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
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

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

# Antelopes earn post season honors

Team success on the football field has brought individual honors for a number of players from this year's district tri-champion Post Antelopes. Fourteen players earned either first, second or honorable mention District 4 2A honors from the 'Lopes squad that finished the year at 7-3. Included in this list were eight first team members (one player earned honors on both sides of the ball), five second team members and two honorable mention players.

"It's the most we've had in a while," said Bold Gold head coach Dewayne Osborne. All-district honors are awarded after the district's coaches meet at the conclusion of the regular season. Each head coach nominates players they feel deserve all-district honors and then the coaches vote on these players.







enforcement. For each dollar that you reduce your support of city programs, we will reduce our support to county programs by an equal amount; when the county is no longer paying any money to city-sponsored programs, the city will still be paying a considerable amount of money to county programs, which we may decide to cut the first time we have a tax crisis.'

This body is to be commended that it came in with a budget for the year of 1994 that holds the line on taxes. This was not accomplished by smoke and mirrors, but by hard-nosed reduction in spending and down-sizing the operation of government.

As previously stated, the rollback committee is not 'after any one individual', but we are determined to point out to the public what we consider to be excessive and wasteful spending in county government or any other unit of government that comes under our scrutiny. While the rollback committee was created solely to roll back county taxes, hopefully out of

this will come a permanent watchdog committee that will continue to look over the shoulders of all governmental entities in Garza County.

The commissioners court must be enjoying a laugh at the expense of the people of the city of Post by threatening them to withhold certain services, as if the citizens of the city of Post are not county tax payers. I call to the attention of any and everyone who is willing to listen, that no member of the commissioners court can be elected without securing a majority of the votes from people who reside within the city of Post. I further call to the attention of this body that the threat of the commissioners court to pull out of city-sponsored programs is a bluff that should be immediately called by informing the county that for every dollar they cut out of city-sponsored programs, the city will cut an equal amount out of county-sponsored programs. Once the commissioners court realizes that it cannot bully or bluff the city council, then the commissioners court will be forced to take a realistic look at its expenditures.
