Although Abernathy is picked in some circles to win the state title, Coach Lanham and the Fillies aren't counting themselves out of the picture.

Returning is one of the state's top inside players, Marie Pesch, all-district twice. She averaged 18 points and 14 rebounds as a junior. The 6-0 Pesch is joined by 6-1 Mindy Neal, two-letterman junior and all-district a year ago. Miss Neal averaged 11 points and 12 rebounds last season.

Cousins Terisa Shepherd and Peggy Shepherd also return to the team. Terisa is a 5-3 guard and Peggy is a 5-5 guard.

Donnell Garner, a two-year letterman with playoff experience, has an injured knee, and is currently sidelined. Her place in the starting lineup is being taken by junior forward Robbie Stowers.

Other members of the Fillies' varsity are sophomore Ruby Renteria, junior Sharlet Johnson and junior Rosie Antillon. Linda Duran, a freshman, will split time on the varsity and JV.

"After we beat Abernathy in the last game of the season last year, this helped our confidence a lot. I think we can stay with them," Lanham says.

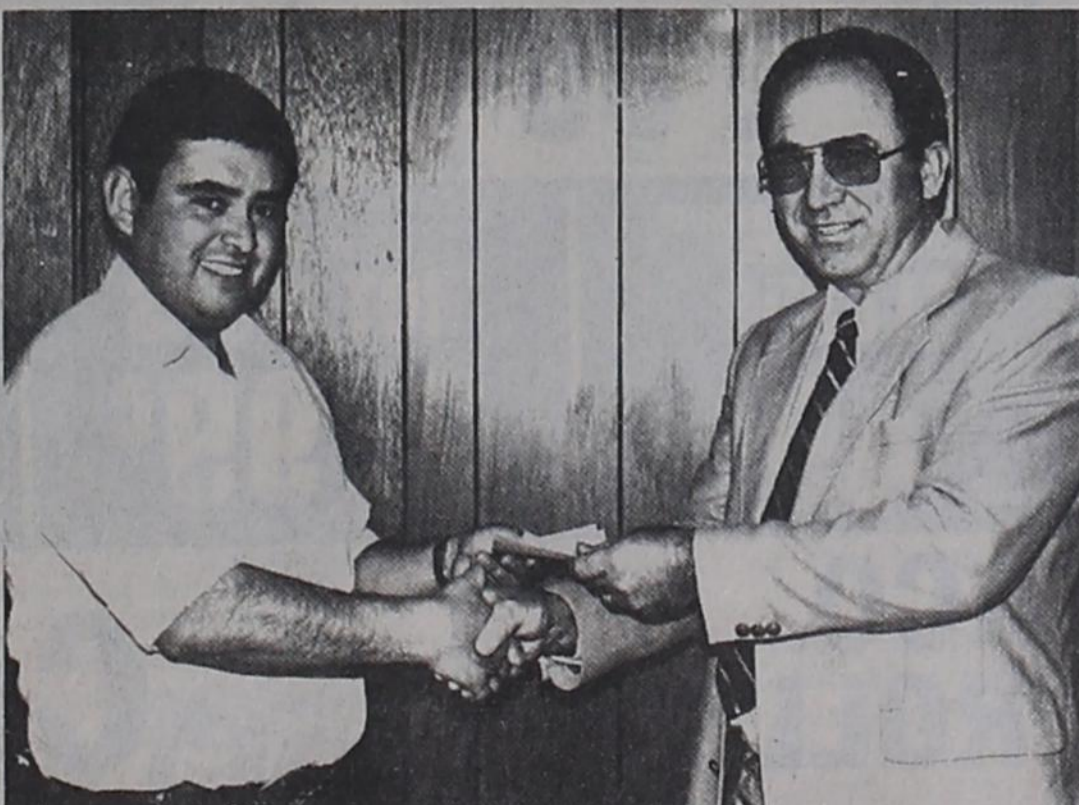
The Fillies have had scrimmage games against Morton, picked to gain the regional round, and

