EVER SINCE THE firing of Texas Tech head coach Jerry Moore, we have intended to write a letter to the editor of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Yes--sometimes even editors feel like writing a letter to the editor. But at the same time, editors are also lax about sitting down and writing, even to their family.

So, here's what I was going to write, if I had written a letter to the Lubbock newspaper: (If anyone agrees, you might clip it out and mail it on to the A-J. If you disagree, just ignore it, like you are apt to do most of the stuff I write.)

DEAR EDITOR:

I personally thought the firing of Coach Jerry Moore was in very poor taste. Not just the firing, but also the manner, and timing of the firing. It left a bad taste in the collective mouths of a lot of us "exes." Sure, we'd like to see a winning football team at Tech. But we like to see folks treated properly, too.

And as to the Avalanche-Journal: I thought you acted more than a little hypocritical following the firing episode.

About the time that Tech lost to Texas A&M, and really building after the Raiders' last-minute loss to Rice, the Avalanche-Journal began to jump onto Coach Moore with both feet, dragging out reminders of his record and asking pointedly if this was to be Jerry's last year at Raiderland.

Yet, on the morning after Moore's firing, the Avalanche-Journal's headline on the sports section said something like "Raiders Bitter About Moore's Firing," and the article almost took sides with the dismissed coach, hinting that the sports staff would never have done such a dastardly deed.

What's going on? A more appropriate headline might have been: "Hooray--We Got What We Were Wanting!"

We commented in passing that the head football coaching job at Tech is bound to be one of the toughest jobs in the country, and doubted that Tech fans and its administration would have put up with Tom Landry if he hadn't gotten the Raiders into the Cotton Bowl after five years.

You can almost hear the conversation now: "Yes, Tom, we realize that you lost four games by a combined total of six points. Yes, we know that two of the games were decided on school record field goals, and that the Raiders were picked at the bottom, while virtually every team that beat you was given a shot at possibly winning the conference title."

"...Yes, we realize that you recruited well, and that the material for next year, with big Billy Joe Tolliver at quarterback, looks much better. But we're sorry, Tom. Your five years are up. Yes, you probably should have stayed with the Cowboys. They are a more patient organization..."

At least, with the dismissal of Jerry Moore, we Raider fans thought, here's a chance to get a name coach, or someone with charisma. David McWho?

Good luck, David, and by the way, your clock is running. Don't want to make you nervous, but if you haven't won the SWC crown by 1990, it probably wouldn't be advisable to make a lot of long-range commitments in the Lubbock area.

School Fund Debate Heard At Meeting

(From the Clovis News-Journal)

The fate of \$934,000 remained up in the air Monday after representatives from the four Parmer County school districts argued for the dispersal of the Parmer County permanent school fund.

School board representatives from Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie came before the regular session of the county commissioners court to argue for the dispersal of the accumulated principle in the fund, which has grown to \$934,000.

In previous years, interest from the fund has been distributed to the four school districts, pro rated from the schools' average daily attendance figures. The monies distributed in this fashion, school representatives argued Monday, are appreciated but are so small as to amount to almost nothing considering the costs Texas schools face in coming years.

At the heart of the fight for dispersal are the mandates of Texas' new school reform law, House Bill 72. The requirements of the bill have set rigorous standards for all Texas schools, some of which will necessitate hiring additional personnel and constructing new classroom facilities in the near future.

Under state regulations, the principle, if dispersed to the county's schools, can be used only to make permanent improvements to a school or to reduce bonded indebtedness.

Permanent improvements such as classroom construction, said Friona Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe, is the real issue at hand. Friona, he said, spent \$300,000 for classroom construction recently, and the district had to dig deeply into operational funds to complete the building project.

Jarboe said Friona would like to have that \$300,000 repaid from the permanent fund's principle, but indicated his efforts to gain such payment have met no success.

Earlier this year, the commissioner's court sought an opinion from Texas Attorney

General Jim Mattox concerning the conditions under which they could disperse the fund. Parmer County Attorney Charles Aycock said the opinion sets two conditions which must be met before any dispersal.

First, the school in question must present a proposal for the construction it plans. The district also must submit results of a "school census" which counts all persons in the school district eligible for free public education.

Monday's discussion often slipped from the realm of politics and finance into personalities. Jarboe and several other school representatives said they thought the court's refusal to disperse the funds showed a lack of trust in local school boards.

One representative said the members of the commissioner's court seemed to think that if given the funds, the school districts would spend it frivolously and right away. When County Judge Porter Roberts said he probably would spend the money right away, most of the school representatives erupted in angry cries and replies, saying Roberts might do so, but they would not.

Bovina Superintendent of Schools Bob Owen said he thought the court didn't really understand the expenses schools face under HB 72.

