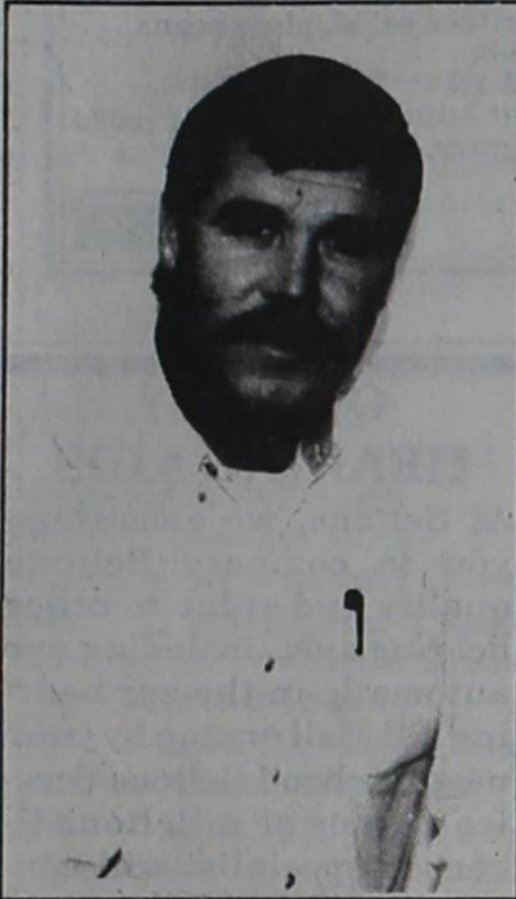

Postex site becomes a beehive of activity as inaugural Old Mill Trade Days approaches

Activity around the Postex mill has increased considerably the last few weeks as the inaugural Old Mill Trade Days scheduled for April 28 through May 1 draws near.

Vendors, contractors and volunteers are busy putting the mill in shape to host the Trade Days event. Construction is centered around the first building that will house booths and an adjacent structure that will include a number of food vendors.

"The food concessions are full," said Sheree Butler, who along with her husband Marvin are working to see their dream of a Canton, Texas like trade expo come true here in Post.

With 10 food vendors already signed on, Sheree says they will offer a good choice of food items.

The food booths aren't the only spaced that are filling up fast. At last count, Sheree said they had reservations for close to 125 booths and counting.

"We have a real good variety," said Butler. "Not a whole lot of just one thing."

The main building is almost full and a good number of vendors have also rented outside space, some under a tin awning and others are either moving in pre-built structures or building their own.

One vendor who is building his own is Rex Bridges from Lubbock. He will have two booths at the first Trade Days, one inside where he will sell patio furniture (tables and such) his other booth is outside where he is building a food outlet on the east side of the main building.

Bridges said he heard about Post's Old Mill Trade Days through news stories in the paper. A newcomer to trade fairs, Bridges says he builds "functional originals."

The patio furniture Bridges builds and sells will be replaced in the fall by handmade rolling pins and cutting boards. Bridges says that is his "real love".

With a little less than a month to go, Sheree says she has sent out a little more than 600 packets of information on Old Mill Trade Days.

"I'm hoping to have a little more than 300 booths rented with a waiting list by the time we open," she said.

According to the Butlers, the Postex Mill is the perfect site for Old Mill Trade Days. It not only provides ample space, but much of the projected booth space would be indoors. Another valuable asset the Butler's dream would enjoy is Post's reputation throughout west Texas.

"Post is already do well known," said Marvin. "The reputation we have

could make it happen here."

The vision the Butler and his wife share is literally hundreds of craft and antique booths, each selling high quality items to thousands of eager shoppers. The idea has proven it can work in the right environment. The Canton trade fair is the largest one in the United States. It draws approximately 140,000 shoppers a month for the six day run to this little town of 3,000 located east of Dallas.

