## Possible spending cuts <br> weighed by Officials

According to the commissioners at the special Jan. 18 meeting, with the exception of public health and safety
programs, everything within the county programs, everything within the county
budget is open to cuts.
"We could cutacross the board," said commissioner Herb Walls who added that he did not want to see one area
take more of a spending hit than another.
Salaries
Slearies of county employees and
elected officials did not escape the
shadow of possible cuts.
If therollback passes, it throws open the whole budget, including salaries," said Garza County Judge Giles Dalby. Judge Dalby went on to say later in
the meeting that salary cuts would probably be a last resort and then they would still be looked at very carefully.
What the commissioners discussed What the commissioners discussed speculation. Nodefinitecuts have been settled on, the court has repeatedly
stated it will make as many of the area stated it will make as many of the area
that will be cut known before the rollback election.
"We need to inform everybody as
close as we can to the cuts that will be
undertaken," said Judge Dalby.
With this in mind, the court has
planned two public hearings on the
budget, the firstnext Mondayevening, budget, the first next Monday evening,
Jan. 24 at 7 p.m. in the community center. A second one will be Feb. 7, also at the community center. Commissioner Lee Norman said the
precincts should be the first in line for precincts should be the first in line for
cuts, saying they receive approximately 15 percent of the advelorum taxes so they should expect a 15 percent cut across the board.
Otherareas mentioned at the meeting included the community center, parks and library. These areas were mentions as 100 percent reduction areas, either pick up the county's cut areas, or reduce services.
"It's no secret if we get hit, you're in that snowball with us," Judge Daiby who was at the meeting. "Iguarentee when we publish this list, we'll have ipeople saying no to their areas."