"We're looking not only at increased salaries, but the addition of staff members to meet the mandates," Owen said.

Friona school board president Jerry Hinkle said that if the fund is not dispersed, all four of the school districts will be forced to

raise taxes, "If (we receive) a decline from the court, it's an indication from you that the taxes need to go up. That's how we see it," he told the court.

Roberts said the issue is not whether the schools really need money, but whether there will be a cash reserve available in future years should times get hard.

To this, Jarboe replied, "People keep saying, 'What happens on a rainy day?' To a lot of us, it looks like it's showering now."

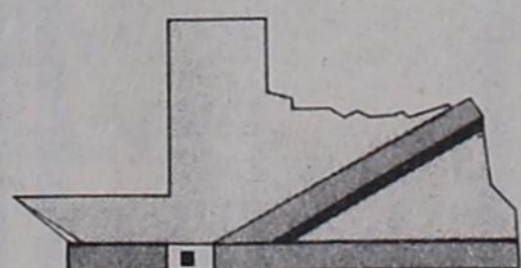
Should the court not free up the funds, Jarboe said, the schools will be forced to spend operational monies on construction, effectively bankrupting their operational budgets. Then, when the court steps in to disperse the funds, they'll do no good, as the monies cannot be used for operational expenses and the schools will need no more permanent improvements.

After two hours of discussion, the court said, in effect, that it would consider making payments from the permanent fund's principle to the schools for individual projects, if the school asking for the monies provides adequate plans beforehand or proper contractor's bills after the fact and also conducts the required school census.

No action was taken, but both Roberts and Commissioner Ernest Anthony indicated they would not support a wholesale breakup of the fund. Similar sentiments were expressed by Commissioner Robert White. Commissioner Tommy Williams, however, said he would support distributing the fund's principle all at once.

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
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4-H Trap Shoot Is Well-Attended

The Fillies dropped a 59-52 decision for their first season loss, and the Mustangs were overpowered by the Swifts, 80-49.

The Fillies had a terrible first quarter against the Nazareth girls, and wound up on the low end of a 20-4 score. Both teams started off cold, with neither able to score for awhile. But Nazareth seemed to settle down before the Fillies did, and soon had the lead.

Bovina bounced back for a good second quarter, scoring 17 points to Nazareth's 18, but the visiting girls had a 17-point halftime lead, 38-21.

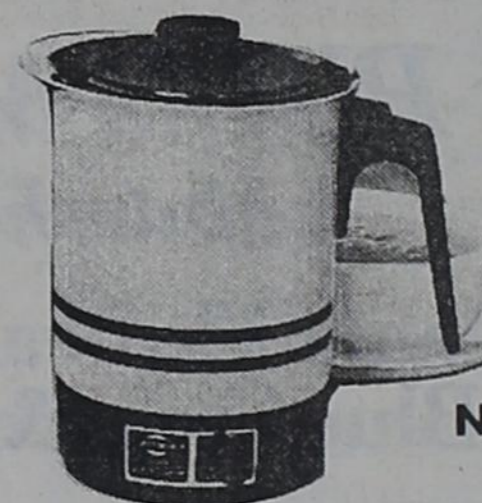

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

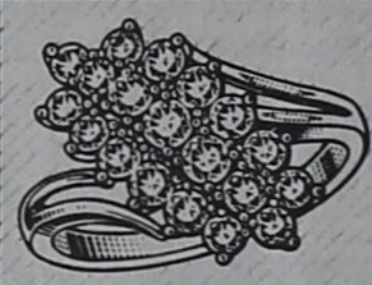

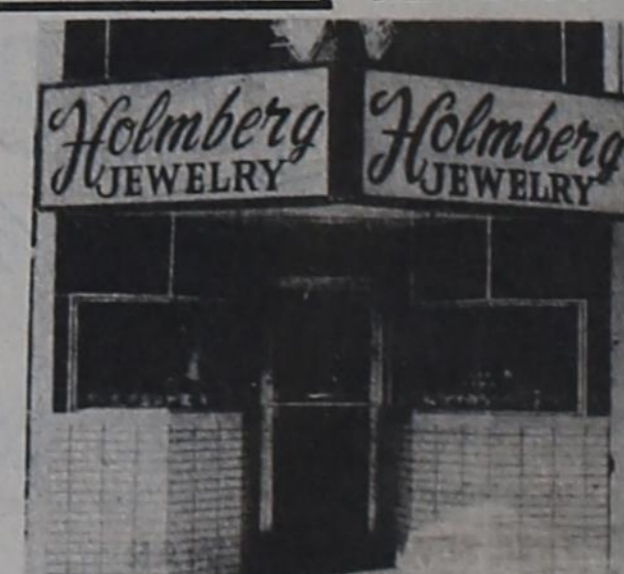
