number of citizens are not happy with the result. An increasing number of
stray dogs and cats has broughtapublic stray dogs and cats has broughtapublic
outcry demanding something be done. outcry demanding something be done.
The Post City Council gave the problem high priority during its March 1 meeting.
Laws are already in the books for combating the problem of stray and or
loose animals. The current ordinance prohibits the unrestricted roaming of cats and dogs. To comply with the
ordinance, dogs and cats must be ordinance, dogs and cats must be
restrained on their owners property. restrained on their owners property.
"Technically they (cats and dogs) can't even run loose on the owners property withoutafence, leashor some
other form of confinement," said other form of confinement,", said Interim city manager DelbertRudd.
He said this included dogs in the back of pickups.
Violations of the city's leash law can result in fines against owners or the impoundment and possible destruction of the animal.
If we pick up one that has tags we
will notify the owner," said Rudd.

scheduled for Tuesday, March 22 at dawn. According to organizers of the ceremony, spectators should arrive at the Post City Park 6 a.m. with the ceremony scheduled to begin notlong after. It concludes at approximately $6: 48 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Each year that Runkles has conducted the ceremony here
in Post visitors gather around a circular ceremonial ring as Runkles, clad in traditional Indian buckskins and feathered headdress performs an authentic Indian dance which according to legend, predicts the coming year's weather Orecast, crop success and overall outlook for the area.
