

She implemented and founded the City County Drug and Alcohol Abuse 1992 from the Texas Commission on Program for residents in Garza County back in 1984. The program, through

joint funding by the city of Post and Garza County, was incorporated as a non-profit service organization in

Special needs for the program for client assistance, education and prevention, intervention and special school programs have been made possible through grants from the E.A. Franklin Unitrust.

Baker was certified by the Texas Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors in 1986. She received her LCDC Licensed Chemical Dependence Counselor License in

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



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

High Plains producers were on the receiving end of scattered rain showers during the past week that will be mostly beneficial according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

The only exception to the beneficial label may be the area around Ackerly, Texas in Northeast Martin and Southeast Dawson counties where locally heavy rains totaled five to eight inches in some

One or two isolated reports of hail in addition to the rainfall have also been recorded. It is fair to say that some acres can be expected to need replanting as a result of the past weeks weather, however an accurate picture will probably not emerge until next week according to PCG officials.

The good news for many dryland producers in southern High Plains counties was the arrival of any rain at all. Most reports indicate that the rainfall totals may be just enough to get some "dry planted" acreage to a stand. Producers who did receive enough rain to get a stand will still need additional rain before the resulting dryland stands can be considered safely established.

The irrigated side of the High Plains crop is in good shape according to John Gannaway, a cotton breeder at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. he adds that overall the area has gotten off to a fairly normal start with the usual mixed bag of crop

MONEY IN, MONEY OUT

Whatever the new administration and Congress do to the tax laws, the 1993 rates are pretty well set, especially for Social

The wage base for Social Security this year has risen to \$57,600, well up from '92. The tax rate for employees is 6.2 percent. The Medicare wage base rises to \$135,000, paid at a rate of 1.45 percent. The biggest possible Social Security bite on an employee is \$5,528.70. The selfemployed pay twice as much, but half the amount can be deducted fromyour income as an adjustment to gross income on form 1040 page 1.

Maximum monthly benefits for 1993 have risen to \$1,128 for an individual, or \$1,692 for a couple, assuming that the spouse is collecting on the worker's earnings. (If both partners worked and collect their own retirement benefits, the total can be much higher.)

Summer heat can add stress

Summer's sizzling temperatures can subject the body to hazardous stress. The potential toll of excessive heat ranges from mild discomfort to life-threatening heatstroke.

"When it's both hot and humid, it becomes more difficult for the body to release the heat that builds up," said Lowell Johnson, M.D., family physician on staff at Methodist Hospital. "As a result, the body temperature begins to climb. Initially, this might cause mild discomfort - headache, dizziness and fatigue are typical symptoms."

Following are the three degrees of heat stress, how to recognize them and prevention techniques.

·Heat cramps - Represents the mildest form of heat stress. They are most often seen in poorly conditioned athletes who drink inadequate amounts of liquid before and during exercise. Symptoms included painful muscle spasms and sweaty skin. To relieve heat cramps, sit or lie down in a cool area. Drink cool water and stretch cramped muscles.

·Heat exhaustion - Results when heat stress produces excessive fluid loss. Heat exhaustion causes nausea, vomiting, headache, muscle aches, dizziness, rapid pulse, thirst and clammy or pale skin. When heat exhaustion is mild, the treatment is the same as for heat cramps. However, if vomiting, confusion or headache persists, gently apply wet towels and call for emergency help.

·Heatstroke - Heat exhaustion can rapidly lead to heatstroke, a condition in which the temperature regulating center in the brain fails. At this point, the body temperature soars, leading to severe and even

fatal brain, liver or kidney damage. A person experiencing heatstroke may lose consciousness. If conscious, symptoms include confusion, a staggered walk and agitation. Other symptoms include hot, dry skin (rarely sweating) and a body temperature of 105 degrees Fahrenheit or more. A person experiencing heatstroke should be moved to a reclining position in a cool area. Emergency help should be called immediately. If the person is conscious, cool sips of water can be given. Large amounts of cold or ice water should be applied immediately.

When the temperatures rise, avoid heat stress by scheduling exercise for the early morning or evening, drinking plenty of fluids, avoiding the sun, keeping your home cool and wearing lightweight, loosefitting clothing.

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
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

Where did weakly with ordinary matter" In other the power come from? They hid from words, the stuff is all around, but goes the world when Jesus was crucified, right through us! It has been labeled but later came out boldly, something or someone of courage and faith can Christians who now inhabit our planet. So how do we explain the Trinity?

Here again, the apostle Paul suggests in 2 Corinthians 13:13 that the explanation is best given in terms of what God does: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ (the Son), the love of God (the Godhead or Father), and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all." In other words, the graciousness that we discover in what Jesus did leads to a love of God. The defining moment of God's love was act of communication as to: (1) how God loves us, and (2) how humans link with God. Through God's love, Jesus links us into fellowship with God's Spirit (the communion of the Holy we know God is there because of what