The Butlers say Post is perfect for such a fair because of its central location between Lubbock, Midland and Abilene. Marvin also says Post is ripe for trade days because of the many activities and projects already in place. "We're on the right track," said Butler. "People are already coming to Post to shop. They come largely on word of mouth."

Based on projections Marvin has put together, not only will the trade days attract large numbers of shoppers, it will also be bringing close to 700 vendors to the community when everything is running at the capacity Butler envisions.

"When these people come to Post they will want to see everything Post has to offer," said Butler.

"Seeing" everything means shopping, eating and other activities right here in Post.

Officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) announce their 37th annual membership meeting will be held April 8.

PCG's meeting will be held in room 107 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center in conjunction with the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association (TCGA) convention and trade show April 8-9. All producers and ginners are invited to attend.

Registration for the PCG meeting will begin at 8:30 a.m. outside room 107. The program is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m.

PCG officials are pleased to have three outstanding speakers on the agenda for the meeting as well. They are: Norma Trolinger, Plant Physiologist at the United States Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service, (USDA-ARS) Plant Stress Lab in Lubbock, to discuss biotechnology and what the future holds for cotton producers in this area; Bill Lovelady, Chairman of the National Cotton Council (NCC) Producer Steering Committee to discuss legislative issues facing the cotton industry; and, Steve Verett, Executive Director, Texas Food and Fiber Commission to talk about the role of that agency and how it relates to the cotton industry in Texas.

A TAX-FREE TRANSFER OF PROPERTY

The parents retain control of the property until they choose to relinquish it, and the transfer restrictions limit the market value of the property being passed.

Thank you Ingrid and all of you who are recycling.

In the March 1994 issue of Better Homes and Gardens, a survey with 10,000 responses from readers said that the agriculture industry is the group responding the best to environmental concerns, followed by citizens, corporations and businesses and far behind...government. They also said that water pollution is the number one environmental problem and that environmental groups were the most trustworthy source of environmental information. 84% of those surveyed said that they recycled and 63% are cutting back on lawn chemicals. I would say that this survey is valid if we can use Garza County as an example. The response in our area to recycling proves the point.

I'm sure you think I'm a broken record, but this issue is an urgent one. Another idea to save money and the environment is to break the foam cup and plate habit. The chemicals in polystyrene foam containers won't biodegrade and may be ozone-damaging. For picnics, buy inexpensive dishes at a yard sale or Good Will. For the office coffee machine, use a washable mug. When throwaways can't be avoided, use paper plates and cups. Patronize restaurants that wrap food in paper or cardboard, not foam.

If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

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
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

Injuries to starters force changes in Antelopes pitching rotation

Despite injuries and sore arms, the Post Bold Gold Antelopes won two out of three ball games last week. The 'Lopes swept a home and home series with the Abernathy Antelopes on Tuesday and Thursday before running out of arms in an 18-8 loss to Roosevelt Friday in Post.

In the two games against Abernathy, the 'Lopes pounded out 21 hits and scored 19 runs. The 'Lopes went into their March 29 game against Abernathy here in Post without staff ace Phil Leininger for the second straight game (foot injury). In the fourth with batters on first and third after an error by Terry, the 'Lopes' second baseman made up for his miscue by pulling the trigger on the

"David Perez in his first outing on the mound did a great job," said Postell. Torres came on in the fifth to relieve Perez.

After the 'Lopes had taken a commanding 11-2 lead going into the sixth, things unraveled a bit for Post. Abernathy scored six times. Their outburst included four straight hits and an error by Post on what could have been an inning ending double play. The game was called by the umpires

after the sixth because of darkness.

Torres had a big day at the plate for Post, going three for three including a single, triple and homerun. He picked up three RBI's for his efforts. For the second straight game Nichols went two for four and picked up an RBI. Jim Simpson, Perez, Garza, Zubia and Terry each had a single hit in the 'Lopes win. Terry was also on base three other times with walks. Garza, Perez and Zubia also had RBI's for Post.

