'Lopes open season Friday against Abernathy

Kickoff slated for 8 p.m. as 'Lopes take on Antelopes

All of the practice games are behind them, when the Post Bold Gold Antelopes buckle on their helmets this coming Friday, it will be for the real thing. The 'Lopes host the Abernathy Antelopes September 3 at Antelope Stadium. Kickoff is scheduled for 8 p.m.

The game features two teams that share more than a mascot. Both finished last season with just one victory each and head into this season looking for redemption.

The Abernathy Antelopes return a number of starters from their 1-9 season of a year ago. They are led by a trio of highly touted players including all-state candidates Michael Attaway at center, running back and nose tackle Jeremy Mansanales and offensive tackle Kraig Darrett. The Antelopes will field a team that includes 17 seniors.

Abernathy coach Paige Burelsmith has made a number of changes along the defensive line with his returning players. The moves have been made to add speed and size to the defensive line.

Also untested is the Antelopes running attack. No less than three players are being tried at the feature back slot in the I formation used by Abernathy. They are Jody Turner, Brian Martin and Nathin Norris. All but Norris are seniors. Norris is a junior.

The Bold Gold Junior Varsity actually get to start the season for the 'Lopes, taking their show in the road and taking on the Abernathy Antelopes one day ahead of the varsity players. Post invades Abernathy September 2 for a 6 p.m. game against the maroon and white antelopes.

the Lions' goal line.

"That's all you can ask for," said Osborne. "If we can put together one of those drives a quarter and the defense play the way it did, we're capable of winning some ball games."

Attitude played a big part in the 'Lopes effort in the scrimmage. The players both on the field and those on the sideline were hooping and hollering at every tackle or successful offensive play.

This did not escape Osborne's notice either. He commented after the game that "we were more excited about this than we were about some games last year."

Osborne says now all he and the rest of the staff have to do is harness this enthusiasm and spirit and channel it into games that count.

The scrimmage itself produced a lot of positive results for the coaches to work with.

"We stepped up the pace from our first scrimmage last week (against Floydada) and that's what we like to see," said Osborne.

Defensively, the Bold Gold stifled the Lions on several occasions. Playing tough, aggressive ball that was downright nasty at times. Offensively, the 'Lopes out gained the Lions by some 30 yards and one score.

A downside to the scrimmage though was the season ending injury to senior running back and defensive back Jaime Ayala who went down with a broken fibula and an ankle injury.

"It (the injury) put a damper on everything," said Osborne. "I hated it for him. He's a senior and a good leader."

Osborne said Ayala was still going to be an important part of the Bold Gold, even from the sidelines. The injured player was scheduled to undergo surgery sometime this week to repair some ligament damage in the ankle.

A look at the Bold Gold defense shows Osborne will field a deep and talented squad with several players

pencil in to receive playing time all across the board. The only thing they lack heading into the season is experience under fire.

Four players will see time at defensive end including Ray Perez and Manuel Zubia currently filling the starting slots. Second line players who Osborne said were not far behind these two were Stewart Childers and Pete Torrez.

Perez will be the anchor at end. "Ray's a hoss, he's the man," said Osborne of his 5-10, 190 player.

The interior of the defensive line was juggled a bit following the scrimmage. Alvin Reed, a 190 sophomore was moved from his linebackers slot the a down lineman to "give us a little more

speed and strength," said Osborne.

Also slotted to spend time battling in the trenches Louis Valdez, Clint Melton and Monty and Marty Dissinger and Lionel Juarez.

At linebacker, look for no less than six players to fill the three slots in the Bold Gold's standard 4-3 defense. These are led by middle backers Russ Bird and Adrian Castillo. Outside backers will be Lemuel McDonald, Mark Espitia, Kelly Line and Javier Saldivar.

If it seems like Osborne mentions a number of players who will play defensively for the 'Lopes, it's because he does. The coach has been very positive about the number of kids he

has available who will make contributions to the success of the football program this year.

The loss of Ayala will cause a minor shakeup in the Bold Gold secondary. Oscar Acevedo, Tim Bell, Casey Hart and Anthony Martin are all slated to see time at cornerback. A pair of sophomores, Bodie Simpson and Tory Harper will stand in at safety.

Others to look for in the defensive backfield include Phil Leininger, Jim Simpson, Cody Collier, Brad Lawson and Heath Eagle. In fact, it is a safe bet that most varsity Antelope players with a defensive label next to their names in the program will see some time filling in on the defensive side of the ball.

