Indead, even if the traveler works Friday and not Monday, tax courts have found they dont exceed the saving in air fare gained by staying over Saturtare gained by staying over Satur- day night. The rules are tighter when you go overseas; the business rav- eler must be able to show that as an employe he or she had totake the trip or that it was not primarily a personal vacation trip. <br> please be aware that the new tax law further restricts deductibi- ity of spouse's travel.
