This marks a turn-around for the council which only last month at its April meeting denied the same request. The council had opted to have city workers perform the work. The difference this time though was the personal appearance of Main Street Board chair Ashley and director Barbara Hardin who explained the need and savings involved with contracting for professional and dedicated care of the project.

"We understand that city employees have plenty of other important duties rather than mowing, edging, watering, weeding and fertilizing the five blocks downtown," said Ashley in a prepared statement he read to the council.

"The Main Street Board would like to continue the progress made over the past few years by the Main Street Project. The city, state and Main Street Board have all invested substantial time and money in an effort to give downtown Post the best appearance that we could. We would like for this council to do all it can to make sure that our investment on Main Street is

working on opening a joint city/county landfill for some time. They have drawn up an agreement defining the shared costs of a new landfill. A final draft of the agreement should be signed before the new landfill is set to open.

They have recently entered into an agreement with the city of Lubbock to take trash should the new landfill not be ready by the closing date of the present site. Post Mayor Jim Jackson initiated the development of the agreement to give the community an emergency outlet for trash should the new landfill not be ready by the closure deadline for the existing landfill of August 9, 1993. If the city and county had not made arrangements well in advance for dumping trash should the new site not be approved, Post and Garza County would not have had any place to go with their trash. Continued dumping at the old site is out of the question because of state and federal rules. A violation would result in a hefty fine being levied against the two entities.


But according to Jackson, the way things look now, this emergency option will not have to be used because the new permit is moving right along.



It will give a VMS provider (as SWBT's customer) the ability to receive originating call information from SWBT's central office and to activate and deactivate a Message Waiting Indicator (MWI) on the line of the VMS provider's patron. NSII also gives the VMS provider the ability to activate and deactivate an intermittent dial tone on a patron's line in multiple offices. The VMS provider will be able to perform these functions in multiple offices through a connection to a single Message Node office. The Message Node will be a predesignated central office and will interconnect with all central offices within the Message Node Service Area. Upon approval of this application, NSII will be available to customers where facilities are available. Available facilities are not currently deployed statewide. The proposed effective date of this service is June 20, 1993.

SWBT estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$2.4 million. VMS providers and Telephone Answering Services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.



### Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

\*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

went on to say that any work on the courthouse would be a step back for the communities Main Street effort. The author of the "anonymous" letter argued that meeting ADA guidelines could be achieved by building an elevator on the inside of the existing building for a substantial amount less than the approximately \$800,000 price tag the annex would carry.

Shinn said just adding a elevator was explored but said this option would be very costly for what the county would gain. He also said the cost was not limited to money.

"You would lose approximately 300 square feet of office and storage space per floor if you just installed an elevator," said Shinn.

He added that just making the building handicap accessible was not the only problem. According to Shinn, bringing the restrooms into compliance would

be a major undertaking. Shinn said doors would have to be changed, requiring significant structural changes to the building.

Oller said the annex would also serve another purpose by giving the county government more room.

"This project has a two-fold goal," said Oller. "It would put the county into compliance and secondly it would do a better job."

"To help answer most people's questions about the disease, its symptoms, testing and others concerns, I invite the public to call the TDH Lyme Disease Information Helpline (512/458-7228) in Austin. We have condensed the most frequently sought information into recorded messages," Rawlings said.

While Lyme disease is treatable, knowledge of the disease and a few easy precautions can greatly reduce the likelihood of exposure to it.

When outdoors, especially, in wooded area or tall grass:

 Wear long sleeves and long pants, with pantlegs tucked into socks or boots. Tuck shirt tails into pants and use tape to seal the area where pants overlap socks or boot tops.

•Wear light-colored clothing to make ticks more visible.

•Use insect repellent containing "DEET" or "permethrin" on clothing and footwear (not on skin).





The proposed site covers approximately 32 acres of land and is to receive approximately 10.4 tons of solid waste per day for disposal or other processing. The waste management facility is to be south of Post, approximately 1.2 miles due south of the intersection of U.S. Highway 380 and Farm-to-Market Road 669, and 0.25 mile south-southeast of Farm-to-Market Road 669 on White Road in Garza County, Texas.

## through "Don't Bag It"

The Texas Don't Bag It program has proven to be an effective tool in improving home lawns and reducing waste in Texas landfills for the past several years. Last year in Garza John Senter County, Dee Justice and Justice-Mason Funeral Home utilized this program with good results.

The program proved beneficial and drastically reduced the amount of home lawn waste and grass clippings that would have other wise ended up in the landfill. We all know the stress and space limitations that our landfill has been under.

The Don't Bag It program consists of three parts; mowing, watering and fertilizing. To be effective, all three parts of the program must be utilized. After a short review, you will find that the program is very simple.

Mowing: For best results, mow every five to six days. As a rule of thumb, don't remove more than one-third of the leaf blade at one time. Clippings are not raked and bagged, they are left on the lawn. It is important to note that grass clippings DO NOT cause thatch build up but, they do return valuable nutrients to the soil in the form of nitrogen. Don't Bag It can reduce mowing time by as much as 38 percent.

Watering: During the driest period of the summer, your lawn will need about one inch of water every five to six days. Most hose sprinklers will apply one-fourth to one-third of an inch per hour. Using this rule of thumb would mean that a sprinkler would need to run approximately four hours in one spot. If water stands or runs off the lawn before the watering period is over, turn off the sprinkler. Allow the water to soak in about an hour before continuing to water. If you are uncertain of how much water your sprinkler applies, take an empty container, mark the inside to show one inch and time the accumulation until one inch of

lawn is in the evening. This allows the grass to stay wet all night and encourages disease development. Lawns watered to frequently or at a rate that is too low, tend to develop shallow root systems which can make

them more susceptible to grub damage and drought stress.

Fertilization: For slow even growth, use a fertilizer that has at least onefourth (preferable one-half)of its nitrogen in the slow release form. Apply no more than one pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of application. Sulphur coated urea and ureaformaldehyde are two examples of a slow release fertilizer. Highly soluble or quick release fertilizers tend to produce excessive, lush top growth for a short time and are not as long-lived as the slow release fertilizers.

Application rates, fertilizer ratio suggestions and timing charts are available in a handy pocket guide of the Don't Bag It pamphlet. The brochure is available in the Garza County Extension Office in the courthouse.

Plan to do your part in reducing lawn wastes this summer as well as giving yourself a break from the backbreaking raking. Implement your own Don't Bag It program and improve your lawn.

If you are interested in participating in the program, feel free to call the Garza County Extension Office for more information and a yard sign.





### **BAILING OUT AFTER A** STORM

Tornadoes, Hailstorms and other disasters are more than events that disrupt lives and uproot homes. They also have tax consequences.

If an area's commerce has been totally disrupted--as in Flor-ida and Hawaii last fall--the Internal Revenue Service and the state tax department may extend filing deadlines.

In addition, individuals may deduct casualty losses that exceed 10 percent of adjusted gross income, less \$100 per occurance. If the community has been declared a disaster area, the taxpayer gets an extra tax option: to declare the loss either in the year in which it happens or the previous year, whichever is more beneficial. Taking the loss for the previuos year may require filing an amended return for that year if the return has already been filed, but speeds up a tax refund for the loss. Taking the loss for the cur-rent year, when the casualty actu-ally happened, means waiting until the following April for any tax advantages but, if the casualty has affected earnings, may be a better bet. beneficial.



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