Like the pieces of a giant jigsaw puzzle, the shape of the 1993 Post Bold Gold Antelopes had a few more pieces fall into place following the team's scrimmage with New Deal last Friday in Post.

Coach Dwayne Osborne and the rest of the Bold Gold coaching staff had to be pleased with what they saw during the August 20 scrimmage against the Lions. The 'Lopes held New Deal scoreless while scoring two

touchdowns of their own, one by the offense under game conditions and the other on a fine defensive effort from sophomore safety Bodie Simpson who intercepted a pass and took it all the way in for a score from better than 40 yards out.

Osborne was particularly pleased with the offensive drive that resulted in the 'Lopes touchdown. The Bold Gold started with the ball on their 30 yard line and 13 plays and some seven minutes later pushed the ball across

What To Keep Forever

If you get a sudden urge to clean out your files, be careful. Though the Internal Revenue Service probably won't demand documentation of your tax return further back than three years, there are a lot of papers you really need to keep. Consider, for instance, your IRA. If you make nondeductible contributions, keep the Form 8606 that reports them; that will protect you from being taxed again on the distributions you take out. Keep personal records of birth, marriage, divorce and death, military papers, retirement plan agreements, insurance policies, wills, trust agreements and powers of attorney. Keep records on property you inherit to document the cost basis--the market value when you inherited it. Otherwise, you could be taxed on the entire sale price. Keep all buy slips on marketable securities, especially continuous-purchase funds that use dividends and gains to purchase additional shares at various costs. Keep papers documenting your home purchase and subsequent capital improvements; together they prove your cost basis of your property. Old tax returns can be helpful, too. 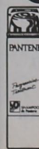

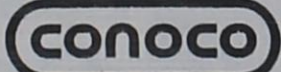

School tax rate holds steady

Despite notices published stating otherwise, the Post ISD tax rate will remain at its 1992-93 level of \$1.35 per hundred. The school district, following guidelines sent down by the state, had to show an over 200 percent increase in property tax rates because it was absorbing the County Education District (CED) tax levy into its figure. The large increase reflects the CED's 92 cents added to the districts 43 cent rate.
"There will be no tax rate increase," said Post ISD superintendent Dr. Bobby Bain during the board of education's special budget hearing held August 24. "I want to keep the rate where it is."
What the tax rate does is help fund

the district's \$6.2 million operating budget.
"We tried to be as fiscally as responsible as we could," said Dr. Bain. Even with this fiscal responsibility and a number of spending cuts, the district is still looking at close to \$160,000 in red ink. The difference will be made up from the district's healthy fund balance. Currently the fund balance stands at \$2,425,000.
Dr. Bain stressed that the fund balance is not a surplus of funds, but instead a financial safeguard "to be used during a time when tax dollars are not coming in."
The district tries to maintain enough money in the fund balance to operate the district for three months should there be a disruption in tax revenues.

Better Business Bureau issues warning on check-forging scheme

The South Plains Better Business Bureau has issued a warning on a check-forging scheme that uses the respected reputation of Goodwill Industries to help pass the bogus checks. According to Garza County Sheriff's deputy J.W. Jolly, one merchant in Post has already been victimized in the check cashing scheme.

Several of the bad checks have already been passed to Lubbock area merchants. An unknown number of persons using the name "Jimmy Stone" have passed the checks in Lubbock. According to authorities, the forgers have gone to great pains to make the checks look authentic, even going as far as putting an official looking stamp on the checks in the name of "Rodney Bishop" that authorized the checks from the charitable organization.

Authorities received a break in the case when a suspect attempted to cash one of the phony notes at a United Supermarket in Lubbock.

According to Tammy Atkins, executive director of Goodwill of Lubbock, the forgers had apparently used a home computer to produce the checks. The bogus payroll checks were made out from Goodwill on an account at First National Bank. Atkins reported that Goodwill does not have an account at First National.

Deputy Jolly said the person or persons passing the checks have false identification to go along with the bogus checks. He encourages any merchants who receive questionable checks they think might be associated with the scheme to contact the sheriff's office immediately with whatever information they can gather such as car license plate numbers and a description of the suspects.

Public Notice

Detailed information on Caller ID service and how to block will be sent to each customer in their telephone bill during the next few weeks.
