

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


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Deborah Craig graduated from West Texas A&M

Despite the "off night" by the offense, the 'Lopes still rang up 295 yards on offense including 275 yards on the ground. Senior tailback Tim Bell led the Bold Gold ground assault with 125 yards on 17 carries. Adrian Castillo added another 75 yards on nine carries. Brad Lawson and Noe Gomez each carried the ball five times with Lawson picking up 32 yards and Gomez adding 21. Alvin Reed added 28 more yards on two carries including a touchdown run of four yards.

Antelope quarterback Jim Riley Simpson added another 20 yards to the Bold Gold attack, connecting on three of 12 attempts with one interception. Osborne said the numbers weren't indicative of Simpson's play. He said a number of balls were dropped by receivers.

"These numbers aren't a reflection on Jim," said Osborne. "He's thrown the ball pretty good most of the season." Osborne said the 'Lopes kept their attack simple, relying on basic plays against the overmatched Roughnecks.

'We didn't try to put anything special on, we knew we could come in and play a sound game and still win," said Osborne.

Sundown also had a little say in the 'Lopes offensive struggles. The Roughnecks used a gambling, blitzing defense to try and compensate for Post edge in talent. Some plays the gamble worked and others it didn't. It was enough though to help throw the 'Lopes offense off stride.

Defensively, the Bold Gold turned in solid performance, holding the Roughnecks to under 200 yards total offense. Sundown rushed the ball for 157 yards and threw for an additional 20 against the 'Lope defenders. Along

with the usual monster hits by linebackers Lemuel McDonald and Russ Bird, the 'Lopes received a boost from cornerback Oscar Acevedo who intercepted two passes, returning one for a touchdown.

Acevedo's touchdown in the waning seconds of the first quarter broke a scoreless tie. Up to that point, the 'Lopes had had the ball three times, punting once and turning the ball over on downs the other two times. His pick came three plays after the 'Lopes failed to convert a fourth down play from inside the Roughneck 35 yard line.

Sundown quarterback Kyle Motheral lofted a pass out to the right flat where Acevedo camped under the ball at the 42 and raced into the left corner of the endzone untouched for the 'Lopes first score. Phil Leininger added the extra point and the 'Lopes led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The 'Lopes didn't get their first offensive touchdown until just under four minutes were left in the half when Reed capped off a 10 play 58 yard drive with a four yard plunge. Leininger's second PAT gave Post a

Reed played a big part in the drive, exploding for a 20 yard gain from the Roughneck 37 down to the 17 on a fourth and almost five play.

Sundown threatened late in the first half. After taking the kick following the 'Lopes second score, the Roughnecks drove down to the Post three yard line only to be denied by Post. The 70 plus yard drive began at the Sundown 25. It included long runs by Bryan McCormack and Keith Willard. Willard gave the Roughnecks at first and goal at the 'Lope six following a 38 yard romp from the

The 'Lopes put it all together on their first drive of the second half. Taking over at their own 26 following a Sundown punt, the 'Lopes steamrolled the Roughnecks on a six play, 74 yard drive that was capped off by a three yard run by Castillo. The drive, all on the ground, featured long gainers by Bell and Gomez. Leininger's point after attempt went wide right leaving the score at Post 20, Sundown 0. It is the intent of the Commissioners Court, as your elected officials, to represent you to the best of their ability. In setting the tax rate, careful consideration was given to the services provided by Garza County. A reduction in taxes will also create a reduction in services.

Regardless of the outcome of the election, we will strive for unity for our county as we have too much going for us to be divisive.



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
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Counselor's Corner

Self-esteem and emotional security are two important aspects of personality. The foundations for both are laid by the family and without extensive, professional intervention they will remain essentially the same throughout the person's lifetime. Schools, churches, friends do provide modifications, but the core remains intact. Self-esteem is made up of all the feelings and

attitudes the person has about himself. How does a family develop a child's self-esteem? The process starts at birth. During infancy the baby learns from the family if his world is a safe place and one he can put trust in. This feeling develops as a result of the way the family attends to the infants needs. If it is prompt and consistent the infant will feel loved and cared for. If it is slow and/or often missing the infant

will view the world as an unsafe place and will not develop trust.

