
members. Prior to the premium sale on Saturday, awards were presented to outstanding exhibitors.



A number of special items were also donated for auction during the course of the show to earn money for the building fund.



Serving as officers of the GCJLA for 1993-94 have been Steve Cooper, president; Milton Williams, vicepresident and Rusty Morris, recording secretary.



Commissioners argue against rollback at townmeeting

A supportive crowd of over 60 Post and Garza County citizens listened Monday night as county officials told their side in the property tax rollback effort currently underway.

The meeting was the first of two scheduled by the commissioners before the February 12 rollback election. A second meeting is scheduled for February 7 at the community center.

"We'd like to hear what you think we should cut should this rollback be effective," said Garza County Judge Giles Dalby during his opening remarks.

What he heard instead was many in the audience voice their support for the commissioners.

Tax 'n Facts by Terri S. Cash, CPA

Were Your Taxes Underwithheld?

When Congress increased the top tax rates last summer--with changes retroactive to January 1 the Internal Revenue Service did not require employers to increase withholding so most high earners are going to find themselves owing a lot more than they expected come April 15.

Just this once, for those hit by the new rates, the I.R.S. is permitting taxpayers to pay the extra tax over a three-year period without interest or penalty. But this takes careful planning with your tax advisor, because the calculation is complex and may involve alternative minimum tax.

If you must file for an extension on your '93 return, make sure your first annual one-third installment is adequate. If you have to project your 1993 return balance, make sure you err on the side of overpaying on April 15, 1994 rather than coming up short. Instead of paying one third each year, you may want to pay 40 percent, 27 percent and 33 percent.



The number of abused and neglected children is burgeoning; while the state funds to provide care for them is decreasing. Many social problems like this should be addressed in the private sector is an opinion that an increasing number of people are saying. One of the ways people organize to work to help alleviate such monumental problems is by forming non-profit volunteer organizations. CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) is just such a program.

In 1977 Judge Soukup of Seattle, Washington, created CASA. His desire was to make sure that the best interest of the child was consistently presented. CASA is a nonprofit organization manned primarily by volunteers. When a judge is hearing a case involving child abuse or neglect and sees the need he/she will contact the local CASA office and a volunteer will be assigned to that child. The volunteer, who has received special training, will investigate the case and then file a report to the court. Based on this investigation the volunteer will make recommendations regarding what would be in the child's best interest. The court will then decide to accept or not accept these recommendations.

The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention has declared this program to be one of the most successful and innovative. It is also supported by the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges. The Texas State Bar Association shows it's support by funding the CASA newsletter, the Heartbeat. The number of cases reported to Children's Protective Services doubled between 1980 and 1990. Funding has decreased and the number of cases handled by each caseworker has increased.. In 1990 833,000 cases of child abuse or neglect were substantiated. Every day more than three children die in the United States as a result of abuse and neglect most of these are under five years of age, with 53% being less than one year old.


for their safety and well-being for at least one day. In Texas the number of children in foster care increased 23% between 1985 and 1988. A 1989 government study predicted that the number of children in foster care would increase another 73% in the next five years. This upward spiral in service needs is occurring at the same time we are facing a budget crisis.

Child abuse and neglect form the cornerstone for two of our biggest problems, delinquency and crime. Crime is not only on the increase; but the degree of violence associated with it is also increasing. According to government records juveniles arrested for involvement in violent crimes has increased by a third over the preceding decade. FBI records indicate that almost half of all serious crimes are being perpetrated by juveniles. 93% of prison inmates were abused and/or neglected as children. Studies dating back at least fifty years have established childhood abuse and neglect to be a major factor in the backgrounds of delinquents many of which go on to become adult offenders.

Abuse is a self perpetuating cycle; abuse breed abuse and violence breeds violence. Children reared by abusive/ neglectful families usually appear before the court first as a victim of their family situation. But, as they grow older they often reappear for delinquent behavior, later in life for criminal behavior, and also many times for being abusive/neglectful parents themselves. Abuse/neglect is a malevolent family legacy handed down from one generation to the next. The search for ways to break this crippling chain of misery has been a long and frustrating

Early intervention is the first step. In some cities CASA is a part of this first step. CASA works! The average length of time children spend in the state's care is 2 1/2 years. CASA is able to expedite the process and minimize that time to about 13 months. The CASA concept is based on the commitment that every child has the right to a safe, permanent home. Early intervention that provides the child with a home where he can experience love, trust, and loyalty is an important key. Behavior is learned. There are CASA programs in approximately 45 counties in Texas at the present time. Texas has 254 counties. 

Know the Garza County Tax Facts Before You VOTE!!!