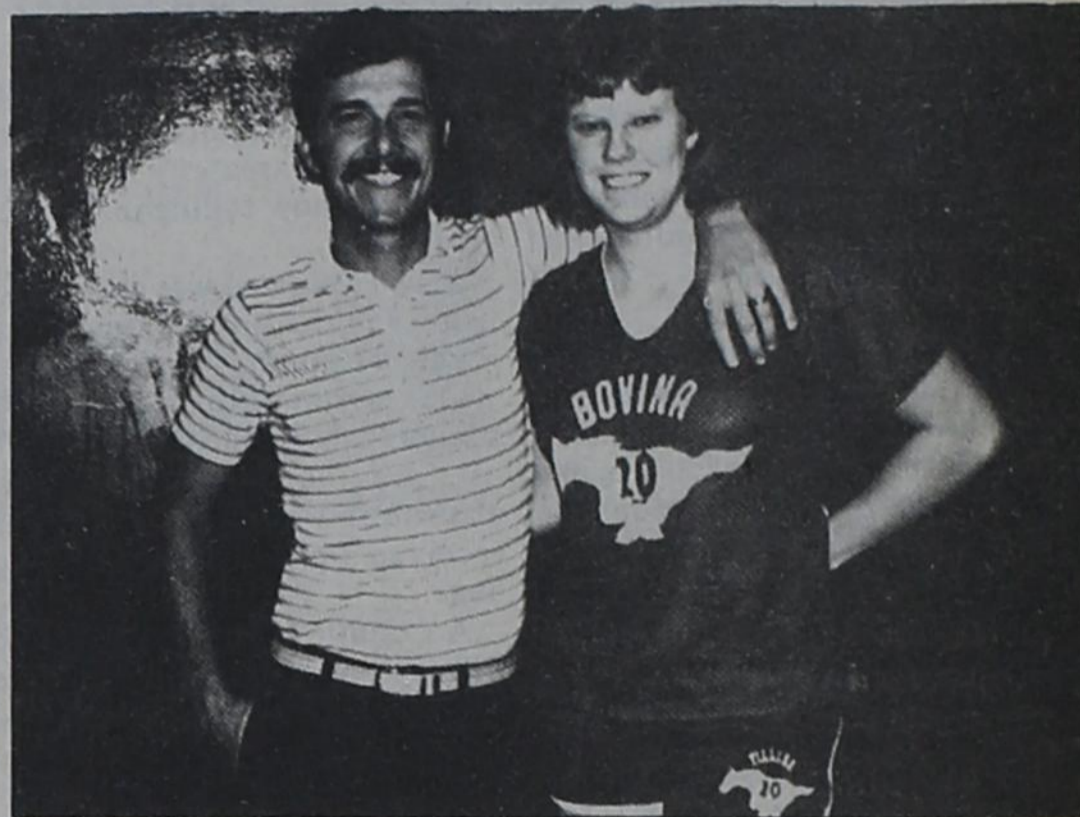
## Bank Gives Pair Of Promotions

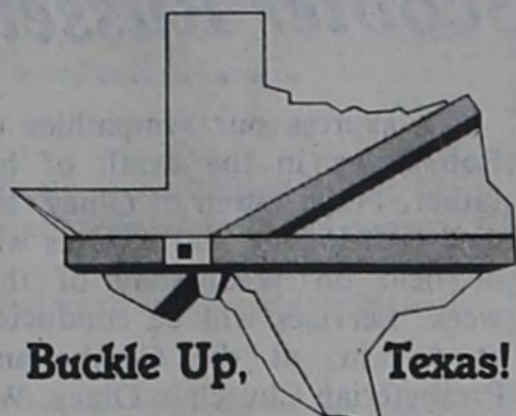

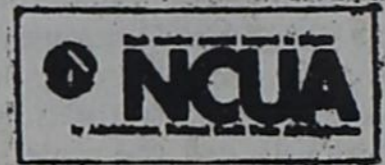

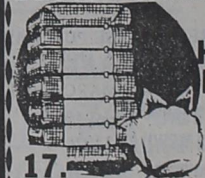
