Journey of Hope cross country trek brings bicyclists to Post

Post High School's weight room may not be listed on the Texas Tourism's guide for luxurious accommodations, but it has become a regular stop on a cross country bicycle trek for members of the Journey of Hope. For three years now, members of the cross country ride have made the relatively short jaunt from Lubbock down Highway 84 looking forward to a night in the spacious confines of the Bold Gold weight room. The stop is number 33 for the team of 23 young men participating in the Journey of Hope

The Journey of Hope is a 3,000 plus, mile odyssey from San Francisco to Charleston, South Carolina which is actually undertaken by two 23 member teams. One team takes the "northern route" through Colorado, Nebraska and Iowa while the other takes the "southern route" which brings it through Post. The southern route is the longer of the two, covering 3,628 miles compared to the northern route which is 3,555 from start to finish.

The Journey of Hope began June 14 in San Francisco with both north and South teams heading out together. They went their separate ways in Fallon, Nevada. Th two teams will each take 62 days to reach their goal. Between them, the riders will visit 21 states and average 75 miles a day.

The Journey of Hope was created in 1988 as an effort to involve students from different campuses and chapters of the fraternity in a national effort for PUSH America. In 1991, PUSH America doubled from one team to the present two teams with each team taking a different route on their cross country journey.

1991 was also another landmark year for PUSH America as Major League Baseball joined the team as Major League clubs began hosting special 'PUSH America Nights" in selected cities. The 1993 clubs involved with PUSH America include the San Francisco Giants, the Chicago Cubs, Texas Rangers, Colorado Rockies, Cleveland Indians and the Atlanta

those eligible to participate in this program.



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



is one of an elite group of stock producers in the United States who breeds bucking horses. Most of the horses that perform at the rodeos, produced by Terry Walls, are a result of years of selective crossing of famous bucking horse bloodlines. The mares are proven bucking horses, mostly northern bred with some draft horse lineage, that are bred to a stallion from three generations of National Finals Rodeo qualifiers. This year, the Walls breeding program marks its largest colt crop, with 25 bucking horse mares grazing with their offspring, in the big pasture at the ranch. As the Walls point out, "Surprisingly, there have been few failures as the old adage 'born to buck' holds true". Another 50 horses represent various ages and other families making the current head count total 75 bucking

Terry purchases most of his bulls as three year old prospects, uses them at jackpot events throughout the winter until they are ready for the rodeos. He culls the bull herd regularly, keeping only the best performers.

To maintain an even set, being mostly the same size and weight, of steers and calves, this timed event stock is continuously culled. A former National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association champion roper and steer wrestler himself, Terry knows how important uniformity is to the competing cowboys.

Being exceptional rodeo stock producers and breeding top quality bucking horses are just a few of the many accomplishments for this talented group. Terry also preconditions fee lot cattle; he raises



Empty pesticide container collection offered

Farmers, ranchers, commercial and non-commercial pesticide users on the South Plains will have a solution to the trouble of disposing of unusable and unwanted agricultural pesticide containers, and do so safely, legally and without penalty.

The Texas Water Commission and

The Texas Water Commission and the Texas Department of Agriculture are sponsoring a series of collection dates at various locations across the South Plains. Containers will be accepted beginning at 8 a.m. at each site. The site for each collection will be listed in this column.

Keep in mind that containers must be rinsed three times or cleaned with a high pressure rinse, and they should be punctured or crushed. If you take containers which do not meet these specifications, they will be rejected. Any size plastic or metal container will be acceptable, but paint, household or glass containers will not.

This translates into a loss of \$70,000 in tax dollars for the school district. Before the added loss in property value, Dr. Bain estimated the school district was looking at total revenues approaching \$6,145,000.

"We can back \$70,000 out of that because of the property values," said Dr. Bain.

Dr. Bain said the district may be able to receive state funding to overcome the larger than expected decrease in property values. Dr. Bain said that any time a school district has its property values change by greater than 8 percent, that district can request to have its state funds based on the current valuation rather than the previous year's valuation which is the standard procedure.

"If we can get them (the state) to use this year's values, we will more than make up for the \$70,000," said Dr.

Without any adjustments from the state, the current budget proposal would be \$119,000 short of balancing. To make up the difference, the school board has two immediate options if they adopt the proposed spending measure, raise taxes or dip into the fund balance (reserves) to make up the

difference. "At this point in time I'm certainly not going to request a tax increase," said Dr. Bain.

Other factors that will effect the final outcome of the budget and fund balance for the district are how the current budget winds up. Dr. Bain estimates that spending for the current year will come in almost \$200,000 under budget.

Finally, the public will have an opportunity to offer input on the proposed budget during a special public hearing that will be scheduled for sometime in late August.

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
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

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
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Monty Price is a 1985 graduate of Rhema Bible Training Center in Tulsa, OK, and has been pastoring for nine years.

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
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