The duly elected commissioners court in Garza County followed the guidelines set out by the Legislature in the preparation of the 1993-94 budget. After the two public hearings in which a total of two people spoke up against higher taxes in general, one aired concerns about supplemental funds paid to the district attorney and district judge, and two asked for the budget to include funds for the museum and Caprock Cultural Plan, the commissioners deliberated further, then adopted the 1993-94 budget which calls for general fund spending of \$1,196,104. This compares to a budget of \$1,411,514 last year. The tax rate was raised from .21 per \$100 valuation to .285 per \$100 valuation. In an effort to hold down the tax rate, the commissioners cut \$86,000 from budget requests before ever presenting the budget at public hearings.

Now, after the acceptance of the budget, the tax roll back committee has petitioned the court and an election must be held for the voters to decide whether or not they want to roll the tax rate back to .2482. The cost of the election will be approximately \$5,000. Additional costs for printing checks, postage to mail the refunds, and the entire process of implementing the refund will be approximately \$15,000 which, when added to the \$157,876 refund, will leave the county with approximately \$180,000 to cut from a budget that is already tight. The registered voters of Garza County must decide whether they are willing to ask the county to cut that much money.

WHO REALLY PAYS THE AD VALOREM TAXES?

In reality, who actually pays the majority of taxes in Garza county and who will receive the refund? As you can see reflected on the following chart, 52% of the ad valorem tax is paid by 15 taxpayers who happen to be the major oil companies in the area. These are also the taxpayers who will receive 52% of the refund. Only 18.8%, or \$29,714.06, will be refunded to real estate taxpayers. Altogether, 74% of the ad valorem tax is paid by oil and mineral interest.

One of the questions people are asking is how much money will I get back if the rollback passes. The average house appraisal in Garza County is \$30,000. The refund on the average house will be \$11.04. The accompanying chart shows the value and refund figures.



WHY IS THERE AN INCREASE IN TAXES IF THE BUDGET IS REDUCED?

A large decrease in the valuation reflected price drops in oil. Also a drastic reduction in interest income impacted the revenue. In 1982, the taxable value in Garza County was \$603,361,713 and the tax rate was .12832. The accompanying chart depicts the drop in the property valuation over the past ten years. Notice the years 1987 through 1990, the tax rate remained unchanged. The commissioners have fought to keep the taxes in Garza County as low as possible. At times reserve accounts were used instead of increasing the tax rate but now the reserves are too low to be prudently accessed.




WHERE WILL THE CUTS BE MADE?

Another question on the minds of voters is what projects will receive reduced funding if the rollback election passes and at least \$180,000 must be cut from the budget? Many of the projects such as the library, community center, sanitary landfill, park, and airport are joint ventures with the city of Post. Are the voters going to say let the city take care of these projects themselves? If so, how will the city be able to fund them? The choices are not easy: fees and rates for services will probably be raised or the services discontinued. Other items such as law enforcement, fire control, ambulance service, and mental health services are for the public safety and welfare. Should these departments be cut back to a level where they can no longer efficiently function?

There are no easy answers to the taxpayers, but remember, this is government of the people, by the people, for the people. There can be no services for the people if they are not paid for by the people. Look again at the taxpayers chart and see who is paying the taxes and ask yourself am I paying more than my fair share for the services I receive?

Garza County has traditionally been a low tax county. Even with the increase to .285 for the 1993-94 fiscal year, Garza County remains next to the lowest in tax rate of area counties.







Lawn preparation now pays later

We all appreciate a thick, green lawn around our home. A good lawn not only adds to the aesthetic value but, adds to the enjoyment as well. To achieve a level of high quality, it is necessary to add fertilizer on a timely hasis. When a lawn does not receive as much fertilizer as it needs, it will seldom achieve the quality we expect. When too much fertilizer is applied, the level of lawn quality is achieved but, the presence of excessive nutrients in the soil may contribute to ground water contamination.

All plants, including turfgrass, need some 15 different nutrients to live. Most of these are found in the soil or come from the air. For a lawn to achieve expected performance, extra plant nutrients may be needed.

The best time to evaluate soil nutrient status through a soil test is in the winter months when lawns are not actively growing. For your soil test to be as accurate as possible, please don't test soil for at least two weeks after a available in our office include a sample fertilizer has been applied.

A soil test is a series of chemical procedures hat determine the presence and availability of the major plant nutrients in the soil. There are many reputable companies that offer a soil test including the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Based on the results from your soil sample, the lab will send you a computer print out, usually within two weeks, providing the following information:

1. Which fertilizer analysis is best for your lawn. The analysis and percentage of nitrogen, phosphorous the Courthouse.

3. When during the year each application should be made.

By knowing the exact shortages, surpluses and recommendations of each nutrient, a homeowner can avoid applying too little or too much fertilizer and therefore save money and reduce

They are very simple to use and take and provide a complete detailed analysis of the items mentioned previously. The kits sheet, sample bags and a mailing box. 