The goal as a toddler is to achieve personal pride and a sense of independence. Parents need to provide the appropriate structure and limits in the environment so the child can begin to explore and learn about his world. These explorations and achievements need to be cheerfully and lovingly acknowledged and applauded. It is through these experiences that a child develops confidence in his own ability to achieve and succeed.

The thoughts and feelings of the child needs to be respected and taken seriously-not belittled and made fun of. This respect fosters a feeling of being valued and worthy. If instead of encouragement the child is constantly criticized he will develop a low opinion of himself. By having his efforts at being a competent, productive, person supported and respected by the family the child learns to believe in himself. When failures and set-backs come the child will consider them just that and not an inevitable way of life.

We raise what we praise. The behaviors that are singled out for attention repeatedly are the ones the child will focus on, too. Children tend to repeat behaviors that bring them attention. If a child with high self-esteem is what we want to raise then we will always be noticing and praising positive, desirable behaviors.

The land in question was part of a Mexican land grant, McCoulskey said, which was partially voided under Mexican law prior to Texas becoming a republic. After Texas won its independence from Mexico, he said, all land not in private ownership reverted to the new

The one-third state ownership in the 4,428 acres was discovered in 1991 during a routine title search for mineral rights. In that search, McCoulskey said, it was discovered that one of the Mexican grantees had not fulfilled ownership requirements and his rights to the land were

Since all state land which was not designated for other purposes was made part of the Texas Permanent School Fund in 1900, McCoulskey says that in the eyes of the state, one-third of the Austin and Fort Bend acreage has been a part of the fund for 93 years.

In March, 1992, McCoulskey said the Texas General Land Office informed the disputed land-owners of the possibility of a state claim for a one-third undivided interest in their

McCoulskey pointed out that Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has not as yet officially laid claim to the land, but that he would have no option if Proposition 3

McCoulskey pointed out that the state has not claimed the land since 1824. He said the May 1993 issue

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

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

In some ways, we are like the frog. The simplest definition of learning is "any change of behavior". Much of our learning good or ill. Studies is done gradually and takes place without our being aware of it. We are unaware of exactly when we learned to walk or talk-it just happened. Put a child in a school where the children enjoy learning, and the child will learn to enjoy school. Put a child in a class where the children resent learning, and the child will "learn" to hate school. In both cases, the child will be unaware of when the attitude was learned. To them it will seem that school is just something that you "naturally" like or don't like. In fact, there is nothing "natural" about it; it is an attitude that is learned without

the child being aware of it.
What we learn is usually determined by the people nearest to us. Learning is contagious. Sometimes it works to our good and sometimes to our harm. If you learn something the wrong way, it takes twice as long to relearn the right way. The old learning gets in the way of the

The Armed Forces is a good example of how learning can take place on an unaware level. The draftee often is resentful and has no intention of becoming a "gungho" soldier. What the army targets is not so much the attitude as it is the behavior. The new recruit has no choice but to behave in a military manner. More often than not born. Consistent and constant monitoring of behavior shapes the new recruit into a new attitude. The new attitude is not consciously selected by the without awareness.

have shown that parental influence, usually by example, exerts the most power in the attitudes of small children. Peer pressure, or the need for peer acceptance through sharing group behavior, becomes a powerful influence of teenagers. Teens are rarely aware of how they are being shaped. Instead, they suffer the delusion of "running their own lives," without the influence of others. Prisons furnish another example—a

sad one—of how behavior shapes attitudes. A young first offender, constantly surrounded by the behavior of repeat offenders, not only becomes a smarter criminal but develops a more vicious attitude towards society. Again, much of that attitude is absorbed with little or no awareness. Prisons provide the perfect educational system, at a cost of 6 times higher than our public schools, for graduating advanced offenders, most of whom will return to prison. In place of prisons, it would benefit society more to build intelligently run boot camps or other such "schools for behavior." Payback means little without behavioral change. The principle is simple: change the behavior and you change the attitude. As free adults, we should take note of

how the changes in our attitudes have taken place. If we would like to become a better person, then we need to surround ourselves with a better influence. The church is highly recommended for that purpose, and not, "gung-ho" soldiers are made, works very well with consistent and constant attendance. The constant church-goer probably will not be aware of all the life forming changes that take place What we usually become aware of is a sense of "missing out" recruit, it evolves from the when church is missed. 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
