

THE RIVALRY OF certain Texas cities will not be diminished by a report we received recently, which rated metropolitan areas across the nation on the basic costs of owning a house over a year's time.

The factors considered included annual average utility bills, annual average property taxes and annual average mortgage payments.

Two Texas cities in the Rio Grande Valley led the way for the state, ranking second and third, respectively. The places were McAllen-Edinburg-Mission area and Brownsville-Harlingen.

Two other state communities in the north and northeast Texas area, Texarkana and Sherman-Denison, ranked 12th and 13th in the study.

Waco ranked 25th in the homeowner cost survey; Laredo was 28th, Abilene was 33rd on the list. Beaumont-Port Authur came in 38th, and San Angelo placed 40th.

Coming our way, Wichita Falls was number 46, and Amarillo was 58th. The surprising factor was Lubbock, generally that considered close to Amarillo pricewise, ranked 100th on the list.

Other Texas cities ranked between Amarillo and Lubbock included Longview-Marshall (62nd); Odessa (70th); San Antonio (93rd) and Corpus Christi (96th).

The Lubbock-Amarillo-Wichita Falls rankings sound good when you locate Fort Worth-Arlington ranked 269th out of the 329 "metro" areas in the United States.

It may come as no big surprise Angeles, 316; San Diego, 321; Anaheim, 324; Honolulu, 326 and San Francisco, 327.

The report also gave some interesting figures, such as the fact that apartments comprise 56 per cent of all living units in New York City. Apartments make up 43 per cent of all dwellings in Austin.

West Palm Beach, Florida, is the condominium capital of the nation, as 33 per cent of its dwellings are in this category.

Ten Texas cities were among the top 11 cities in air conditioning needs. Phoenix, Arizona led the list, followed by Laredo, Galveston-Texas City and Corpus Christi.

Tucson, Arizona, Mimi-Hialeah, Florida and Las Vegas, Nevada, were 5-6-7, followed by four more Texas spots: Dallas, Sherman-Denison, Brownsville-Harlingen and McAllen-Edinburg-Mission.

On the other side of the coin, it was not surprising to see that in the "heating needs" category, the study had Anchorage, Alaska, at the top of the list, followed by Grand Forks, North Dakota, Duluth, Minnesota and Fargo-Moorhead, N.D.