Friday against Roosevelt, the 'Lopes just ran out of arms. Perez, pitching his second game in as many days tired a bit in his outing against the Eagles. With Torres nursing a sore arm, freshman Armando Ayala relieved Perez in the fourth inning.

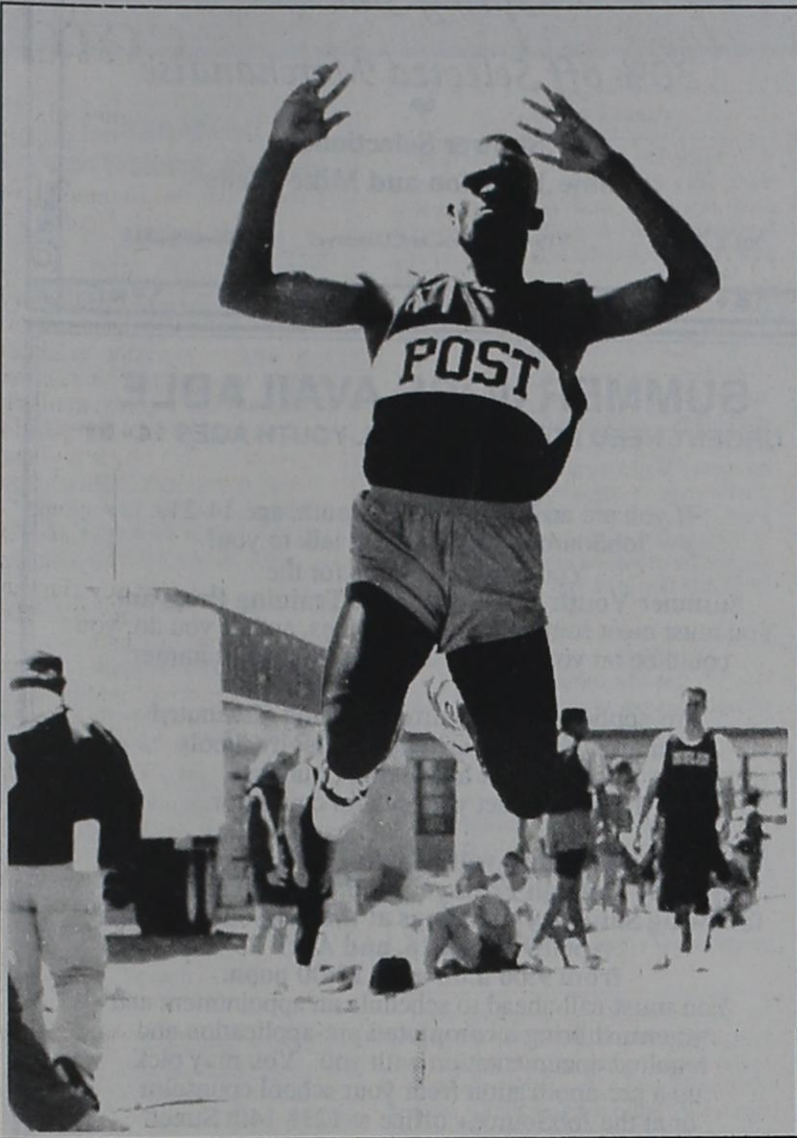

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Reporting child abuse: it's the law

Few crimes are as terrible as child abuse and neglect. According to state law, anyone who suspects child abuse or neglect must report the case to a law enforcement agency or the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (TDPRS).

Calling in a report may seem like an inadequate response to child maltreatment. But while a report may not bring decisive action, it can help establish a pattern that eventually will be clear enough to help the child. And remember: the obligation to report is law.

How to recognize abuse

You should suspect physical abuse when you see children displaying some or all of the following symptoms:

- Frequent injuries, such as bruises, cuts, black eyes or burns
- Aggressive, disruptive and destructive behavior
- Passive, withdrawn and emotionless behavior
- Frequent complaints of pain, but no obvious injury
- Cigarette burns on any part of the body
- Fear of going home or seeing a parent
- Unseasonable clothes that may hide injuries to arms or legs.

