



Tax 'n Facts

Travel for business is far less onerous if you can take along a companion or spend some time sightseeing or playing. In most cases, you can still keep most of your deductions.

The IRS is sticky about companions not actually there on

business, but you need pay out of pocket only extras like the difference between a single and double room, the companion's air fare, food and the like.

If you do business on a Friday and a Monday, the IRS considers the weekend to be business days, and therefore your expenses are deductible, even if you're out sightseeing. Indeed, even if the traveler works Friday and not Monday, tax courts have found weekend expenses deductible if they don't exceed the saving in air fare gained by staying over Satur-

day night.
The rules are tighter when you go overseas; the business traveler must be able to show that as an employee he or she had to take the trip or that it was not primarily a personal vacation trip.

please be aware that the new tax law further restricts deductibility of spouse's travel. Before you go, talk to the tax people at Mason, Warner & Co., P.C.

•Approximately 5,500 people die in fires in this country annually, including about 100 firefighters; and another 30,000 civilians are injured.

•The U.S. fire deaths, per million people are almost twice the average fire death rate for other industrialized nations.

•Each year, fire kills more Americans than all the major natural emergencies combined, including floods, hurricanes, tornadoes and earthquakes.

•Direct property loss due to fires is estimated at \$11.2 billion annually.
