by John Cordsen Garza County Judge Giles Dalby pointed to new accessibility standards of the Texas Election Code as yet another example of state mandates passed down to the local level without any consideration of funding the new regulations.

"There again, this is just another mandate coming to us from the state," said Judge Dalby during the commissioner's court meeting on January 10.

Judge Dalby has said in the past, that the right or wrong of the mandate's purpose is not the issue. He said the issue is state and national leaders passing laws that cause severe economic hardship on the local level, often with increased taxes to pay for the measure, and not providing any relief in funding these mandates.

While not seriously effecting the county, Judge Dalby told the court that each commissioner needed to be aware of the new standards and make any changes in polling places to bring them into compliance. Garza County Clerk Sonny Gossett told the court that all of the current polling places except one at Close City were in compliance with the new standards. The Close City site has a small step up that might fall outside the standards. Gossett said he would be checking with the Secretary of State for a ruling.

"I always tell the Secretary of State that curbside voting is available," for persons who can't negotiate the step.







The law in the are of redistricting is very specialized. at the hands of the statistical information from the census bureau is sent to the County in a ustangs in the ormat that requires a strict review by the United States Department of contest. The istice to obtain preclearance before the County can implement any City defense ommissioners Precinct Plan for elections. The County is not required to fense in check livertise for a personal service such as legal advice. However, several law rms and demographers sent proposals to the County. No local attorney sent dies in scoring proposal to redistrict to the County. There are only a few law firms in Texas included Hill at specialize in redistricting law. The firm in Amarillo, Texas is the only ce, 5; Rache rm that specializes in redistricting in West Texas.

On September 30, 1991, the County Commissioners Court adopted a districting plan. On October 30, 1991, the plan was submitted to the epartment of Justice. The submitted required documentation included etailed registered voter information, election returns by election precinct nalyzed by Hispanic surname, a detailed description of the redistricting rocess, all legal notices and postings of any meeting held in connection with e redistricting process, list of any minority involved with the redistricting rocess, all publicity and participation in regard to the redistricting process nd all minutes of the public hearings conducted in regard to the redistricting rocess. On January 3, 1992, the United States Department of Justice quested additional information. The request was for information already the possession of the Department of Justice with the exception of every ap drawn by the computer programmer employed by the County. The quest was not made based on any mistake made by the County or its mployee. The statistical information and maps were precise and accurately flected all changes in precinct lines. As a matter of fact, computer mapping statistically error free. There is little possibility of error when census block formation is transferred from the mapping file to the document files. For is reason computer mapping is the most efficient system to use in the districting process. The request was made to ensure that the Department of istice had all information in the County's possession in regard to redistricting. in March 23, 1992 the United States Department of Justice precleared the ounty Commissioners Precinct and Election Precinct Boundaries. By districting voluntarily or without litigation that forced Garza County to edistrict, the Commissioners Court saved the County thousands of dollars. ecause of the minority population in Garza County, if the Commissioners ourt had failed to take the step to redistrict, it is almost certain that instead f having redistricting behind us, we would now be in the middle of xpensive litigation. As to the costs, the county paid the firm of lawyers in Amarillo \$17,608.48 nd paid \$1,891.52 for publications in the Post Dispatch newspaper. The expertise provided by the Amarillo lawfirm was justified, "You don't o to a general practitioner for brain surgery." Garza County Commissioners Court

Q: I have carefully studied the budget of Garza County as well as the budget of the City of Post and, if I understand what I have studied, I am in agreement with Mr. Jerry Riedel, Chairman of the Rollback Committee that the city actually spends about \$140,000 more supporting city programs; yet, we city citizens are told that the commissioners court is going to pull out of city-sponsored programs. I wonder if the commissioners court seriously believes that if they pull out of the park program, the community center program, the landfill, and other city programs, that the city fathers will continue to subsidize the county in its law enforcement operation, if the city will continue to furnish a fire department for the benefit of rural citizens, and if Garza County is going to set up its own separate landfill and fire department or whether it is going to actually admit that it cannot bully and bluster the city council as they have attempted to do.

#### A: It was never the intent of the Commissioners Court to threaten or put undue pressure on the Post City Council, we were only striving to make them aware of the ramifications of such an act.

The County is not in a position to raise rates and service charges such as the City is able to do. As our mandated services and regulations expand; and get more costly, our only source of additional revenue is through a tax increase.

We are the first to admit that due to the fact that we could not see into the future and predict the fast erosion of our tax base. Had we, over the years, raised taxes to the maximum limit we would not have been in this position, but we chose to operate as prudently as possible and saved the taxpayers money in the past years.

You only need to compare our present tax rate (even with the tax increase) with our sister counties to realize the efforts that the present and past commissioners court have made to operate Garza County in a prudent and businesslike manner. #### To the editor,

Q: I would like more information on our county airport, what kind of revenue does it bring in? How much rent is paid for the land, to the county? How many lots are rented? Do the hanger's belong to the county or the renter? If not, does the renter, rent spaces in them? How much do they charge for the spaces? Is it true, that the \$33,500.00 in the county budget listed under Airport P.I is money still owed from this year? How many use the airport on a regular basis? From reading what was in the paper, from grants, city & county. Last year we invested with what is still owed over \$100,000.00. What kind of return comes from this kind of investment? How many of us are receiving services from it? In the budget I see that all of our social services together receive only \$136,131.82. How many receive services from them on a regular basis? The budget shows 20 different department, running on \$36,131.82 more than it took for the airport repairs. Under Social Services the airport shows up again for another \$3,000.00. Also another \$5,000.00 shows up under miscellaneous expenses. What are these expenses? To whoever has the answers. Lanora Eilenberger

A: The Airport Revenue Services are from lots rented to allow and individual to build their own hanger. Rental is \$75 per year, per lot; in addition they receive a\$140 per year for pasture rental, of excess property.

The County, nor the City receive any rental from any airport source, all revenue generated at or by the airport is kept and used by the Airport Board.

There are 15 lots that pay rent to the Airport Board. A list of the renters may be obtained from the airport board.

The line item in the budget shows the \$33,500 which includes capital out lay/airport/courthouse annex. \$30,500 was spent as capital outlay and courthouse expenses. \$3000 is final balance of airport recondition project owed to the Texas Department of Transportation. More detailed information of cost of reconstruction of the airport at the Post City Hall and the County Judge office for anyone wishing more information.

There are 12 to 15 airplanes based at the Post Airport, and 40 to 60 airplanes use the Post Airport per month that are based elsewhere. All of the airplanes and hangers based in Post are on the tax roll.

The \$31,600 expend by the City and County was matched by the Federal Aviation Agency with a grant of over \$500,000.

The number of people served under Social Services are for the most part confidential and the agency's do not give out that information.

The \$3,000 line item on page 28 is the regular allowance made to the airport of operating this fiscal year. The \$5,000 for miscellaneous items are for any item not budgeted, but approved such as indigent burial expenses. Garza County Commissioners Court