You should suspect neglect when you see children who are obviously malnourished or filthy, habitually wear torn or dirty clothes, or suffer from excessive fatigue and listlessness. Other red flags include children who steal or beg for food, are frequently absent or tardy for school or are unattended for long periods of time.

Symptoms of sexual abuse include extreme fear of being alone with adults of a certain sex, precocious sexual knowledge or interest, evidence of injury to the genital area, difficulty in sitting or walking

and sexual victimization of other children. Sexual abuse is also indicated by pregnancy in a young girl or physical signs of sexually transmitted diseases.

If you suspect abuse or neglect

A person who suspects abuse should not try to "investigate" or confront the apparent abuser. However, it may be a good idea to talk to the child to see if there is a simple or innocent explanation for suspicious-looking signs. If circumstances still seem to indicate maltreatment, you must make a report.

TDPRS will investigate if the allegation warrants it. Not every report leads to an investigation. TDPRS makes the determination whether the circumstances described in a report are likely to constitute actual abuse or neglect. Some reports of neglect, for example, turn out to be reports about conditions of poverty rather than parental neglect.

How you can help

A child who wants to talk about abuse often starts with indirect hints (such as, "What if..." or "I have a friend..."). It is important that you remain calm and listen. Remember that the child's abuser may be someone to whom the child is strongly attached, and the child may feel that he or she deserves mistreatment.

You may be the only person in a position to help that child. In some cases, your alert report can literally save a life. TDPRS has a toll-free 24-hour child abuse hot line: 1-800-252-5400. 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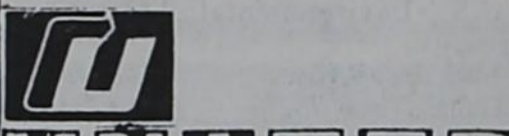

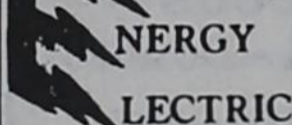

Anyone who believes... has a testimony

Did you know that you have the testimony of God in your heart? 1 John 5:9-10 states, "we accept man's testimony, but God's testimony is greater because it is the testimony of God, which he has given about His son. Anyone who believes in the son of God has this testimony in His heart." (NIV) What a glorious truth for us to reflect upon! You and I have at the very center of our being the testimony of God or witness of God (KJV). Every believer has "this testimony in his heart".

E. Stanley Jones was a great Methodist Missionary to India who later became famous for several Christina classics. However, Jones was not always polished in expressing the testimony of God. He tells of his early Christian experience; his first attempt to communicate this witness in his heart.

I had prepared for three weeks, for I was to be God's lawyer and argue his case well. I started on rather a high key and after a half dozen sentences used a word that I never used before and I have never used since: indifference. (and you thought only your pastor created his own vocabulary) where-upon a college girl smiled and put down her head. With that, the preacher lost his train of thought. My mind was an absolute

blank. I stood there clutching for something to say. Finally I blurted out: I'm very sorry, but I have forgotten my sermon and I started for my seat in shame and confusion. As I was about to sit down, the inner voice said: "Haven't I done anything for you? If so, couldn't you tell that?"

Jones stood back up and said, "friends, I see I can't preach, but you know what Christ has done for my life, how he has changed me, and though I cannot preach I shall be his witness the rest of my days." Jones had found the testimony of God in his heart and it resulted in a young man coming forward and receiving Christ Jesus and His personal savior.

You and I may not always speak as eloquently as we desire, but that is not what brings results in God's Kingdom. What brings results is when you and I allow God to release the witness that he has placed in every believers heart. When you and I begin to bear witness to what the Lord has done in our lives others will indeed come into the Kingdom of God. During this Easter season may the witness of God be resurrected from your hearts by our living Lord.
