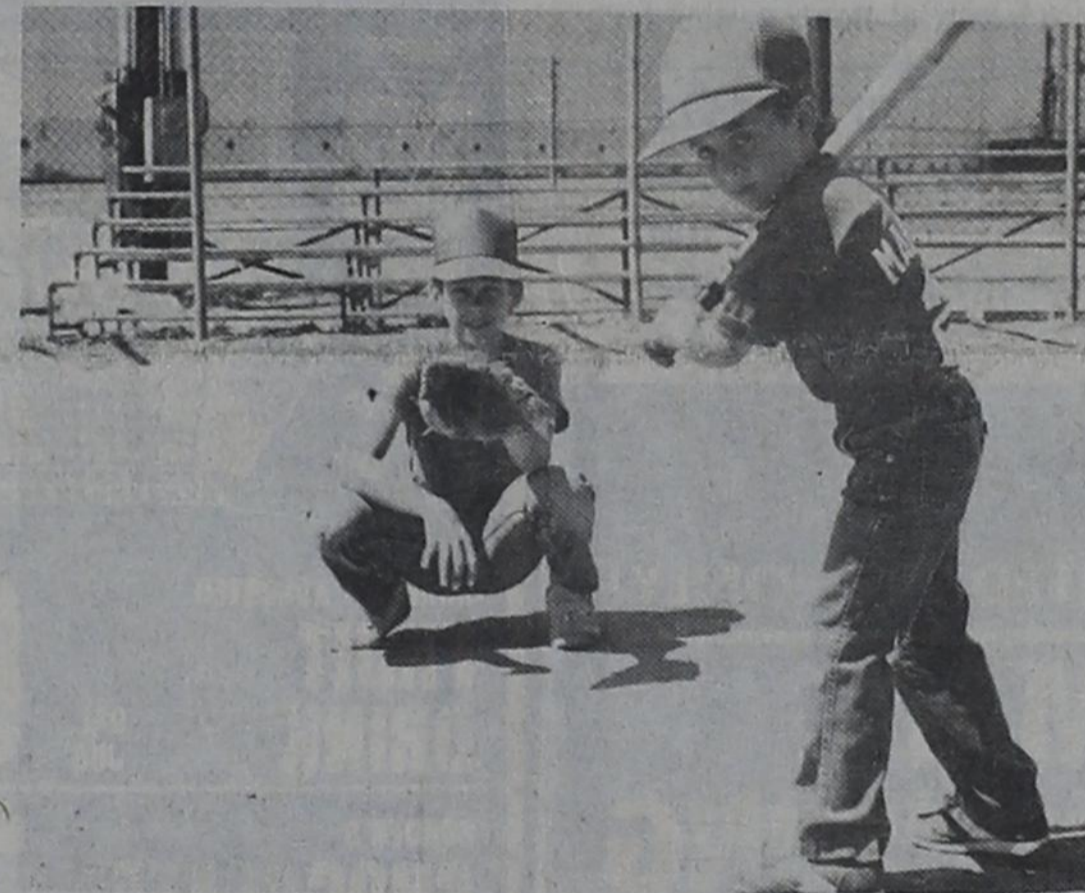
Your favorite pet could win recognition from having the longest ears to having the shortest tail, best personality or ugliest face.

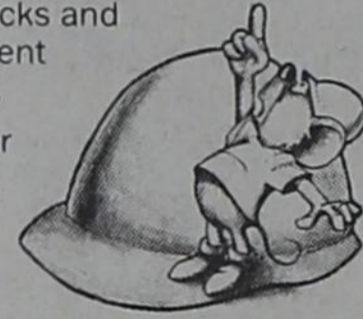

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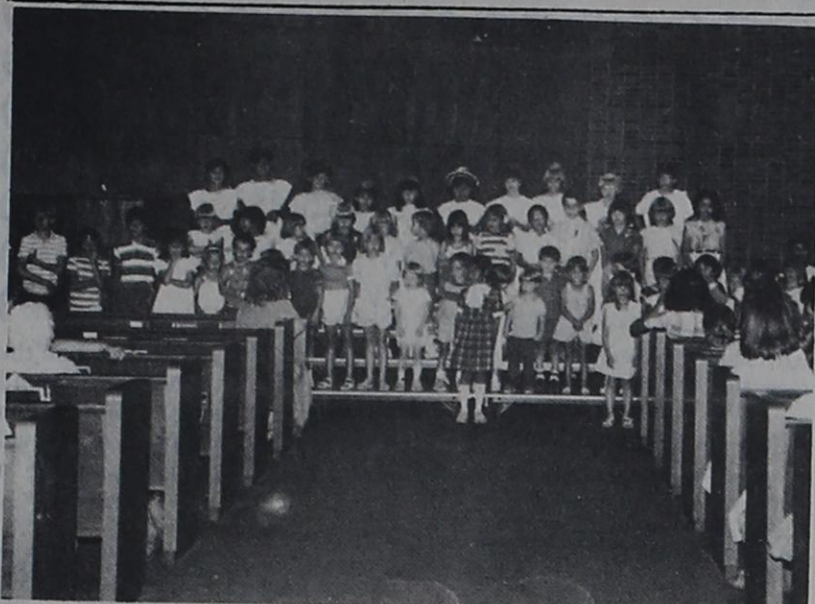
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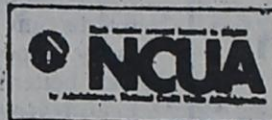
